


Key Information	
<b>Gospels</b>	Their titles are Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. The main message of these books is Jesus and what He did here on earth and what He said. Sometimes people will use the expression, "It is the gospel truth!" when they are telling a story.
<b>The good Samaritan</b> (Love)	A traveller is beaten up and robbed, and left for dead along the road. A priest comes by, but deliberately avoids the man. Finally, a Samaritan comes by, and he helps the injured man, in an act of mercy and compassion.
<b>Zacchaeus</b> (Generosity and not being greedy)	In the Bible, Zacchaeus was the chief tax collector of Jericho during the time of Jesus Christ. ... When Jesus came to Jericho to speak, Zacchaeus who was short in stature was unable to see, so climbed a fig tree. Noticing him, Jesus asked to visit Zacchaeus' home despite the fact that he was considered as sinner.
<b>The unforgiving servant</b> (Forgiveness)	A man owed the king ten thousand talents. He could not pay so he begged for mercy – and the king cancelled the debt. The man then met a fellow servant who owed him a hundred denarii. The man demanded payment and had his fellow servant thrown in prison when he could not pay.

<b>Values</b>	Values are basic and fundamental beliefs that guide or motivate attitudes or actions. They help us to determine what is important to us.
<b>gospel</b>	The first four books in the New Testament are called the Gospels.
<b>dilemma</b>	A moral dilemma is a conflict in which you have to choose between two or more actions and have moral reasons for choosing each action.
<b>parables</b>	A parable is a simple story which has a special religious or moral meaning at the end. People can learn from parables because stories are easy to remember and they remind us of things we do in our own lives.
