Class 1 September – October 2021



All our learning in class this half term will be focused around the question:
'What makes a good global citizen?'

English

- In English this half term we will be focusing on writing sentences independently. In particular the children will be encouraged to remember:
 - To begin their sentences with a capital letter
 - To leave clear finger spaces between words
 - To form their letters correctly and position them accurately on the line
 - To use a full stop at the end of a sentence
 - To orally rehearse their sentences and to reread to check for errors
- The children will continue to have a daily Phonics session. This half term we will be revising Phase 3 sounds and tricky words as well as continuing to revise the Phase 2 sounds and words.
- Reading books will be sent home every Tuesday and Friday and every child will read to an adult at least once per week in school.
- We will also explore our class texts through role play opportunities to further develop the children's speaking and listening skills.

The text we will focus on is: The Queen's Hat

The outcome will be: To write instructions to help the Queen catch her flyaway hat.

How can I help / information for Helping

- Whilst listening to your child read, ask questions to check their comprehension.
- Encourage them to use the punctuation to aid their expression as they read.
- When your child writes at home, encourage them to use the correct letter formation.
- Read a range of books to your child.
- Please write in your child's reading record when you have listened to them read and let us know if you have finished the book.

Maths

- This half term the children will be consolidating their understanding of numbers to 10. Children will be able to count both forwards and backwards from any given number and compare quantities using 'more than/ less than'.
- We will also continue to learn number bonds within numbers to 10 to create addition and subtraction number sentences.
- Children will use a range of equipment such as 10 frames, counters, numicon and part-part-whole models to support their understanding of new ideas.
- We will begin to introduce addition and subtraction symbols when writing number sentences and apply the term 'equal' (or is the same amount as) when comparing quantities.
- The children will continue to develop their problem solving skills by using a range of methods to understand and solve word problems.
- To support the children's understanding of new concepts, we will be using the areas of enhanced provision to extend their learning independently. The children will have regular access to the 'maths area' in the classroom, as well as applying their maths skills to cross-curricular maths problems.
- The children will be able to access Mathletics, a super on line maths learning resource, this year. They will be receiving their log in details shortly.

How can I help / information for Helping

Sharing number rhymes and songs together such as; 10 in the bed, 5 currant buns etc.
 Using the language of "more" and "less" in practical situations.
 Making number sentences during daily activities – eg "You have 6 grapes, if I give you 3 more that is 6 add 3 equals ?"

KIRF Targets – Autumn Term 1

- Count up to 20
- Count on and back to 20
- One more than and one less than numbers up to 10
- Add and subtract one digit numbers to 10, including zero.

<p>Focus is: Queen and Country</p> <p>Skills / knowledge to be developed: This half term in history we will be learning about HRH Queen Elizabeth 2nd. We will learn about her coronation and about the Royal family. Talk about where the Queen lives and what her various residences are called.</p>	<p>How can I help / information for Helping</p> <p>Discuss with your child the different properties of everyday materials you come across.</p> <p>Go on a material hunt and try to find the best materials to make a shelter with.</p>	<p>How can I help / information for Helping</p> <p>Please ensure that your child comes to school in their PE kit every Wednesday.</p> <p>As we head into autumn and the weather becomes more changeable, please ensure that children are wearing kit appropriate to the weather conditions on that particular day.</p>
