All our learning in class this half term will be focused around the question:

How did people in the past protect themselves?

English

- We will be developing our knowledge of the correct terminology for the techniques we use within our writing and will also be continuing to develop sentence structure.
- Our focus in English will link to our History topic as we explore the life of Mary Anning, an English palaeontologist who became famous for discovering prehistoric fossils.
- The children will read both fiction and non-fiction texts about Mary Anning and they will compare and contrast the features of these. They will study non-chronological reports and conclude their writing unit with their own piece.
- We will then move onto Debate where the children will prepare arguments for and against the motion **'Should children on the 'Naughty List' receive Christmas Presents?'**
- Handwriting is a key focus this year and we will continue to work to practise our first joins to develop fluency, which will allow us to write with ease.
- Spelling sessions will take place daily in which the children will build upon their knowledge of phonics and spelling patterns.

The texts we will focus on are: Stone Girl Bone Girl by Laurence Anholt.

The outcome will be: to write an informative report about the life of Mary Anning.

Maths

- This half term the children will learn a range of strategies to support them in their understanding of multiplication and division. Children will begin with a focus on their 2, 5 and 10 times tables, they will learn to recall and apply the multiplication and division facts related to these.
- We will then move on to measuring length in cm and m including comparing the length of lines and objects.
- In Year 2 it is an expectation that all children will know number facts within 20. We would very much appreciate your support in practising the attached number facts with your child. It is important that they can mentally recall their number facts. A great start would be knowing all of the number facts which make numbers within 10, e.g. all of the ways of making 7/8/9. We will focus on bridging 10, e.g. mental methods for 7+8.
- The children will solve problems and learn to explain, convince others and justify their findings using mathematical vocabulary: ***I know that..., I think.... because....***
- Children will continue to be expected to score a minimum of 1000 points on Mathletics as part of their homework too. Keep up the hard work Mathletics Champions!



How can I help / information for Helping

- Encourage children to read facts about Mary Anning's life on the following websites <https://www.natgeokids.com/uk/discover/history/general-history/mary-anning-facts/>

- Ask your child to make predictions about their reading book. What do you think will happen next? Why do you think this?
- Discuss vocabulary with your child from their reading book – what do you think this word means?
- Model reading a sentence to your child fluently before asking them to repeat it. This process helps to build confidence in reading fluently and accurately.

How can I help / information for Helping

Support your child to identify sensible ways of adding 2 numbers. Which is the most efficient way, 2+9 or 9+2?


Use number bonds to support adding past 10. For example, to solve 7+5, I know that 7+3 makes 10 and then add 2 more.

Topic	Science	P.E
<p>Focus is: This half term the children will answer the question "How did people in the past protect themselves?" which will have a History focus. We will link this to the life of various famous people from history, including; Mary Anning, Guy Fawkes, L.S. Lowry and Rosa Parks.</p> <p>Skills / knowledge to be developed: We will begin by learning about chronology and place the historical figures on a timeline. We will learn about why these individuals are famous and the impact their lives had on the world and our lives today.</p> <p>Applied through: History / English / Maths / Computing / PSHE</p>	<p>Focus is: This half term the children will to identify that most living things live in habitats to which they are suited.</p> <p>Skills / knowledge to be developed: Children will learn how to describe different habitats and understand how they provide for the basic needs of different kinds of animals and plants, and in turn, how they depend on each other.</p> <p>DT links: We will continue to design and build our animal shelters which will be placed in the local habitat before Christmas.</p> <p>Applied through: Discussion / Sorting and classifying information / links to PSHE A class trip to Tropical World to take part in a habitats workshop and explore the different habitats on display.</p>	<p>Focus is: Games - Outdoor</p> <p>Skills / knowledge to be developed: Throwing and catching different balls.</p> <p>Applied through: Children will develop their techniques to enhance their co-ordination and will play a variety of games in small teams. We will focus on catching different sized balls with two hands and throwing with control.</p> <p>Our PE day is Tuesday. Please ensure that your child has their named outdoor PE kit including trainers.</p>
<p>How can I help / information for Helping</p> <p>Discuss chronology with your child, talk about the order of events in their day to day life and further back in time.</p>	<p>How can I help / information for Helping</p> <p>Can you describe a local habitat for wildlife?</p>	<p>How can I help / information for Helping</p> <p>Children will come home in their PE kit unless the lesson is postponed due to the weather and the kit will stay in school to enable us to do the lesson on a different day. Please help your child to practise getting undressed and dressed independently, especially doing buttons and zips!</p>

<p>Focus is: 'Ho ho ho' - A Christmas song by Joanna Mangona and Jane Sebba</p> <p>Skills / knowledge to be developed: Listening to and appraising other styles of music and continuing to embed the interrelated dimensions of music through games and playing percussion instruments.</p> <p>Applied through: practical sessions</p>	<p>Focus is: The focus this half term is Mental Health and Wellbeing with a focus on friendship.</p> <p>Skills / knowledge to be developed: This theme focuses on developing children's knowledge and understanding of friendship, how we make friends, what makes and good friend and how we can protect friendships and resolve conflicts when we do fall out. We will look at three key social and emotional aspects of learning: empathy, managing feelings, and social skills which we will explore through circle time.</p> <p>Applied through: Discussion / Circle time / debate</p>	<p>Focus is: How do we make good choices?</p> <p>Skills / knowledge to be developed: In R.E this half term we will explore how people face moral choices, beginning with a consideration of what makes a happy classroom and why rules are important. We will then find out about moral codes from Christianity and Islam including the Ten Commandments and the Five Pillars. The children will also hear non-religious stories and discuss the morals within them.</p> <p>Applied through: Discussion / Circle time / debate</p>
<p>How can I help / information for Helping</p> <p>As current restrictions still mean we cannot sing in school, please sing your favourite Christmas songs at home and discuss these with your child. What is it that you like about them? Which instruments can you hear? Do the lyrics rhyme?</p>	<p>How can I help / information for Helping</p> <p>Discuss resolving conflicts between friends – how can you help a situation? When should you get involved? Who should you talk to if you need help?</p>	<p>How can I help / information for Helping</p> <p>Do you have any rules in your household? Why do we have rules? Are some rules more important than others?</p>

<p><u>Ongoing Homework</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Reading: We encourage all children in KS1 to read for 15 minutes a day. Please log what they have read in their reading record. Books will be given out on Tuesday and Friday each week.
