<ul> <li>Reading During their daily RWI phonics session children will learn to: <ul> <li>Read all single letter sounds;</li> <li>Play lots of games that involve 'Fred talk' (sounding out and blending words together such as c-a-t.)</li> <li>Blend sounds to read short 2 or 3 sound words e.g. in, red, yes.</li> <li>Read Special Friends: th, sh, ch, qu, ng, nk, ff, ll, ss, ck.</li> <li>Practise reading all single letter sounds and Special Friends speedily and begin to read them in words.</li> </ul> </li> <li>At the end of each week, newly taught sounds will be shared with you via Tapestry. <ul> <li>Writing:</li> <li>The focus will be on pencil grip and accurate letter formation.</li> <li>Children will learn to segment words to spell using 'Fred fingers'.</li> <li>Children will have the opportunity to practise their mark making skills through adult and child initiated independent challenges.</li> </ul> </li> <li>Comprehension</li> <li>We will continue to read a range of fiction, non-fiction and poetry books.</li> <li>The children will answer a range of how and why questions to check their understanding of the stories read.</li> </ul>		d, yes. We will continue to observe seasonal changes outside linked to Autumn and Winter. They will harvest the class sunflower seeds and turn the soil ready for sowing of new seeds.  We will look at different festivals including Bonfire Night, Hanukkah and Christmas.  The children will further their scientific knowledge about living things through exploring signs of the Mysterious Creature in the Secret Garden:  They will revisit the Secret Garden and review the evidence they have found.  They will document their evidence using a choice of languages: photos, talk, early writing, observational drawings, videos.  They will collate their evidence in a report which they will send to the Ministry of Mysteries.  They will use their critical thinking skills to problem solve:  What does their evidence tell them about the Mysterious Creature?  Does their current theory (the Mysterious Creature being a Blue Dragon) stack up to the evidence they have found. The children will have picture news assemblies with a topical focus. This will help to develop their understanding of British Values.
