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	Communication, Language and Literacy	Mathematical Development			
	We will be focusing on pond life and the life cycle of frogs.	The focus will be on numbers 8, 9 and 10.			
	We will be looking at fiction and non-fiction texts about pond life, in particular frogs and toads. The children will continue to retell stories through the use of story maps and sequencing pictures as well as story writing. The children will become 'researchers': finding out and writing facts about frogs and their life cycles. The children will further develop their story telling and writing skills by making their own page for the story 'I Don't Want to be a Frog!' Every morning the children will write a silly simple sentence that includes the recapped sound and tricky word from the previous day. They will focus on	 The children will explore number bonds to 10 using their subitising skills. The children will look carefully at structured arrangements, such as those show on dice and 10-frames, and then close their eyes and explain what they see. Describing sub-groups within structured arrangements will deepen the children's understanding of part-part-whole relations and allow them to further consider composition (the numbers within numbers). The children will continue to develop their counting skills and make sure they can count objects accurately and reliably. The children will begin to consider strategies for counting larger numbers of objects, including those that cannot be moved. Practical activities such as counting wands and 			
	including the Key Success Criteria: To say their sentence out loud, Fred fingers, capital letters, finger spaces and full stops. They will be encouraged to re-read their sentence to check it makes sense. The children will develop their poetry skills by sharing rhyming stories and poems. They will then create their own rhyming sentence for the story, 'Oi Frog!' The children will continue to read every day as part of RWI. Each week, during the RWI sessions, an adult will listen to each child read individually and as part of a group. The texts we will focus on are: One Quiet Pond, Oi Frog! and I Don't Want to be a Frog!	 helping a puppet ('Leo the Lion') to develop their counting skills will help to embed these key areas of understanding. The children will develop their understanding of our counting system and that every whole number is '1 more' than the previous number and '1 less than the following number'. They will confidently say 1 more and 1 less than a number to 10 and beyond. The children will also continue to develop their recording skills using mathematical graphics. They will be encouraged to explain what they have done. The children will further develop their positional language and mapping skills, through the story, 'We're going on a picnic'. 			
F	How can I help / information for helping Share a variety of books at home with your child. Discuss vocabulary from books the children share or read to you. Ask questions to check your child's understanding of the book they have read. Practise accurate letter formation When your child is writing at home, please encourage them to start their letters in	How can I help / information for Helping Practise saying 1 more and 1 less than a given number to 10 and beyond. Go on a walk with your child – can they map the route? Subitising (seeing the quantity without counting) when out and about – how many flowers/ trees can you see in that group? How many sheep/ cows in the field. Can you use your subitising skills or do you need to use a counting strategy?

Focus is: Consolidating knowledge of Set 2 sounds. ay, ee, igh, ow (snow, blow), oo (book, look), oo (moon, spoon), ar, or, air, ir, ou, and oy. The children will also be continuing to practise blending and segmenting skills in order to read and write words. The children will further explore the Zones of Regulation and practice the strategies linked to this to help them regulate themselves when feeling sad, angry or frustrated. They will also continue to benefit from circle times as a class and in Key Worker Groups. This is a great chance for children to discuss and share their emotions and feelings Our Special Assembly will continue to take place in school. This will be at 9.15 every Friday morning. You will be invited the week before if your child has been chosen as Star of the Week.	Focus is: Ball games Skills / knowledge to be developed: The children will continue to develop their ball skills: catching, throwing and kicking. Exciting fine motor activities will be provided within the classroom for the children to access. These will help the children improve their pencil control. PE will be on a Wednesday morning this half term.

- The children will continue to have a music lesson with a specialist music teacher every Monday afternoon this half-term.
- The children will observe their very own tadpoles as they develop into frogs. They will use information books to learn more about frogs and their life cycles; and will compare frogs to other animals found in and around ponds.
- The children will create their own pond habitats in our outdoor area. They will consider
 what things they would (reeds, mud, cattails) and would not expect (plastic bottles) to
 find in a pond, and, will discuss the risks items such as plastic might pose for pond
 habitats and pond life.
