<b>Art and Design</b>	<p>In an increasingly automated society, individual creativity is now highly prized as it is steadily becoming the only thing that cannot be recreated by computers or robots. The creative industries are booming and are growing faster than any other industry. They not only enable high levels of personal job satisfaction but also involve extremely well trained and paid vocations. These most often include utilising computers, and include careers areas such as gaming, animation, architecture, automotive design, product design, graphic design and illustration, web design, fashion, film, set design, prop and special effects design, urban landscape and interior design and so on. <b>Biology</b>	<p>Biology is fundamental in the most literal sense of the word. It is all about how organisms live, breed, breathe and die and how they interact. <b>Business</b>	<p>Business at BRGS considers the numerous areas of business life. 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Chemistry	<p>A-level Chemistry attempts to answer the big question ‘what is the world made of?’ and it is the search for this answer that makes this subject so fascinating. Drama is the subject deemed most desirable to develop these skills for life due to its unique learning experience where students are empowered to think critically, creatively and constructively. Moreover, Drama at A-level offers the rare and rewarding combination of a rigorous academic discipline with creative practical components that develops students’ abilities on many levels in addition to facilitating strong university entry. The course nurtures students to tap into their own intelligence and creativity, building their confidence, their communication skills and encouraging enquiry. They will develop their own voice as they utilize leadership/teamwork techniques, research and interpersonal skills, and analysis and evaluation as they undergo a thorough theatrical training. 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<b>Economics</b>	<p>In one respect, all societies are ‘economies’ in the sense that they have to solve the problem of how to use scarce resources to produce goods and services which meet the demands of consumers.</p> <p>The subject examines issues relating to the world in which we live. For example:</p> <p>What are stocks and shares, how do we make money?</p> <p>Is privatisation a good idea? <b>English Language</b>	<p>Humankind's ability to communicate is one of its most notable phenomena; English Language at A-Level is about getting to the heart of how and why language is used (consciously and subconsciously) in the world around us and the effects of the ways in which we use language. Starting from how we acquire language as children to how we manipulate and shape language to reflect and construct identity as adults, this course will allow you to probe and analyse the way language has metamorphosed over time in response to significant historical and social changes up to the present day, where the influence of social issues and technology continue to shape communication within a range of different contexts and by a range of different speakers and writers.</p> <p>If you are a budding writer (fiction or non-fiction), you can showcase your creativity through the original writing coursework component.</p> <p>The different skills you will hone throughout the course, including contextualised data analysis, discursive essays, evaluation and investigative research, will equip you well for a range of future academic and career paths. 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<b>English Literature</b>	<p>If you enjoy reading and like to debate and explore social issues and literary texts then English Literature is the ideal option for you.</p> <p>Literature is a platform for writers to discuss and debate the pressing, and often controversial, social issues of the time. Our set texts enable you to explore a range of concepts including class divides, racial prejudice, sexuality, gender, scientific progression, death and man's complex relationship with religion amongst many others.</p> <p>Studying English Literature enables you to explore and analyse worlds both within the texts and, importantly, the social contexts that compelled writers to compose provocative pieces of literature that still resonate with readers today.</p> <p>We will provide you with a platform to probe, debate and critique literary texts in a constructive and academic environment.</p> <p>Across the two-year course, you will engage with a range of literary texts of different genres and time periods to develop a breadth of literary understanding and appreciation whilst also honing your analytical and evaluative skills. Our subject is focused on developing your skills of articulation (both written and spoken), equipping you with vital skills to carry forward into the world of work or higher education. <b>Geography</b>	<p>There has never been a better or more important time to study A level Geography. With growing interest in contemporary global issues such as climate change, migration, environmental degradation and social cohesion, this is one of the most relevant courses you could choose to follow. Geography is a robust and academic subject which is well-regarded by universities and employers due to the range of skills and depth of knowledge that it fosters. The content is a balance of human and physical geography each half delivered by a specialist teacher. 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<b>German</b>	<p>‘Why study a language at A Level?’ – Our answer would be very simple: ‘Why not?’</p> <p>If you have proven your ability in GCSE languages, it would be a logical step to take it further - you enjoyed it, it was challenging in a ‘different’ kind of way and a language qualification definitely makes you stand out in the crowd! There are, however, some other very important reasons which you may not yet have considered: the further you take your language qualification, the more attractive you become to employers. Statistically, one in five British companies is aware that they are losing trade through lack of language skills within their workforce. The internet has increasingly brought custom from all over the world – language qualifications increase your employability! The Russell Group universities regard the study of languages at 16+ to be part of a very solid preparation for study at degree level. In a nutshell - as one of their recommended ‘facilitating subjects’ - an A level language qualification will enhance your chances of entry into a high quality university. And finally, as linguists we are natural communicators! In a Europe where Brexit threatens to distance us from our neighbours, we will need our coming generations to have an insight, an openness to and an appreciation of other cultures like never before. Maths/ Double Maths	<p>Mathematics is not only a beautiful and exciting subject in its own right but also one that underpins many other branches of learning. Physics	<p>Physics is a wonderfully varied subject. It covers everything on a scale ranging from the size of the universe to the size of the very smallest sub-atomic particles. The aim of Physics is to understand how everything works and studying Physics allows you to describe, explain and predict the world around you. Does prison really change criminal behaviour? What shapes our personality? <b>Sociology</b>	<p>Sociology studies many aspects of the society in which we live – for example, the family, education, the mass media, social class, gender, race, youth culture, social identity, crime and deviance, religion, power and politics. It looks at how sociologists gather information about society and the conclusions they draw. Sociologists attempt to address issues of social inequality by influencing governments in their creation of social policies. <b>Spanish</b>	<p>Why study Spanish at A Level?            Learning Spanish allows you to speak with over 400 million Spanish speakers in over 20 countries on four continents, and Spanish the second most used language on the internet, after English. Following a study carried out by the British Council, Spanish has emerged as the most important language for the UK for our presence in the global market.            It can be used as a gateway to learn other romance languages, sharing roots with French, Portuguese, Catalan, Romanian, Italian and others.            Hispanic culture is of increasing importance and significance. Artists such as Salvador Dali, Picasso and Frida Kahlo have produced some of the most famous pieces of artwork in the modern era. Eleven Spanish-speaking writers have won the Nobel Prize for Literature: five from Spain and six from Latin America.            As a speaker of another language, you gain valuable communication skills that are transferable to a variety of jobs from business to journalism, medicine to sport, and tourism to information technology. With many universities regarding a language A Level as a solid foundation for degree level study of any subject, you are distinguishing yourself as someone who has a good work ethic, interest in the wider world and with an appreciation of other cultures.</p> <p>So, why study Spanish at A Level? - You will then receive a letter making you a provisional offer of a place conditional upon obtaining a minimum number of GCSE grades.
- We will try to allocate you as many of your top subject choices in the order of priority you have indicated on your application form.
- We build our option blocks around your choices. For most students we can accommodate their top 3 choices. If we are not able to, we would contact you as soon as possible.
- You will then be invited for an informal interview.
- Work very hard to achieve the best possible GCSE grades! You will be able to attend a Preview Day in June - after you have finished your GCSE examinations. Your place will then be formally confirmed when you inform us of your GCSE results. A further Enrolment Interview is held at the end of August to officially confirm your choice of courses and welcome you to BRGS Sixth Form.
