

Year 5 – Term 6 Information and Key Learning

We hope you all had a good break. Here's to a fun – packed, productive and enjoyable term 6 – a term packed full of great learning opportunities. It is still hard to believe that this is the final term. The information below shows some of the things the children will be learning and how you can help support them at home. Please do not hesitate to ask any questions you may have. We are really looking forward to a busy and engaging term with the children.

Our learning this term

This term, in English, we will be using the focus text: 'Who Let the Gods Out'. From sharing and discussing this text, the children will be learning to make predictions and then complete work through language play. They will be writing descriptions, looking at how the author uses humour to describe a character's personality and finally go on to design their own fictional mode of transport by writing a manual which describes how it operates using cause and effect. In History, we will be using our English text to help us learn about Ancient Greece. We will be studying the ways of Greek life, along with their achievements and their influence on the western world. Thanks to Aleka, the children are going to have the opportunity to write and perform a short Greek play to another year group too!

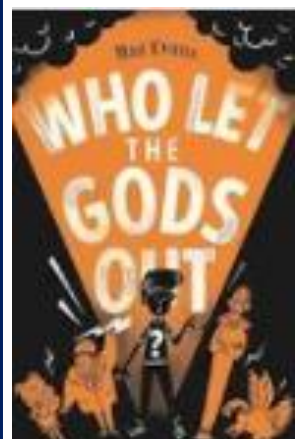
This term, our Maths focus will begin with our unit on shape, in particular measuring angles. We will then move onto decimals once again. The children will be learning how to: add and subtract decimals with up to three decimal places; multiply and divide decimals by 10, 100 and 1000 and how to convert between them. We will also be spending some time learning about negative numbers and position and direction.

The Big Question in RE continues to be 'What does it mean to be a Muslim in Britain today?' Children will make connections between Muslim practice of the Five Pillars and their beliefs about God and the Prophet Muhamad, give examples of how each pillar might affect the life of a Muslim and explore the key functions of the mosque and Qur'an. We are fortunate to be visiting Canterbury Mosque so that the children can see Islamic practises in person.

PE will offer the children the opportunity to develop their athletic skills in readiness for our Sports afternoon and we are excited to get stuck into different outdoor and adventurous activities (OAA) in the summer sun. 'Changing Me' is our topic for Jigsaw this term. In Computing sessions, the children will be exploring Microsoft Word and its features, which we use within the other subjects being taught. Finally, Mandarin will continue and it is great to see the children's enthusiasm for learning this alternative language.

English Key Learning Facts

Key aim: To read and spell Year 5 words

It is really important to try and keep practising your spellings. Each week, the children will be introduced to a new spelling rule and ten new spellings to focus on. We will send these spellings home every Monday for you to practise. We recommend 15 minutes per day.

Remember, there are other ways to practise your spellings too. Here are a few ideas:

Suggested Activities

Use the word - Making meaning helps us all to remember; if writing a sentence down is hard, talk the sentence out loud.

Spot the deliberate mistake - If you write out the words (and make a deliberate mistake) can your child find it (don't forget to tell them, you have made a mistake)?

Mix it up - The key to spelling is practice, but don't feel like you have to use the same method all of the time. Try something different every day.

Mathematics Key Learning Facts

Key aim: To understand percentages.

Percentages

The sign % stands for 'per cent' which means 'out of 100'.
40% means 40 out of 100 11% means 11 out of 100

To change a percentage to a decimal, divide by 100.

Change 48% to a decimal: $48 \div 100 = 0.48$

To change a decimal to a percentage, multiply by 100.

Change 0.67 to a percentage: $0.67 \times 100 = 67\%$

Key Vocabulary

Percent	Part	Equivalent
Numerator	Denominator	Decimal
Out of	Multiply	Divide
Tenth	Hundredth	Thousandth

Here are some examples of questions you might ask your child. EG 'Tell me what 0.5 is as a percentage? What does 75% look like as a decimal?' The aim is for children to instantly be able to recall the number facts.

Fraction	Decimal	Percentage
1/2	0.5	50%
3/4	0.75	75%
1/5	0.2	20%
1/8	0.125	12.5%
93/100	0.93	93%
1/50	0.02	2%
1/25	0.04	4%

Challenge:

Can you make a set of fact cards with different fraction, decimal and percentage equivalents on and then use them to play snap with your friends and family?

The secret to success is practising little and often. Use time wisely. Can you practise these key learning facts while walking to school or during a car journey?
