Ofsted Report

Alongside this newsletter, I am pleased to include our most recent Ofsted report. The report itself is incredibly short and does not reflect the depth of the feedback that was given to senior leaders and governors at the end of the inspection.

I would like to highlight a couple of points that were made at the feedback that did not make the 'final cut' of the inspection report, limited by word count as it is.

Whilst Early Years does not get much mention in the final report, there was a lot of time spent here over the course of the inspection – the inspector commented upon the well-considered and ambitious provision for the children, the secure modelling of language and the planned independence of the children.



I'd also like to highlight the comments made about SEN provision. The inspector highlighted the clear systematic leadership of SEN and he said that the SEN practice he saw was very good. He commented on the staff's professional development and how the school was proud of its work on neurodiversity. My greatest moment of pride was when he said that 'there were children whose needs were so well met, you would not know that they have additional educational needs' – this is inclusion at it's very best.

I was also proud that the inspector recognised the work that the school does for children's personal development from our consideration of diversity, our support for children's mental health but primarily for our community engagement within Bridge and it's 'older' residents.

Rightly, the inspector also identified the excellent behaviour and attitudes of the children across the school and said that there was a 'happiness factor' about the school. Pupils said that bullying was not a problem, it was rare and when it did happen, it was dealt with. He commented on the positive relationships with parents and the benefits of this.

As with all Ofsted reports, there are a couple of areas for improvement identified and, pleasingly, these are issues that we are already working on.

All in all it was a positive experience and I would like to express my gratitude once again to the support parents showed during the inspection as well as to the whole community for their support day-in and day-out.

Children in Need

Next Friday, it is Children in Need and we will be raising money for this charity. The theme is Be SPOTacular and we'll be inviting children (and adults!) to come into school wearing spots in return for a donation to Children in Need. Over the course of the day, they will also be learning about the amazing work that Children in Need do, the projects it funds and the children it helps.

Each year, we raise money for Save the Children on Christmas Jumper Day but we are very aware of people's finances and the environmental impact of people purchasing items of clothing that may not be frequently worn. You will know that over the past two years, we have been raising money and awareness for cystic fibrosis during their annual Wear Yellow Day.

We will soon be welcoming Lucy to Bridge School and although she is not yet a pupil, the family are very much a part of our community – the family already have a child at the school; Lucy's aunt works at the school and her grandmother was a well-loved and respected teacher here.

We are asking for your help.

I will hand over the Sarah (Mum) who can make her plea so much more eloquently than I:

I need your help! It's a call to arms!

On Friday, NICE (the body that evaluates drug treatments for the NHS) made the recommendation that a group of miracle, life extending, life enhancing drugs for CF people aren't cost effective for the NHS. They are recommending they no longer be given to CFers.

These drugs (Kaftrio is one) are as close to a cure as we can get. They have given the CF community hope and the prospect of a future. In summary Kaftrio (the real wonder drug):

- Reduce the production on mucus
- Makes the mucus less sticky and thick so people are getting less infections
- Increases lung function exponentially

At the moment we are in the final stages of a consultation process.

Please, could I ask you all to follow the link, open an account with NICE and leave a comment. We have also been recommended that we need to make 'as much noise as possible' and to contact our local MP so they can put pressure on the government. All this needs to be done before 24th NOVEMBER.

Please help, Lucy's future health and life expectancy depend on these drugs. She was on the verge of receiving them ...
