Over the course of the year, the children have been earning house points which have been totalled weekly and shared in our Friday Celebration Worship. We have also allocated points to the houses where children have won inter-house competitions such as the 500 Words competition.

In our final celebration worship yesterday, I was pleased to announce than Hadrian are the winners of our new house cup – well done to all the children in Hadrian house for their commitment to our educational principles of excellent, creativity and resilience over the course of the year.



News

We were given the fantastic opportunity to take part in a research project run by the Science department of Simon Langton Girls' School, funded by the Royal Society.

Our research question was 'Does Biodiversity make you happy?'. Ten children from Years 4, 5 and 6 were invited to attend a training session at Simon Langton and they learned how to take samples with sweep nets, through pond dipping and how to collect data of trees and flowers fairly. They learned how to use oximeters for measuring their pulse rates, how to allocate children randomly and how they could gather information about people's happiness feelings.



Back at school, these ten led the investigation with the Year 5 cohort, measuring their pulse rates, before and after walks in different areas (indoor; field; forest school area) and they helped to gather all of the necessary information. The children helped to analyse the data and input them on excel to create graphs.



Millie, Farren and Ziva felt very brave and chose to present the findings at the Langton research festival in front of many adults and (much older!) students. They did incredibly well and got the biggest applause of the evening. As the girls said, the happiness answers went up after each walk (biggest increase in the Forest School area), and the biggest drop of pulse rate was also after the walk in the Forest School area. We found many more species of flowers, insects and trees in the Forest School area and Millie summarised it well: 'The answer to our research question 'Does Biodiversity make you happy?' is yes, it does make you calm and happy'.
