

PSHE - 'Lucy's in Lockdown'

Suggested English Activities

Individual Reading

Reading is the task which we would like to encourage first and foremost. It is up to you whether you continue with the school reading journal or not. Perhaps creating a record of free choice books that you are sharing via Oxford owl, or from your own selection online or at home, may encourage your child to read. Perhaps creating a special place for reading (like Rene's reading tent) establishing a routine or setting a challenge may help.

Spelling

You could use your spelling knowledge to have a go at a challenge. See how many words you can make and spell using the letters in the words: Having lots of fun at home

Top tip: In school we would start this off by spotting digraphs (2 letter sounds) and trigraphs (3 letter sounds) and then build words by adding the other letters. Eg. oi – soil, point ai – main igh – night

Well done if you've been practising your spellings on spelling shed last week, this week the games on **spelling shed** <u>www.edshed.com/en-gb/login</u> will focus on -ed and -ing endings.

The common exception words that the children should be able to read and also spell by the end of the year are on the 'parent' section of the school website <u>https://bridge.kent.sch.uk/parents/supporting-learning-at-home/spellings</u>. Printing them off and making a game of bingo or matching pairs with up to 12 unfamiliar words may help.

<u>Writing</u>

This week we are asking the children to think about where they might be transported to if the magic plant they designed last week could be climbed or gives a character magic powers. Your child can choose one of our settings or draw one of their own (your child may have already planned this part). We suggest writing a list of what they can see in the picture first, thinking of exciting adjectives to describe each part of the picture. Then thinking about what they might hear and how they might feel if they were there. This could be one 20 minutes session. Then we would suggest writing these ideas in sentences in another session of about 20 minutes.

If your child is keen to write we would expect accurate sentences using capital letters and full stops, using 'and' to join ideas and choosing appropriate adjectives to describe. Alternatively, you could scribe for your child. We are looking forward to reading their descriptions.





Suggested Maths Activities

<u>Numbots</u> 33 of the Year One children have used Numbots so far and it sounds like you've been enjoying it. Keep up the great work. The focus of Numbots is developing a firm grasp of number, so shut the box, snakes and ladders, adding and subtracting dice or dominoes will all be beneficial too.

Week 2 starts with one final lesson on comparing capacity and moves onto number. The sequence of learning over the four lessons recaps counting in

10s, making and adding equal groups and builds up to creating arrays. (The arrangement of equal groups in

rows and columns). There are many practical ways that arrays can be reinforced at home. You may have ice cube trays, chocolate bars, muffin tins or egg boxes which

the children can count. Or they can create their own arrays with rows of toy cars, building bricks, balls of play dough – or anything else! We have been working hard at counting in 10s, 2s and 5s and the children should be able to apply this knowledge when counting groups of objects. Mistakes arise when the children use objects that are irregular in size or are more challenging to line up. It's important that they are exposed to this so that they are made aware of this potential error by learning from their mistakes.

We're pleased to hear that some of you had fun with last week's junk model



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challenge. Laurence continued our Great Fire of London theme with his model and Malena made a Bridge and Patrixbourne school bus for some magical adventures while school is closed. Don't forget to check Mr Tibble's newsletter for this week's challenge.
