Suggested English Activities

Individual Reading

Student Access to Accelerated Reader

Pupils can log in through the website https://ukhosted14.renlearn.co.uk/6698607/

This will take pupils to the school Accelerated Reader website. The login details for the children are the first letter of their first name followed by the first four letters of their surname e.g. John Smith would be *jsmit*. The password for all accounts is set as *abc*.

Creative skills

Think of a word and then write as many words as you can think of that are associated with it in a minute. E.g. summer – spade, shade, sunshine, holiday, camping, ice cream, family, beach, paddling pool, reading time, journeys.

Choose a topic and write as much as you can in one minute. Count the number of words and then have a go with another topic and try to beat it!

Play a film clip and use this as a basis for writing as rapidly as possible – the action, the dialogue, a description. It can be anything that the images trigger. If you get stuck then just look at what the images trigger as there is no right or wrong.

Building on from the first spelling shed task of practising homophones we would like to encourage the children to move their spellings onto the next assignment – suffix -ation.


English task

Discuss the answers to the questions below. You can write them down if you wish.

The picture is on the next page, please try not to look at the title of the picture before you have completed the first activity

Show the image without the title first.

- Who do you think this is?
- Why is he carrying all of those jars? What's inside them? Why are they attached to his clothing? Couldn't he just carry them in a bag?
- Why is he wearing this clothing?
- Is he going to open the blue jar? Why?
- Why is his other fist clenched?
- What does his body language tell you about his thoughts and feelings?
- Choose 3 words to describe this character. Justify your choices and explain why your
 words are better than anyone else's! [You could vote on the best words and debate why
 they are the best; repeat for the 'worst'/least appropriate.]



Share the title – The Jar Wizard

- Did you think that this man was a wizard? Why/why not?
- Is he what you imagine a wizard should look like? Compare him with other wizards from literature.
- Since he is a wizard, does that mean the contents of the jars are magical?
- Does he need a magic wand?
- Read this description of The Jar Wizard, written by Sean Andrew Murray himself:

He held many secrets in those enchanted jars of his: mysterious crystals, odd nick-knacks from unknown cultures, ancient coins from civilizations long dead, and the preserved remains of creatures believed to be long extinct. But there was one jar, smaller and rounder than the rest, that contained a dark liquid that he seemed most proud of. "This," he said with an unsettling gleam in his eye, "is the blood of one of the Original Fish, the creators of all magic.

I pray I never have cause to use it...."

Writing task

- Help! The Jar Wizard's jars are all missing their labels! Please write labels naming the
 contents, detailing what it is and what it can be used for. Be sure to include any necessary
 safety warnings too!
- Once you have thoughts about his jars look back at the questions you were asked earlier
 and write your own description of the Jar Wizard and what he does. Think about where
 he lives, what he does with his jars and what he is like as a wizard. Is he helpful? Who
 does he help and where?
- For an extra challenge you could even continue the story from Sean Andrew Murray's description. What happens to the 'one jar, smaller and rounder than the rest'?

Fronted adverbials such as slowly, energetically, frantically.

Use interesting adjectives to describe the Jar Wizard such as 'his wrinkled face was overshadowed by a large hood.'

Challenge yourself to include a simile. The Jar wizard tiptoed through the alley way and he was as quiet as a mouse.

Use a range of punctuation such as full stops, commas, exclamation marks, ellipses and brackets to add extra information.

Summer Term - Week 4 (w/c 11th May)

This week's learning on White Rose will focus on solving multiplication and division problems, perimeters of rectangles, perimeters of rectilinear shapes and areas counting shapes as well as a Friday Maths Challenge.

When multiplying, remember you are partitioning numbers into its tens and ones in order to make the calculation more straightforward. For example, 35×5 is equivalent to 30×5 and 5×5 .


Lesson 1 - Multiplying and dividing problem solving




If you are struggling to visualise a number, remember to use manipulatives. They can be items from around the house or even small offcuts of paper labelled 10 and 1.

Please be mindful that perimeter is a distance around the perimeter of a 2D shape and area is a measure of how much space there is on a 2D surface; be careful not to forget the correct units of measure.

In addition, we are always available via email to help overcome any areas that may be a struggle. We will endeavour to provide further examples on a specific area to help the children's learning.

R Let's Investigate

Step 1: Write down a three-digit number in which all the digits are different.

Step 2: Add together all the digits in the three-digit number.

Step 3: Write down all the possible two-digit numbers you can make using each of the digits in the three-digit number (there should be six different two-digit numbers).

Step 4: Add together the six two-digit numbers.

Step 5: Divide the answer to Step 4 by the answer to Step 2.



If you can, pay a visit to his website and see if you can copy one of his birds. He really likes blue tits and if you click on this link you can see lots of ways to draw and paint one. Other birds can be seen on the 'early birds' link.

We would love to see what you come up with. Can you draw, colour or paint like Matt? You can use paint, pencils or pens. If you have water soluble felt tip pens you can blend the colours by using a wet paintbrush.

The other activity that I found was to make a bird feeder kebab.
