Spelling

It has been lovely to see some children having a go at the SPELLING SHED games and practicing their phonics knowledge this week. Now that you have had a go at the 'j' sound, could you have a go at writing as many words as you can that start with the letter 'j'. You could even go on a 'j' hunt around the house!

The focus for this week on **spelling shed** (<u>www.edshed.com/en-gb/login</u>) is the phase 3 sound is 'v' and the phase 4 CVCC words list 2. If you can't remember your login, just let us know and we can email it across to you.

In addition, below is a list of the phase 2 and 3 'tricky' words that the children can practice. These words cannot be sounded out phonetically therefore repetition is key to support their understanding. This may be done by giving your child time to see if they can remember the word initially then remind them of the word. Once recapped, write out some sentences with the word in – can they spot them? You could also write each individual letter on separate pieces of paper and see if they can put them in the right order. You may want to play games such as 'go fish' or 'hide and seek' with several of the words once they become more familiar with them.

<u>Writing</u>

Each week we will set a creative writing task for you to have a go at. This week, have a look at the picture below.

Why not try some of these ideas:

- Have a think about what animals might need to grow. Can you make a list?
- Looking at the picture, can you write some sentences about what each animal?
 What is it called as a baby? Maybe think about what they looked like. For example: The chicken was a chick. The chick is fluffy.
- Think of a story about a baby animal that grows up, maybe they could have a birthday



party! Why not ask an adult to write your story down for you.

We hope the WhiteRose pages have been a useful resource for you at home. This week, we will continue to use the WhiteRose lesson plans to help support the children's progression. Please move onto Week 2, lesson 1, What the Ladybird heard. The suggested activities this week look at five different areas of maths:



counting groups, finding the total amount to 10, positional language (next to, behind, around...), taking one away and recognising amounts to 6. Each activity is adaptable to suit the resources that you may have at home for example, our 'finding the total amount to 10' activity advises the use of biscuits and icing to make ladybirds. If these aren't available to you, you could use pebbles and paints, paper and colouring pencils or raisins and plates to represent the same thing. However you choose to adapt their learning, we encourage practical activities that allow the children to be hands on with their maths, making it memorable and fun! Please do not hesitate to send us an email if you need any ideas.

We have added the links for the stories 'What the Ladybird heard' (<u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=Eu9mPX7DuLA</u>) and 'What the Ladybird heard next' (<u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=Cq0xiXoX8H0</u>) to help with your learning. Feel free to turn the sound off, pause the video and read it together instead of listening to the storyteller.

This week, you would have been sent login details for another resource called **Numbots** (<u>https://play.numbots.com/#/intro</u>)! This is an interactive game to support several areas of mathematical learning including number recognition, one more than, adding two amounts and much more. If you mislay your login details, send us an email and we can forward them to you.
