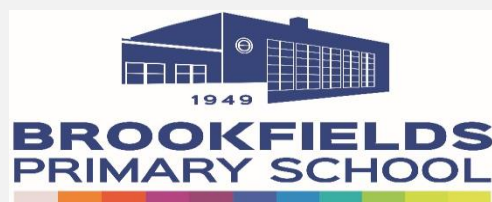


# Pupil premium strategy statement

# Part A: Pupil premium strategy plan

## Statement of intent

Our aim is to use pupil premium funding to improve educational outcomes for our disadvantaged pupils. We aim to mitigate any additional challenges they may face to enable them to reach their full potential and to help them perform as well as other pupils. We use our pupil premium funding to provide targeted academic support in the form of EAL support, speech and language sessions, small group intervention sessions, family liaison staff, whose role it is to improve SEMH and attendance, we provide a breakfast club and support with the cost of educational trips and visits so that every child is able to fully participate.

## Challenges

This details the key challenges to achievement that we have identified among our disadvantaged pupils.

Challenge number	Detail of challenge
1	<p>Low levels of language on entry to school limits reading, comprehension and writing skills. Especially evident in EYFS and Year 1.</p> <p>A significant % of disadvantaged pupils enter our nursery with below expected communication and language skills.</p>
2	<p>Achievement of all pupils is low when compared to national including those eligible for Pupil Premium</p> <p>Internal and external assessments indicate that reading, writing and maths attainment among disadvantaged pupils is significantly below that of non-disadvantaged pupils.</p> <p>On entry to Reception class last year, 47% of our disadvantaged pupils arrived below age-related expectations compared to 36% of other pupils. This gap remains steady to the end of KS2.</p>
3	<p>School has a high percentage of newly arrived, mobile pupils who have EAL or SEN needs.</p>
4	<p>Social and emotional issues are evident in pupils.</p> <p>Our assessments (including wellbeing survey), observations and discussions with pupils and families have identified social and emotional issues for many pupils, notably a lack of enrichment opportunities during school closure. These challenges particularly affect disadvantaged pupils, including their attainment.</p> <p>Teacher referrals for support have markedly increased since the pandemic. 67% of pupils whom are disadvantaged) currently require additional support with social and emotional needs.</p>
5	<p>Community culture, parental and pupil engagement impacts on attendance and punctuality.</p> <p>% of parents who attend parents evenings, workshops and other events is typically minimal.</p>

6	Financial hardship equates to families struggling to provide uniform, access to enrichment activities and other funded opportunities
