Lent

Parent Voice

Artificial Intelligence

As part of our commitment to keeping pupils safe and well-informed in an increasingly digital world, the school has engaged with Safer Internet Week, focusing on the safe and responsible use of AI. A staff working party has developed an action plan to support the careful integration of AI across school and has reviewed and updated our Acceptable Use Policy accordingly. Parents and carers are encouraged to read these updates and access our [Online Safety and AI Policies on the school website](#). This work will build on existing practice through curriculum opportunities, surveys, and assessment pilots, helping pupils understand how AI can support learning rather than simply provide answers. A strong focus will be placed on ethics, reliability, and misinformation, with professional judgement and safeguarding remaining central to all decisions. We will continue to keep families informed and offer guidance on supporting safe and appropriate AI use at home, underpinned by our Catholic values of truth, responsibility, and respect. Parental Communication Reminder

We would like to take this opportunity to remind parents and carers of our Parental Communications Policy, which is designed to support clear, respectful, and effective communication between home and school. We kindly ask parents to note that, in line with this policy, staff will aim to respond to communications within **three working days**, allowing time for concerns to be considered carefully and directed to the most appropriate member of staff. To avoid disappointment, meetings with staff must be arranged in advance, as colleagues will often be teaching or involved in other commitments during the school day. Arriving at school without an appointment may not result in an immediate meeting. Please be considerate of our Reception Team.

Learning for Life – Vaping Education

As a school, we continue to take a proactive approach to tackling vaping, working closely with Lancashire Police as part of our Learning for Life programme to support pupils' understanding of what vaping is, the risks involved, and the impact it can have on their health and wellbeing. Pupils have taken part in assemblies exploring the dangers of vaping, the law, and school expectations, alongside guidance on sanctions and the pastoral support available to help prevent pupils from engaging in this behaviour. As part of this work, we are running a vaping amnesty, allowing pupils to anonymously hand in vapes at designated secure drop-off points around school without sanction. These items will be tested by the police to help pupils better understand what substances can be found in vapes, reinforcing key messages around safety, informed choices and responsibility. Thank you for your continued support.

Uniform

Maintaining high standards of uniform and personal presentation remains an important part of our school expectations. As pupils return after half term on Monday 23rd February, we ask parents and carers to ensure that all uniform requirements are fully met, including the wearing of appropriate school shoes. Examples of acceptable footwear can be found on the school website to support families when checking uniform items. We would also like to clarify expectations around jewellery and appearance. Pupils are not permitted to wear piercings of any kind during the school day, including nose piercings. No form of jewellery may be worn in these piercings, and this includes clear retainers, spacers, or covering jewellery with plasters. False nails and false eyelashes are also not permitted. Although this affects only a small number of pupils, it is important that expectations are applied consistently. Where uniform requirements are not met, existing school sanctions will be used. We appreciate parents' support in ensuring pupils return after half term ready to meet school expectations and fully focused on learning.
