Brownedge Garden

"So, whether you eat or drink, or whatever you do, do all for the glory of God." - 1 Corinthians 10:31. Our school garden continues to provide us with food for our table! Mr Wilson has worked with some pupils when the weather has permitted



and extended the garden to 8 beds. At the beginning of December, two tonnes of topsoil were generously donated by a local businessman, Ian Elliot, which has been put to good use to improve the soil of the existing beds and to provide a good

foundation for future beds. We harvested the crops of leeks, spinach, kale, cabbage, brussel sprouts and seeds have arrived with continued support from Let's Grow Preston. We already have beetroot, peas, beans, garlic and onions growing in readiness for the coming months. It is hoped that once this virus is behind us, the garden is something that will be available to all pupils as an after-school activity.

During lockdown pupils in years 7-10 have been engaging in live Citizenship lessons which are a part of our Learning for Life curriculum. We were lucky to welcome from Epic Risk Management, Mark Murray, who ran a live session and shared his powerful personal testimony about the risks associated with gambling. The Gambling Commission highlights that 37 percent of 11-16 year olds have gambled in the last 12 months and 1.9 percent are problem gamblers. After the session one of our year 10 pupils said, "Mark was so good and interesting, I really enjoyed hearing his story, he was so honest. It is scary how



gambling can become out of control. He offered lots of advice and definitely made me aware of the dangers of gambling, especially now it is so easily available and advertised all around us."



As one of the students said "so Jesus was a naughty teenager too?"! We love the painting by Martini which shows Jesus with his arms folded, sulking! Our GCSE students have been exploring the concept of forgiveness, and thinking about the aims of punishment. We were fortunate to be able to send some questions to two prison chaplains, Emma and Pearce, who sent back a brilliant video answering the students' questions and telling them about their work as a chaplain. MFL – celebrating 'la Fête de la Chandeleur'

The languages department didn't let lockdown get in the way of some cultural appreciation. Our challenge was to follow a crêpe recipe in French and then send photos of our creations.

La chandeleur commemorates the presentation of Jesus at the temple, 40 days after Christmas. It is also a time when crêpes (pancakes) are made, symbolising the end of winter and the return of sunshine and lighter days.

The shape and golden colour is to represent the sun. The tradition is that you must hold a coin in your left hand whilst flipping the pancake with your right hand for good luck for the rest of the year!

Remote Learning

Since January, and the start of lockdown 3, as a school we have worked hard to develop our Remote Education and our efforts have paid off. No one wanted the announcement that schools would close to all but the vulnerable and key worker children, but in true Growth Mindset spirit we showed determination and perseverance that even COVID19 would not stop our learning. Everyone in our school family has risen to the challenge: staff, pupils and parents and guardians. The engagement of pupils has been excellent in live lessons and pupils have found new ways to participate in their learning through use of the chat function in Teams, emojis and polls and shared working on OneDrive and Nearpod. Staff have worked hard since lockdown 1, a year ago, in improving their practice in Remote Education. They have spent a lot of time training themselves and each other on the use of technology to engage pupils and improve teaching and learning.



Teams has proven to be a fantastic platform for our Remote Education, and we have made significant gains in its use. This is something we hope to continue moving forward. Since September, we have used Teams as a Home Learning platform and this will continue after Easter. Through the use of online quizzes such as Quizlet, online educational resources such as GCSE POD and GCSE exam-based websites such as Seneca, we have been able to ensure that the possible gaps that could have developed due to COVID19 have been minimised. The news is often negative about the gaps in learning pupils have experienced but due to the engagement of all our community these gaps are nowhere near as large as they could be. Much of this has happened when people have been juggling other responsibilities such as Home-Schooling children and working full time. We thank everyone involved in making our Remote Learning a success: staff, pupils and parents and guardians!



Steps for Sanctuary

For our almsgiving this Lent, we have supported a group from St. Mary's Brownedge Parish, who are currently fundraising to allow a refugee family to find a home and a place of sanctuary in Bamber Bridge.
