The Equality and Diversity group prepared a virtual assembly for forms that focussed on the importance of treating everyone as equal and as children of God. 




Challenge Week

The focus of Challenge Week for this term was to work on extended answers in every subject. ALL teachers are teachers of literacy and ALL subjects require extended responses in one way or another. This may mean showing working out in maths, comparison writing in English, letter writing in science, analysing the impact of COVID on Hospitality and Catering or giving a justified opinion about the role of graffiti in art. Throughout the week pupils have shown, and been rewarded for resilience, determination, perseverance and using mistakes as learning tools.

The motto for the week is 'show us what you are made of...' and the pupils have certainly done that! Brownedge School Sports

Due to the ongoing impact of COVID it has been a tough year for school sport across South Ribble. This has resulted in all interschool fixtures being postponed until the New Year at the earliest. We have however, had a number of individual pupil success stories this term. Rueben Woodward, a Year 10 GCSE pupil, was released from Burnley in October 2019 as a goalkeeper but has continued to work hard and has been rewarded as he has recently signed an 18-month contract with Everton FC playing for the academy team as a goalkeeper at U15 and U16 level. Reuben has demonstrated his commitment and desire by training up to four times per week on top of



representing their academy sides for games. He has played four games this season and has kept two clean sheets winning all four games in the process. Well done Reuben, keep up the hard work and the success will come.

Our memorial garden was shared by all pupils and even members of the local community, as a place to come together and commemorate those who risked their lives in war. This year many memorial services were cancelled due to COVID, so it was extremely special to be able to come together to show our respects. On Remembrance Day, 11th November 2020 our Year 11 senior prefects led our memorial service and minute silence (even battling the wind!)



History - Remembrance

This year's History Remembrance interhouse competition was based on the Unknown Warrior. 2020 would mark the centenary of the Unknown Soldier being brought to Westminster Abbey from Northern France. When the First World War ended in 1918, 800,000 British and colonial troops had died and another 200,000 were 'missing'. The men and women who were buried aboard had no known grave for their families in Britain to visit. After the war, the King and the Prime Minister decided to bring an unknow soldier back to Britain and to be buried in Westminster Abbey. All houses had entries for the interhouse competition. Pupils had to write a letter to the Unknown Soldier, writing from themselves or from a young person I iving in 1920. Our pupils rose to the challenge and we received some poignant and emotive letters. Overall Romero House came 1st, Bosco House 2nd and Drexel House 3rd!



Computing

The Computing faculty interhouse competition this term was a Riddler themed cryptography challenge. Students had to collate 26 symbols that corresponded to a letter of the alphabet. Students across all year groups engaged really well. They searched high and low around the school to gather all of the symbols and Mrs Watson was inundated with students asking for passwords.
