Interfaith Week

Interfaith week is held annually across the UK to strengthen relations between different faith groups in our communities. Interfaith Week

2019 was from 10th to 17th November and the RE Faculty at Brownedge marked the week with a number of activities and workshops.

On Tuesday and Wednesday, we welcomed Preston based Muslim women's group Sister4sisters into school. All pupils from year 8 and year 10 took part in 3 workshops; learning about the 5 pillars, the fundamental duties of Muslims – including prayer, pilgrimage and fasting during Ramadan. They had the opportunity to try foods that the prophet Muhammad enjoyed eating, and wear traditional clothing, headscarves, and veils. Students had the opportunity to ask any questions they

wanted and were fascinated to learn about halal perfume and toothpaste! Pupils asked interesting and thoughtful questions about subjects as diverse as dress rules for Muslim women, halal food, pilgrimages, prayer, and the

footballer Mo Salah!

Two of our Muslim students asked if they could share their own experiences of life as a young Muslim and each delivered a powerpoint, brought in different items related to their faith, and fielded probing and challenging questions from their fascinated classmates for an hour! Well done to these students!

Year 9 reflected on the things different faiths have in common. Students produced some very thought-provoking pieces of work, explaining what their peers would realise about them if they walked in their shoes.

Year 7 enjoyed learning about the Sikh concept of 'sewa' – selfless service, and 'langar' which is a community kitchen. Students then planned and celebrated their own langar meal. Our chaplain Rachael and Mrs Oddie had a very busy week as they were invited to all the langar meals!

All in all, a successful, exciting and thought-provoking week, enjoyed by students and staff!





Red Wednesday

On 27th November, our school came together to raise awareness for 'Red Wednesday' - a day when the Church prays for Christians who are persecuted for their faith. In the Chapel over lunchtime, students wrote postcards to be sent around the world to those who are not free to practise their faith. After school, members of our Year 7 and Year 8 Chaplaincy GIFT Team attended Mass at St. Mary's Church Brownedge. Here, the GIFT Team said readings and led a reflection for the congregation, where we reflected on the importance of being united in faith.





Tree Planting

In November, as part of our ongoing pledge to help fight for the future of our beautiful planet gifted to us by God, Year 7 pupils and our Eco Warrior group planted 210 trees on Higham Hill, the area of ground next to the school's 3G Astroturf. The saplings were kindly donated by The Woodland Trust and included a variety of trees including blackthorn, oak, hazel, birch and rowan.

The aim of the project was twofold. Firstly, to live out the Pope's calling outlined in Laudato Si, calling us to acknowledge the urgency of our environmental challenges and to join him in embarking on a new path to care for our **Common Home**.

Secondly, to attempt to offset some of the carbon produced in school. We wanted to give our pupils the opportunity to make a positive contribution for the planet and by planting these trees, we made our attempt to support a solution to climate change. A huge thank you to Mr Robson, Mr S Wilson and their team for inspiring our community to come together and leave a lasting legacy for future generations to enjoy.



Knife Crime and County Lines

Year 9 had a visit this term from the community police team to look at what county lines is and how young people can be affected. There is a growing number of young people who have been groomed by gangs to carry illegal drugs, money and weapons for criminals. Pupils in school looked at the risks of becoming a 'mule' and being involved in gangs, and how to spot the signs of grooming by criminals.

In November, PC Lee, who is an armed police commander, spoke to Year 9 about his experience of dealing with knife crime. PC Lee educated pupils about the law on carrying weapons and what the consequences can be as a result of carrying a knife.



Lancashire Schools` Football Year 9

Equality and Diversity group

The Equality and Diversity group (EDG) meet weekly. Our aim is to ensure that everyone in our school community feels respected, loved, equal and special, just as God created us to be. Our group has begun their work by marking World Mental Health Day in September and Anti-Bullying week in October.

For World Mental Health day we handed out stickers, affirmation cards, chocolates and fruit to students and staff in school to spread love and positivity. We also created a presentation for forms about how to stay mentally well. In chapel we created a 'mindfulness zone' for pupils to come and find some peace and stillness in their busy week.



In Anti-Bullying Week we marked the week with an 'odd socks' day. Wearing odd socks reminded pupils that we are all different, special and unique. We also ran an inter-house competition to design a school anti-bullying poster and pupils made odd socks in forms to represent themselves, which have been turned into a bunting display. During this week the school launched 'report it' boxes. If pupils are concerned about themselves, or anyone else, then they can report it anonymously in the boxes situated in library or on the RE corridor, or online via our school website.



Trampolining

On Saturday 7th December 2019, Eve Ashbrook, Lucy Wright, Natasha Vickers and Jade Vickers represented our school in the regional trampolining competition. The standard of the competition was extremely high, however; our girls were up to the challenge. Natasha finished 13/52, Eve finished 9/29, and Lucy absolutely smashed it and finished top of the pile winning her event. In doing so, she qualified for the next round nationally. Well done Lucy, an outstanding achievement.

All Saints' Day

On 1st November, we celebrated 'All Saints' Day'. On this day the Church is called to think especially about our heavenly friends, the Saints. Throughout the week, we held activities in the chapel, where students could learn more about their House Saints, find a new Saint that can help them with their struggles, and find out how it is that we are called to be Saints. The day ended with the celebration of Mass by Fr. Mark, where we prayed particularly for those who are no longer with us.



Act of Kindness

In early December Mrs Oddie received a card from a member of the local community. The card read "Returning home from the village I was very hesitant at crossing the road, as it can be very busy at certain times. A young student very kindly assisted me and would have walked further but I didn't need that help. I think she said her name - when asked -was Susan, about 13-15 years I would guess, but I forget it. Perhaps at 94 years of age I may be excused. One hears so much about the indifference of young students - but not this time."

Inspirational talk from Forbes Solicitors

On Friday 29th of November, school welcomed two inspirational speakers from the legal profession. Mr Paolo Passerini (partner and solicitor) and Miss Bethany Wilson (trainee solicitor) from Forbes solicitors, specialise in crime. They gave a talk to all year groups about the implications and future consequences of being involved in things like public order offences, sending malicious communications which cause offence, carrying a weapon and physical assault.

Mr Passerini focused his talk on the legal ramifications of being accused of a crime, being arrested and potentially ending up in court. Pupils were amazed to hear that they could receive a visit from the police if they are reported for sending a malicious communication which causes offence to another person. Mr Passerini also made it clear to pupils that hitting someone who has hit you is not self defence. It is still classed as assault if you could have walked away and reported it. Pupils were mesmerised by Mr Passerini's links to cases he has worked on in the past and is currently working on.



Miss Wilson spoke to the pupils about how she had to go over and above studying hard at school, college and University, to secure a training post as a trainee solicitor. When she applied for her training post at Forbes, 200 other people applied. Most applicants for such a career path will have 10+ GCSE's at levels 7-9, 3 Good A level grades and 1st or 2nd class degrees. How does an employer sift through all those applications and separate out the better candidates? She spoke to pupils about getting involved in extra-curricular activities, revising hard for exam assessments, applying for summer work experience opportunities (paid and unpaid) and pushing themselves to be the best they can be, both in and out of the classroom.



America Ski Trip 2020

Where has the time gone? Over two years ago this trip was set up, and due to phenomenal demand, we have a party of 112 bodies travelling to the East Coast of America to Ski New Hampshire and the resorts of Cannon and Loon. This will be followed by a two day visit to New York City including journeys to Liberty Island and the Memorial Fountains at Ground Zero, and climbs up to the Top of the Rock and the Empire State Building followed by an evening meal in Time Square. Over four weeks pupils gathered information and produced detailed reports on their relatives. History detectives in the making!

Week one – Research.

This was all about talking to family members and deciding who they could research, asking questions about their military life or civilian career. If a pupil could not find a relative who was involved in the Second World War, four famous people were added to the list: Eric Stanley Lock famous for having 'most kills' in the Battle of Britain, Roald Dahl writer, Ian Fleming the creator of James Bond and finally Vera Lynn, famous as a wartime singer and forces sweetheart.

Week two - Really!

With information gathering going great guns (see what I did there?) pupils became enthralled with past lives lived. Details about their great grand-parents' or grandparents' experiences, tales of how couples met, articles uncovered from newspapers and photographs of young brave men and women now being shared to a younger generation.

Week 3 – Relationships

I was often stopped on corridors and asked to look at their family tree as in some way they felt they had a real connection with their family and the war, this was not just something they studied in a classroom; they had a tangible connection.

Week 4 - Rewards

Brownedge General Election

In the run up to the National Elections held on 12th December, pupils at Brownedge were challenged to think about Democracy and Politics. Each pupil attended an assembly at which the importance of our democratic process and the effects on all our lives of decisions made in Parliament were emphasised.

The pupils were provided with a handout giving a brief overview of the five main political parties and a guide to where they could find more information. It was decided to hold the school 'election' on the 10th December. In the run up, many pupils became engaged (probably for the first time) in some of the big questions that they will need to engage with in adult life and there were many political

discussions.

All pupils received a voting slip, but to mirror real elections as closely as possible they needed to actively enter their vote in 'Ballot Boxes' run by Year 11 'returning officers' led by Harvey Savigar in the main hall at break and lunch time.

The outcome...a 52% 'turnout' (average UK turnout over the last 50 years is around 63%). Our results Labour 53%, Conservative 21%, Lib Dem 11%, Brexit Party 8% and, perhaps surprisingly, Green Party 7%.
