We were delighted to welcome our third Stonewall Role Model, helicopter pilot Caroline Paige, to school on 3 October. Caroline has been a navigator for the RAF and served 35 years in the Royal Air Force, flying tours of duty in Iraq and Afghanistan. She has also been part of the security rapid response team protecting the Pope on his tour of European countries.

Caroline is a trans woman and spoke about her life and experiences in an inspirational way. Her key messages are: Follow your dreams; believe in yourself, and let your light shine.

University of Manchester STEM Trip

On the 3rd October a group of Year 9 and Year 10 students attended the Dalton lecture at the University of Manchester. This year the lecture was given by a leading professor of biochemistry on the theme of 'Making the Tiniest Machines'. The students learnt how modern technology and chemical



synthesis is being used to create tiny machines that have many applications in the field of medicine. One of our pupils was picked to take part in a demonstration and all pupils gained an invaluable insight into how current techniques are being used to combat diseases. We even bumped into a few former pupils who have gone onto study science subjects at college.

Interfaith Week

Year 7 had a taste of various faiths by getting to meet and question faith representatives from Hinduism, Bah'ai, Islam and the Salvation Army. They asked many questions and explored the impact that faith can have on people.

They really enjoyed picking up artefacts and dressing in traditional Muslim dress.

30 Year 9 pupils visit the Jewish Museum in Manchester. They took part in a very interactive morning that examined Jewish beliefs and practices. The museum was once an active Synagogue so pupils were to explore the features and functions of a Jewish Synagogue. The week finished with 30 year 8 pupils going on a tour of some of the

places of worship in Preston. They visited the Jamea Masjid, which is Preston's largest Mosque. They also visited the Gujarat Hindu Temple and Vajravarahi Kadampa Buddhist Centre. Pupils got to tour these

places of worship, speaker to worshippers and even witness some worship taking place. We were really overwhelmed by the beautiful places we saw and the very warm welcome that we received by our hosts! One pupil commented: "We should all visit if we can! I was so surprised

at how welcoming and loving people were. It was surprising how many things we all have in common too. I would describe the trip as very opening. It opened my eyes to some of the different faiths that make up our amazing community!"

PAPYRUS Walk

Two pupils from school participated in a charity walk on Sunday 10th September for PAPYRUS (the national charity dedicated to the prevention of young suicide). Gary Dawson and Olivia Waite participated in a 10 mile walk raising money for the charity aimed at tackling the stigma of young suicide by encouraging young people to seek help and support, and encourage people in the local area to talk through the taboo.

Gary and Olivia were the youngest of all the walkers which ranged up to people in their 50's. They completed the walk with enthusiasm and dedication and were "fantastic representatives for the younger generation, and representatives for your school."






Hope in the Future
