Media City UK Trip

The Geography Department took 36 Year 10 students to experience first-hand the amazing regeneration of Salford Quays and the new Media City development.

Students were not only rewarded with authentic Manchester rain, but also with the opportunity to carry out field work in preparation for their GCSE examination and their Paper 3 studies in particular. This included environmental quality surveys, land use surveys, pedestrian counts and questionnaires.

The regeneration has created a world class Creative Hub, creating 27,000 jobs in the area and has attracted over 250 different media companies, including the BBC and ITV. The students particularly enjoyed how modern it all looked, as well as being able to find the new Blue Peter garden. This is what we call in geography a "super learning day".

Eco Group

Pope Francis says that all life depends on clean air and water, and a stable and reliable climate. As a chemist by background and with a team of scientists and an observatory at the Vatican, **the Pope is clear that the climate emergency is the greatest threat to life our Earth has ever seen – and that it is caused by humans**. With this in mind, we have, as a school, taken a stand ourselves; in the hope of improving our stewardship and taking responsibility for the environment through our own actions in school, so that we don't just talk about stewardship, but act it out, by consciously changing our behaviours and having an impact locally.
