# Pupil Premium 2016-2017

The Pupil Premium is an amount of money allocated by the government to schools for:

- Children of statutory school age from low income families who are known to be eligible for free school meals (FSM)
- Children who have been looked after continuously for more than six months
- Children whose parents are currently working in the armed forces

In 2013-2014 the level of the Pupil Premium was £900 and in 2014/15 the level of premium was raised to £1300 per pupil.

The DFE offer the following guidance on how the Pupil Premium is to be spent:

'In most cases the Pupil Premium is allocated to schools and is clearly identifiable. It is for schools to decide how the Pupil Premium, allocated to schools per FSM pupil, is spent, since they are best placed to assess what additional provision should be made for the individual pupils within their responsibility...[Schools] will be held accountable for how they have used the additional funding to support pupils from low income families.'

The purpose of the information on this page is to inform parents, carers and governors how much Pupil Premium has been received by the school for 2016/2017, how it will be spent and the impact previous spending has had on pupils' achievement including social and emotional wellbeing which is significant barrier to learning for many disadvantaged pupils.

At Buckingham Primary Academy 46% of pupils are eligible for Free School Meals, which is significantly above the National Average of 26.7% (2013).

# The impact of the pupil premium grant resulted in the following:

## **Breakfast Club**

The Breakfast Club register during the weeks April/May 2016 showed that 106 different pupils attended the club and 51 of those (48%) were Pupil Premium.

### Impact on Attendance

Attendance has increased to 95% for disadvantaged pupils, which is now in line with non disadvantaged pupils in the school. This is due to a more rigorous system being implemented through the Learning Links Worker / Attendance Officer who contacts families directly just after the beginning of the school day if their child is reported as being absent. Also, families who have difficulty getting their child to school in the morning are offered a place at breakfast club. This has had a significant impact on key disadvantaged families whose attendance was below 90% or there were issues with persistence lateness. A number of families have benefitted from the support and there has been a significant increase in their attendance. Other families have also benefitted from places at after school clubs. This is due to the work of the Learning Links Worker, Wellbeing Team and specialist interventions to ensure families were supported in challenging circumstances.

## Afterschool Clubs – Analysis of Summer 2016

The average percentage of Pupil Premium children attending after school clubs in comparison to non-pupil premium children is just under 50% across the whole school. The table tennis team are now through the finals in their category putting them above another leading school in Hull.

### **Music Tuition**

53% of pupils were in receipt of pupil premium in Y4 and had the opportunity to play at the City Hall in Hull in front of other schools. The expectation is that a number of pupils will continue to learn a musical instrument in 2016/17. Pupils who choose to continue to learn a musical instrument in Y5 and Y6 had the opportunity of playing at another large concert hall in Hull as part of a music festival in the Autumn Term 2015. This was a great achievement for the pupils and had a direct impact on their confidence and resilience.





## Swimming

53% of pupils who participated in swimming lessons were in receipt of pupil premium. All children were able to swim after participating in an intensive swimming programme.

Progress at the end of KS2 at Buckingham Primary Academy demonstrates that the gap is closing for disadvantaged pupils whose progress is increasing in reading, writing and maths.

# Pupil Premium Review of 2015/16

Summary successful approaches:

- Pupil Premium funding is ring fenced to spend on the target group
- A high level of expectations are maintained for the target group
- The School thoroughly analyse which pupils are underachieving and why
- The School uses evidence to allocate funding to have a positive impact using a range of strategies.
- The School knows that high quality teaching is vital, rather than the use of interventions to compensate for poor teaching.

- There is effective use of achievement data to check interventions' impact and to make adjustments where necessary
- There has been a substantial investment to ensure there are highly trained support staff working across the school to target specific individuals / groups.
- There is a senior leader with oversight of how Pupil Premium funding is being spent and this is monitored regularly.
- Teacher's / staff know which pupils are eligible for pupil premium
- The school is able to demonstrate impact
- Governors and Trustees are involved





## **Background**

## **Barriers to learning**

There have been a number of barriers to learning identified through analysis and research over the previous academic year.

- Preparedness to learn and ability to fully participate without school intervention
- Parental support including learning resources (and poor community adult literacy and numeracy skills)
- Learning dispositions and low aspirations
- Speech and language deficits
- Low attainment on entry to school
- Under developed cultural literacy

To meet the needs of pupils in receipt of pupil premium the above factors have been taken as key drivers. Spending allocation for 2016 – 2017 is set out below.
