Definition

To treat someone unfairly or cruelly, especially because of their sexual orientation, ethnicity, religion, or political beliefs

Persecute

Why it is wrong to persecute

People are entitled to be who they are and believe what they want, as long as they aren't hurting anyone else.

What does LGBTQ stand for?

L - Lesbian (female attracted to other females)

G - Gay (male attracted to other males)

B - Bisexual (people of either sex attracted to people of either sex)

T - Transgender (people whose biological sex does not match their gender identity)

Q - Queer (an umbrella term for anything OTHER THAN cisgendered - when your biological sex matches your gender identity - and heterosexual - attraction to the opposite sex)

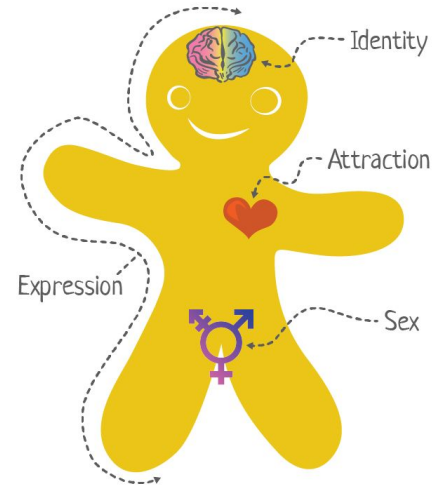
Sex vs. Gender vs. Sexuality - Genderbread Person

The Genderbread Person v4 by its pronounced METROsexual sound



○ means a lack of what's on the right side.

○ → Woman-ness
○ → Man-ness

Gender Expression

○ → Femininity
○ → Masculinity

Anatomical Sex

○ → Female-ness
○ → Male-ness

Identity ≠ Expression ≠ Sex
Gender ≠ Sexual Orientation

How can YOU respond to HBT bullying if you see it?

DO:

- Stay calm. Overreacting will give the bully the reaction they want.
- Be brave. A simple conversation can make a big difference!
- Be curious. Ask them if they realise they are being offensive - they might not!
- Be kind. People who bully were often bullied in the past. Show empathy.
- Support the person being bullied. They need a friend!

DON'T:

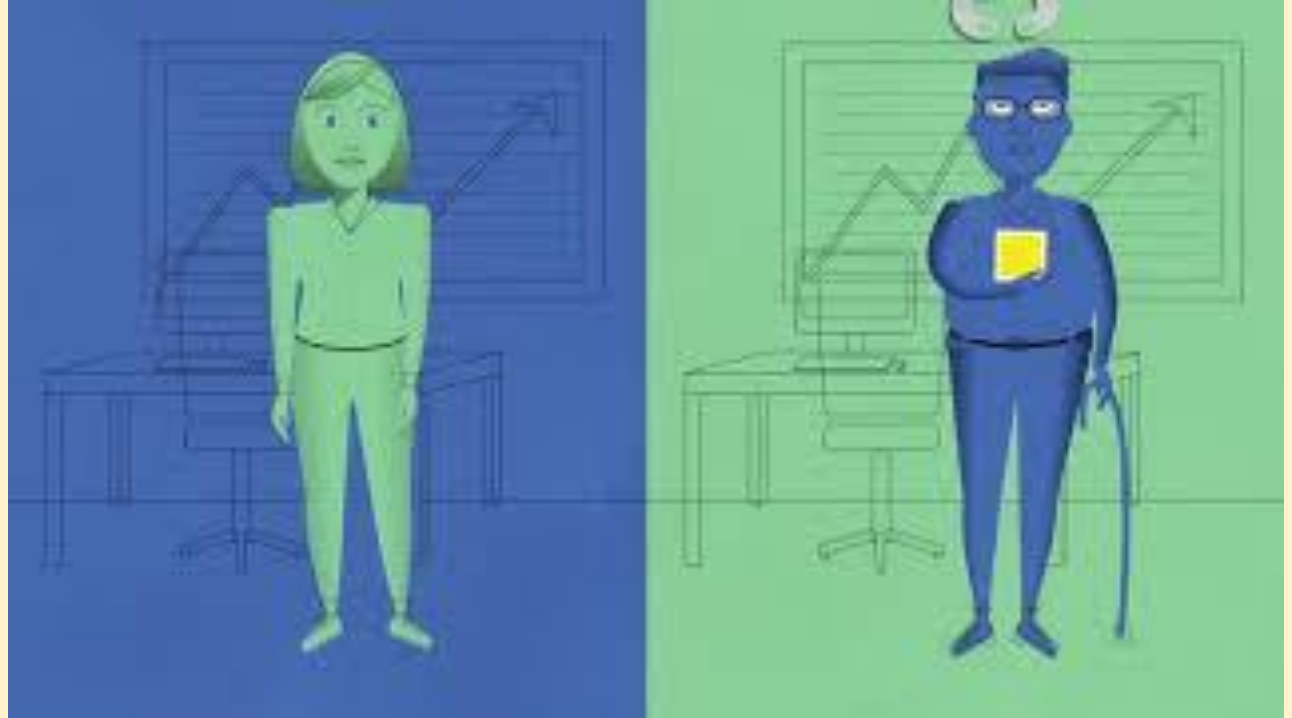
- ...be rude or offensive. This will make the problem worse.
- ...lecture them. People are much more likely to participate in a two-way conversation.
- ...let it slide. Use the moment to educate the bully and stand with the person being bullied.
- ...laugh at them. They have feelings too.
- ...be afraid to involve a teacher, parent, or other adult to support the situation.

If you see a big problem or it keeps happening, talk to a trusted adult.
