



Pupil and parent survey results (62% response rate)




From the 62% response received to the travel survey, the main two choices of travel mode are walking (43%) and car alone/car share (47%). There is currently no cycle or scooter storage at the school which may be why numbers here are low. Additionally, only 6% are choosing to choose Park & Stride (parking a little further away and walking the last few minutes) which the school have now started to promote to parents to improve safety for pedestrians near the school gates.


The main reasons for choice of travel mode by respondents was the fact that they live near school and the distance to be travelled was small (34%) with 20% citing that it was easy for them and their parents. Three other main reasons featured including 14% saying their parents were on their way to work, 13% saying the distance was far and 12% saying they had to take siblings on to other schools.


We have similar rates, though slightly reduced, of car use (49%) and walking (42%) on the way home from school with a slightly reduced Park & Stride figure of 3%. There is an increase in scooting and cycling this end of the day.


When comparing travel to and from school, the results are virtually identical with a disappointing 46% of children travelling by sustainable means (walking, cycling, scooting) both ends of the day.


Again, the highest reason for mode of travel choice is a short distance to travel to school (32%) with the next most popular at 22% being easy for them or their parents. Only 13% cited a long distance or employment affecting their choices.


The reasons for travel choices in the morning and afternoon were very similar with a maximum negligible 2% change apart from the "other" column. Reasons for "other" included exercise and grandparents picking up.




When comparing questions 1 and 5, there is a good increase in the number of people who would like to cycle and scoot to school at Castle Hill Primary School (Greenbank), 22% and 9% respectively. This is offset by a reduction in children wishing to come by car alone (31%). Based on these figures, it would be advised for the school to consider replacing the old cycle storage and providing scooter storage in the future if it could be protected from vandalism.

Sadly only 52% live within a mile of the school with 42% between 1-3 miles of the school and 6% being over 3 miles away. This reduces the opportunity for sustainable travel, particularly for those with the greatest distance, which is why the school should continue to encourage Park & Stride and consider cycling for those 1-3 miles away.




It is encouraging to note that a large number of children own a bicycle (91%) and, of those, 87% of them wear a cycle helmet. This indicates that the installation of cycle storage at the school would be likely to increase the uptake of cycling as part of the travel to school choices. Bikeability training would educate the children about the importance of wearing a helmet.




Five children claim to have a bus/train pass which makes this choice possible for travel to and from school, as well as the presence of bus stops on the road outside the school.




Only 14% of the children at Castle Hill Primary School (Greenbank) already wear fluorescent or reflective clothing. However, 59% indicated that they would like to do so in the future which indicates a Be Bright Be Seen campaign would be worth running at the school and possibly looking into the provision of reflective tags or hi visibility items.

The 3% of children who say they take part in a walking bus must do so on a voluntary basis as there is no formal one set up at school at present. It is encouraging that 14% would like to be involved in one with a further 5% keen to be involved in supporting this. The school should be encouraged to promote this initiative with parental support.

Additional Comments from Parents:

Although school is close by, I need to drive to work and back and don't have time to walk home after drop off or park and walk to school to collect us. My daughter is dropped off by car as we have to drop her brother at another school Bikers they don't ring their bells Car share is the only option, not enough time before work Cycyle paths down the Roman Road would be great. The road is too busy and dangerous to cycle on A pedestrian crossing on Winklebury Way please Dog poo - people don't pick it up Double yellow lines along Winklebury Way would be helpful Focused on travelling to work He would love to cycle to and from school, but he has been told he is not allowed to by the school I go in a big group with my child-minder I have my four daughters in three different schools which makes our journey to school a torture I would appreciate designated disabled car parking spaces so that I could, along with other parents of disabled children, park close to school when necessary I would like to travel by Park & Stride If the school had a bike shed it could help to store the bikes safely instead of parents carrying them home (3) I'm very concerned at the speed of traffic on Kenilworth Road when trying to cross with 4 children. It is very dangerous at times. Also witnessed children riding to school across this road without a helmet. It is difficult to accommodate walking/sharing when we are working parents. It would be nice if there was somewhere to leave scooters so that in the summer scooting would be an option

It's difficult to accommodate walking/ sharing schemes when we are working parents but understand why it's beneficial

Kenilworth Road is very dangerous as very fast (above speed limit) - crossing is very difficult.

Most of the time we're late

My daughter is a morning monitor so I drop her on my way to work. If possible, I walk to school to collect her in the afternoons

My son has to travel to and from school by car due to time constraints as both parents work and we live too far from school to be able to walk there

Not enough bicycle paths

One thing that influence the way we travel is having to go to work straight after drop off - we don't have the twenty minutes to walk home to then go to work.

Please let parents know that parking on hatched areas is inconvenient and causes additional congestion Please produce a bike rack for the children to lock up their bikes

School car park needs to have a new risk assessment as parking has become difficult; zebra crossing is no longer clear for drivers to recognise therefore very unsafe for children to cross

The hatching in the school car park is frequently abused by impatient parents who just make traffic and congestion worse

The kids are very fit

The school is just under a mile away and my 6 year old brother can't walk for very long as he is disabled The weather when its wet, I don't like getting wet

There's not enough bicycle paths

We live 2.9 miles from the school. My daughter is too young to cycle. Would consider car sharing or parking and walking with a friend in Winklebury.

We see dogs, no cycle path

We try to walk + stride however I have to work for three days a week and need to be at work straight after I drop my children at school so we never park outside the school but need to be within a reasonable walk so I can go to school.

We walk everyday

We walk on the days when we can. If the car park is full mum will always wait for a space. She may be late but I know she'll be on her way


We would like the dog poo picked up (2)

We could start school a different time to stop the traffic with people who go to work



Staff survey results (69% response rate)




As is the case with many schools, teaching staff tend to drive to school as they don't, in general, live near their work. They also have busy lives and often driving tends to be the most convenient and efficient way to travel. It is good to see that 9% of staff walk and 14% cycle to school which may be more of the administrative and catering staff as well as teaching assistants who tend to live closer to their work. Unusually, it should be noted that a number of staff work across both Castle Hill Primary sites – Greenbank and Rooksdown – and need to commute between these sites during the day meaning that they use their cars more than just at the start and end of the day for work commitments.

When comparing how staff travel to school with how they would like to travel to school, it can be seen that more people would like to travel sustainably – walking or on a bike – with fewer people using the car. Additionally, 8% would like to use the bus or train.

Q4 What improvements could be made to improve your journey to school?

- Cycle storage, cycle to school scheme (3)
- Less traffic (when crossing Rooksdown Avenue) (2)
- Would like school buses for my children and then I could walk to work!
- More reliable and frequent bus service from Basingstoke Bus Station to Winklebury
- I live too far away. You can train/bus but connections are not that reliable. Timely process which I can't easily fit into family life
- Crossing Rooksdown Avenue path too close to the roundabout on the A339
- Improved footpaths, particularly the one going under the railway line by the leisure centre. It's dark, overgrown and often covered in dog mess

- Arrival time if delayed can be stressful in that it gets very congested
- I don't want to use my car it's pricey and traffic is heavy
- Rain!
- School transport not provided so I have to use my car to take children to two different schools in Basingstoke before travelling to work
- Traffic congestion around Basingstoke (2)
- We travel early otherwise we sit in traffic jams hate wasting time
