World Thinking Day at Barnacre Road

At Barnacre Road Primary School we encourage pupils to be involved with activities and community events out of school.

Cooking for the Homeless

Our Year 8 students trialled our first 'cook for the homeless,' making 57 exceptional vegetable curries and rice from scratch! As you can see, they were all labelled and packaged, and Mrs Rogerson had the pleasure of taking them to Lancaster & District Homeless Action Service (LDHAS) the next day as they were using them for lunch!

LDHAS staff were very grateful for the donations. They provide 3 meals a day for homeless people in the Lancaster and Morecambe area. They have 80 homeless people working with them and on average serve food to 25 adults at a time. 80% of the local homeless are male and the average age is 40. The meals we provided were very gratefully received and we hope to cook for them every half term. We are going for a BIG COOK on our upcoming Enrichment Day 2, creating 200+ meals.





Year 11 Intervention and Revision Success

With the summer exams fast approaching, we have created a wide range of intervention and revision/support programmes for our Year 11 students. Our current 'phase' has been focussed on students building upon their mock series 1 results and getting prepared for the mock series 2. The programme has included lunchtime sessions, after-school sessions and some in-lesson intervention, as well as extended core lessons for all. An excellent 83% of the students in Year 11 have attended lunch and after-school sessions. We've been very impressed with our students' willingness to commit to the extra support available, and would like to thank our staff for offering their time so generously to support their students.

In addition to the in-school sessions, we ran mock exam booster sessions to support student revision over the recent half term. Eleven sessions were offered, with attendance at English, History and Geography being particularly high.

To reward our students for their attendance and hard work, they have all received a booklet that outlines the sessions available to them and they receive stamps every time they attend. This allows students, staff and parents to keep track of which sessions have been attended, and if students receive enough stamps they can earn free food, entry to prize draws and discounts on their prom tickets.



Oxford University Visit

On Wednesday 31st January, Molly Lockwood of Queen's College, Oxford University, visited school to deliver a talk to 50 Year 10 students. Molly talked to us about university life, finances, types of university, how to apply, and which courses are available. She also talked about Oxford University specifically, busting some commonly held myths about top universities being more expensive than others and about the idea that the best education is only open to some.

The students who attended represented the school well and asked some very good questions. It was great to see so many students with such high aspirations.

Phase 2 building work

The replacement of our three-storey block has come about in two phases. Phase 1 was completed and used by science, food technology, design and technology and IT classes from September 2023. We are now in the middle of the development of phase 2. The ground floor will be five new maths classrooms, the upper floor for the teaching of English.

This build is modular, meaning that the building is made out of blocks, which are made in the Collinson's factory and then driven to Central Lancaster High School on low loading HGV lorries ready to be assembled into our new building.

















The modules are hoisted by an enormous crane into position and fixed together. The first module was laid on 5th December, and over the next two weeks a further 31 modules were delivered and craned into position. As you can imagine, there is no room for error when putting the modules together.











All the modules were delivered in a protective wrapping, so the assembled modules looked like a giant present, which was then opened to reveal the building underneath. Because of the pre-

assembly technique used, the building already had windows and doors, so within a couple of days the roofers had made sure the building was water-tight and could dry out.
















Once put together, the internal walls will start to be put into place, turning the empty shell into a building that we can be truly proud of. It is anticipated that work will be complete around May 2024 so rooms can be fitted out for teaching from September 2024.

Maths Master Classes

55 of our Year 11 pupils attended two large lecture style 3-hour maths master classes in the main school hall at the start of February, to focus on some of the grades 7-9 elements of the higher maths paper. Sessions were delivered by three different members of our maths department and pupils enjoyed breakfast and break time treats while discussing some of the work they had been focusing on. It was excellent to hear some of the positive feedback from pupils, who have asked for similar sessions to be run to support their ongoing learning and progress.

February revision sessions

We have been delighted to see so many of our Year 11 pupils attend February revision sessions for English, Maths, Science, Geography and History. Nearly half of the year group attended at least one session. Classes were 90 minutes in length and were supporting pupils to effectively prepare for the final set of mock examinations, which started at the end of February.



National Apprenticeship Week 5th – 9th February 2024

During National Apprenticeship Week, we had a number of events celebrating and promoting apprenticeships in all their forms. On Monday, we held an apprenticeship fair with representatives from the British Army, the RAF, JTL and Lancashire Training Services, which was open to pupils from all year groups. It was great to see pupils taking an active interest in their future possibilities by attending this in their lunch time.

Year 11 had an assembly from the NHS, who offer 350 different apprenticeship roles in clinical and non-clinical roles. We were able to find out about alternative routes to careers such as midwifery rather than the traditional university pathway.

Year 7-10 found out about how apprenticeships work and the main differences between them and full time A Level or Level 3 college courses in assemblies from Kendal College and Lancaster and Morecambe College. It was particularly interesting to hear from a first-year apprentice about his experiences to date.

A group of Year 11 students also had an application support session from Ask Apprenticeships, who complimented them on their excellent listening skills and behaviour. During this session they were able to find out how to make their application stand out from the crowd and get tips about being successful in interviews.



Lancaster and Morecambe Vocational Career Taster Sessions

For additional support in their learning and to improve confidence, a small group of Year 11 pupils visited Lancaster and Morecambe College to participate in taster sessions and learn about the range of career opportunities available.

The pupils attended workshops on subjects including Animal Studies, Sport Science, Beauty Therapy, Hairdressing, and Hospitality & Catering. They baked delicious pizzas to take home, handled a range of animals and engaged in sporting activities alongside existing college students.

Over the course of the day, the pupils' confidence and ability levels increased, and they had a great time experiencing college life.

Upon returning to school, the pupils shared that they felt more inspired to work towards their chosen career pathways. We also received an email from a parent to say that her son had returned home with a very optimistic outlook on his future.





Head's High Tea

At the 'Head's High Tea' we talked about how our life at Central is and what we have enjoyed since moving from primary school. All the teachers made us feel welcome and we enjoyed the cakes and biscuits!

We talked about things we really enjoyed at school, and we talked about our interests in and out of school. We all loved it! 


National Apprenticeship week

In National Apprenticeship week, we celebrated our strong connections with local employers and education and training providers, by inviting them into school to give our students a fantastic insight into life as an apprentice and all the benefits it can bring. We have welcomed lots of visitors over the week, including ex-students of MBA to deliver assemblies, workshops and lunch time drop ins. We hope this week has inspired our students to explore this exciting pathway and that they feel more informed about their future choices.









We Are With You RisKit programme

We are the first school in the North of England to launch the We Are With You RisKit Programme with our Year 10 pupils.

The programme has already been successful in the South of England and has been evaluated by researchers at the University of Kent. Findings have been extremely positive, showing reductions in a range of risk-taking behaviours where young people have taken part.

All Year 10 students have taken part in a survey and then some participants have been identified for further group work. Young people take part in 12 weeks of activities, including 3 one to one sessions, that look at all aspects of risk taking behaviour. Students learnt to set boundaries and keep themselves safe.

This is part of our growing early help offer at Morecambe Bay Academy as we seek to ensure that pupils are educated to keep themselves safe, well and happy as young adults.

We are pleased to announce that the RisKit programme is going to be delivered at Morecambe Bay Academy over the next few months. The programme, which looks to help young people make more positive life and behavioural choices, is being offered to students in Year 10.

Nikki Morris, Programme Lead, had this to say about delivering the programme at Morecambe Bay Academy:




