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

THE CLASS BOOK REVIEW Anna and the Swallow Man, by Gavriel Savit

The story is set in wartime Poland, back in 1939. It features a girl named Anna, daughter of a professor, who knows many languages and is a sensible girl. But one day her father has to go away for a few hours and he never comes back. This innocent girl has to survive in a world of war and all seems lost until the Swallow Man comes to rescue her. He takes her name away from her and swears he wil protect her, only if she will obey his simple rules. One of them is that he will not let anyone know who he is. For Anna he is a great man, always sensible and careful.

Gavriel presents their relationship as ar honest one. Anna can ask anything she wants from her Swallow Man and he will answer, normally. The innocence of a child in this story towards safety, they have to dodge Germa and Russian soldiers, often fleeing from bullets. Things change as Anna grows, and she begins to question ner hero. Who is the Swallow Man and why is he here, helping Anna?

This is a perfect novel from the undoubtedly talented Gavriel Savit. It makes you want to read more and more. It is very well structured and beautifully and carefully written. I would have rated it 15 stars if it was possible, but really I would rate it 5 stars.
