Headteacher's Comment

Dear Families,



I hope this newsletter finds you well. It has been lovely to notice the mornings becoming a little lighter on our way to school and the evenings staying brighter for longer — before we know it, spring will be upon us!

As always, it has been a jam-packed week at school for all our children. You will have seen lots of photographs of learning taking place on our school Facebook page. If you do not already follow us, please do take a look, as it is a great way to see learning in action, as well as clubs and other activities, with regular updates from each year group.

Last week, we shared information via Facebook and the school website about our new *Reading Reward* initiative. This encourages children to read at home regularly and record their reading as they move along their class reading road. At different milestones, children earn rewards such as certificates, bookmarks, VIP library Time and a special golden coin to use in our fantastic book vending machines. We have received some lovely feedback about this initiative and are already seeing many children proudly earning their rewards. You will find some photographs of this further down the newsletter.

Another exciting development in our Chapelford curriculum is our focus on developing children's oracy skills. Research consistently shows that strong speech and language skills have a significant impact on educational attainment. Nationally, there is a picture of delayed speech and language development on entry to school, and in response, we have designed a bespoke and explicit oracy curriculum informed by research, Ofsted guidance and expertise from Voice 21 and the Education Endowment Foundation (EEF). This curriculum supports all aspects of speaking and listening, including retelling stories, role play, drama, debates, turn-taking and explanation. Each year group has clear termly outcomes linked to curriculum learning, demonstrating that oracy is a skill that can be developed progressively across subjects. We are passionate about building children's confidence in speaking and listening and have invested in high-quality resources, such as classroom sound charts, to further support this work. Please see pictures below for further information on how you can support your child with oracy at home.

I would also like to thank the parents who attended last night's Year 2 information evening, which focussed on how learning is supported in class and the strategies and vocabulary we use. I hope you found this helpful. Please do not hesitate to contact your child's class teacher if you have any further questions.



Year 3 Explore Plants, Wildlife, and the Wonders of Nature!

Year 3 had an exciting and action-packed week, full of hands-on learning about plants and the natural world! Last week, Classes 10 and 11 visited RHS Garden Bridgewater on Monday, with Class 12 following on Thursday, as part of their Science topic on plants, their life cycles and the different parts of a plant.

During the visit, the children participated in a series of engaging workshops. They began by learning all about seed dispersal, discovering the different ways seeds travel in nature. Each child had the opportunity to plant their own lettuce seed, which they will take home and care for, observing how it grows over time. The children also investigated an oak tree, considering how acorns are dispersed, particularly by squirrels, and thought carefully about how plants and animals interact in nature.

After the workshops, the children explored the beautiful gardens, using their observation skills to spot interesting and unusual plants. They created detailed sketches of the plants they found, demonstrating not only artistic skill but also their growing scientific knowledge. The day ended with a well-deserved break in the play area, giving everyone time to relax after a busy day. Throughout the visit, the children were a credit to Chapelford, fully engaging in the workshops, asking thoughtful questions and impressing staff with how much they could recall and apply from their Science lessons.



Eco Team in Action: Helping Nature at School

Back at school, the excitement continued with the work of our Eco Team, who met with Mrs Farrell to create eco-friendly bird feeders using apples and oranges. The children carefully prepared their feeders and then hung them around the school grounds, helping to attract a variety of birds to visit. This project links perfectly to their upcoming participation in the Big Birdwatch survey, encouraging the children to observe and learn all about local wildlife.

We are so proud to have such dedicated Eco Ambassadors in our school. They work hard to keep Chapelford eco-friendly, showing responsibility, care and leadership in helping protect our environment. Their enthusiasm and commitment set a brilliant example for the whole school community.

There are still spaces available for Tuesdays Eco After-School Club with Mrs Gibbons, where children can continue exploring environmental projects and nature based activities. If you would like your child to join, please let us know!


