READING FLUENCY CHEW STOKE AT SCHOOL

At Chew Stoke we have a love of reading and we aim for our children to develop a love of reading too. Last year we invested in a Phonics programme called Unlocking Letters and Sounds. One strategy this scheme uses to support children's reading fluency is the reading and re-reading of texts. We have noticed that, although in reading records children have read books, they are not showing the fluency and understanding of the text they have read; e.g. they cannot recall characters or plot and they are still heavily relying on segmenting and blending. It is

so important children read and re-read texts, reading them a minimum of three times ideally on three consecutive days. If your child needs to keep a book longer, please do write this in their reading record. Some children may need more than three reads to become fluent with a text.

Reading fluency is what we are promoting through the use of our selected systematic synthetic phonics programme. Reading fluency is the ability to read with accuracy and automaticity, using the appropriate intonation and expression to bring meaning to the words within a text, and subsequently enable the text to make complete sense.

Children must develop fluency to decode, blend and spell to the degree that these are somewhat automatic in nature, freeing up working memory when words or background knowledge of a text is unfamiliar.

Fluency is best achieved through the re-reading of texts and can be most effectively understood through the acquisition of accuracy, automaticity and prosody:

- Accuracy includes decoding and word recognition resulting in reading the words • correctly. (This is the first read when you receive a new phonics book)
- Automaticity requires accuracy and is effortless reading at an appropriate speed. (This is the second read of a phonics book)
- Prosody requires accuracy and leads to variation in volume, smoothness, pace, phrasing and expression. (The third read of a phonics book)

Unlocking Letters and Sounds has used research to develop a progressive phonics programme and, from this research, promotes repeatedly reading a text so that pupils are confident to decode and blend accordingly and can instead focus on the intonation and expression used. The cognitive demands placed upon pupils' working memory that underlie the development of reading fluency means that being familiar with the text itself enables pupils to allocate their working memory resource from decoding to instead practising reading fluency.

All the books we send home are based on your child's recent phonics assessment. If your child after the first and second read is reading with some fluency, please start to model reading and rehearsing together the reading of sentences using prosody (expression) and asking questions to predict, recall key events/ open ended questions which will demonstrate their understanding of what has been read. If your child is finding the books tricky, as they will increase in difficulty throughout the year, please speak to your child's class teacher who will reassess where your child is placed.

We are incredibly grateful for all the reading you are doing at home and we hope this explanation about re-reading texts demonstrates the importance of re-reading to support your child's reading fluency.
