India celebrates Republic Day every January 26th to show pride in their country and its special rules that help everyone live together.

This is an example of Carnatic Music which is a very old and beautiful style of classical music from South India that uses exciting rhythms and soulful melodies.

In Western music, players hold the violin under their chin while standing, but Carnatic players sit on the floor and tuck the violin against their chest to help them slide easily between notes.

These two sisters, Subhalakshmi and Sonal, have practiced together since they were little kids to become amazing masters of the violin and tour regularly - they have performed in London in venues such as the Royal Albert Hall.
