Gardening project is launched

• Key Aims:

- To grow enough fruit and vegetables in the playgrounds to be able to eat them in the school cafeteria and learn about them in the classroom
- To offer children contact with the natural world and learn about where their food comes from
- To provide fun and interesting learning opportunities which are linked to the National Curriculum in subjects such as science, history, geography, art, design and technology and maths
- To give the children an insight into the seasonal nature of food and the variety of foods that can be grown locally
- To reinforce healthy eating messages
- To provide a practical opportunity to learn how important the environment is and to learn about sustainable living
- Through caring for plants and watching them grow, children can learn important skills such as patience, respect and co-operation which fit in with citizenship in the National Curriculum
