


COMPUTING



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FRENCH

It has been a wonderfully productive term in the French Department, with all year groups working hard on their assessments and target tasks. Pupils across the school have shown excellent independence, identifying areas they would like to improve and taking thoughtful steps to develop their skills.

Year 5 have enjoyed learning "All About Me" this term and have also explored the traditions of Christmas in France.

Year 6 have been studying profiles, likes and dislikes, and have produced some truly impressive personal profiles.

Year 7 put their creativity to the test by designing and presenting their own dream schools with imaginative features and persuasive presentations. **Year 8** invented their own sports and showcased them confidently, demonstrating both originality and strong language skills.

To top it all off, we are incredibly proud of the 11 Year 8 pupils selected to take part in the Business Language Champions regional competition at Kings High School in Warwick. Pupils were challenged to create a model hotel, conduct interviews in French, design menus and brochures, and more.

It's been an exciting half term full of creativity, hard work and linguistic adventure.









DT - TEXTILES

Year 5 students have been very excited about making their sock pigs. We have gone from stuffing and sewing the pigs bottom, to adding a blanket and some groups have now added ears and a snout (no more talk of bacon or sausage rolls is allowed!). We will be finishing the project after the Christmas break.

Year 6 have been keeping me busy with a never-ending rotation of rinsing tie-dyed t-shirts and some are adding sponge printed lettering as well. The textiles room is a kaleidoscope of colour and the first batch of t-shirts should be going home just before Christmas.

In **key stage 3** it has been great to see the Year 7 little monster designs come to life - we have donuts, planets, cartoon characters and food.... not to mention the odd 67 monster! In Year 8 students are turning their light designs into real life with students enjoying using the sewing machines and refining their hand sewing skills as they sew a circuit together using conductive thread.

Year 8 Pupils Shine in Interview Skills Lessons

This term, Year 8 pupils have been exploring the concept of identity and what makes them who they are. During the final lessons, pupils have explored how to apply for jobs and how to sell themselves to prospective employers. These lessons introduced pupils to the fundamentals of a successful interview: making a strong first impression, speaking clearly, listening actively, and answering questions thoughtfully. Pupils then had the chance to put these skills into practice through paired activities and mock interviews.

Mrs Thomas was particularly impressed by how quickly pupils embraced the challenge. Many pupils stepped out of their comfort zones, practising everything from maintaining eye contact to structuring detailed, reflective answers. By experiencing interview situations in a supportive classroom environment, Year 8 pupils discovered that interviews can be positive learning experiences rather than something to worry about.

The lessons concluded with group feedback, where pupils shared tips, identified areas for improvement, and celebrated each other's progress. Mrs Thomas noted a noticeable improvement in pupils' self-assurance and communication skills.

Overall, the interview-skills sessions have been a great success, helping Year 8 pupils build valuable life skills they will carry with them well beyond the classroom.



CURRICULUM



ENGLISH

At the end of November, the English team hosted their first Book Fair for many years. During the course of a week, pupils, parents and carers were invited to come along to buy books and stationery to raise money for the school library. We are delighted that as a school reading community we raised over £700 to spend on new books.

The Y8 librarian team all chose some books they'd like to see on the shelves and many of the really popular series such as Diary of a Wimpy Kid, Tom Gates and Dork Diaries will be updated or replaced. In addition, there will be lots of brand-new book titles for our pupils to enjoy.

The library also hosted a busy coffee afternoon during Book Fair week and welcoming many parents, grandparents and carers. Minnie joined us to say hello and pupils had the opportunity to browse and buy books from the book fair, as well as sharing their favourite reads from the library shelves.

We look forward to holding more coffee mornings/afternoons later in the year.






HISTORY

This half term, Year 7 have been exploring the Norman Conquest during 1066, focusing recently on the Bayeux Tapestry and discovering why it is often described as a medieval comic book. Just like a modern graphic novel, the tapestry tells a dramatic story through sequential images, speech-like captions, and vivid action scenes only stitched instead of printed!

Inspired by this, pupils have learned how the tapestry reveals the key events of 1066, from the fight for the English throne, to the Battle Of Hastings itself. Using their knowledge, they have planned and created their own comic-style retellings of their favourite moments from 1066. Each student designed panels, captions, and illustrations to show the build-up to the invasion and its aftermath, echoing the narrative style of the original tapestry.

The finished "Bayeux Comics" are full of creativity, historical detail, and humour. These are a brilliant blend of art and history that brings the story of 1066 to life!




RE

Science & Religion

In RE, pupils in Year 5 & Year 7 have been learning about stewardship and creation. They have explored a variety of different perspectives, including that of Christian scientists like Jennifer Wiseman. Wiseman is a senior astrophysicist at the NASA Goddard Space Flight Center, where she serves as the Senior Project Scientist for the Hubble Space Telescope. It has been brilliant to see pupils' understanding of the relationship between faith and science develop over the course of this topic.

Pupils have discussed how much awe and wonder there is to be found in observing nature and the universe in science, and how this leads to questions of spirituality and belief for many people. As a whole school, we are working on developing pupils' speaking and listening skills.



It has been fantastic to see how so many children have embraced this chance to debate and discuss and to listen so thoughtfully to the perspectives of their peers. We are very proud of them.

Christmas Case Studies

As part of our teaching about Christianity as a global faith, we have been exploring how different Christians around the world celebrate Christmas. Each year group has learned about the traditions and practices of another place:

- Year 5- Lebanon
- Year 6- Nigeria
- Year 7- Iraq
- Year 8- Mozambique

Each place was chosen because of a connection with another part of the curriculum, for example, in Year 6, pupils have studied the history of The Kingdom of Benin, in modern day Nigeria. Pupils learned about how Christians in their location celebrate, including through services of worship, music, food, gatherings and local traditions.



It has been great to see their understanding of the wide variety of ways the faith is expressed around the world grow. Pupils showcased their learning within some brilliant double page spreads featuring colourful artwork and detailed explanations.

CURRICULUM




GEOGRAPHY



Year 5 pupils have continued with their topic 'Location! Location! where we have continued to underpin their geography knowledge and skills that will be required throughout their time here with us at CCA. They went around the world in sixty minutes comparing continents with facts and features, before focussing more specifically on Europe. They used atlases to locate key countries of our continent before completing Venn diagrams to compare their lives with children from two European countries. All pupils studied the British Isles, the UK and Great Britain before zooming in on our own region and county. Their geographical vocabulary is growing by the lesson!


Year 6 have continued with their topic 'Caribbean Connections' with a spotlight on Jamaica. They looked at the Jamaican flag and its meaning before completing a timeline of Jamaican history where we discussed topics such as slavery and independence. Pupils then moved on to comparing physical and human features of Jamaica and they studied the capital city of Kingston where we looked at the terms 'capital city' and 'settlement.' The topic ended by looking at sustainable and responsible tourism. Why not ask your child how they have pledged to be a more responsible tourist on their next holiday?





Year 7 have had a focus on climate change in the latter half of this term. They studied one of the most influential photos ever taken: Earthrise. Thinking about the thoughts and emotions it triggered in them and how our Earth should be something that we all treasure and care for. Pupils then looked into the concept of interdependence and how, for climate change to be effective, we really need to work collaboratively with a common goal. Why not discuss your own behaviours at home as a family? Do you really do all that you can to help with climate change? Could you do more? CCA are proud to currently be working alongside the Climate Ambassador scheme in developing our school Climate Action Plan.

Year 8 have continued with their 'Turbulent Tectonics' topic where they looked at earthquakes and tsunamis. Their geographical vocabulary is now super-charged with all things tectonic! Pupils studied Tohoku in Japan 2011 looking at the causes and impacts of this devastating natural disaster. Next stop for year 8 after the Christmas break will be a study of Africa with a focus on Kenya.

Y7 Pupils Explore Behind the Scenes at the W2R – Staffordshire Energy Recovery Facility

Last week, our pupils had the exciting opportunity to visit the W2R Staffordshire Energy Recovery Facility (ERF) to learn first-hand how waste is transformed into energy.

The visit offered a unique insight into the vital work carried out on site and the wide range of careers involved in keeping the facility running safely and efficiently.

The session began with an informative introduction from Dan, who provided an overview of the essential work undertaken at the ERF. Pupils were then split into two groups to take part in a carousel of activities.

Group One joined Dan for a 30-minute guided tour of the site, where they were able to see the operational areas up close and gain a deeper understanding of how the process works from start to finish.

Meanwhile, Group Two met with Jenny, who explained the important role apprentices play within the facility. She shared insights into the training, responsibilities and opportunities available to apprentices, as well as her own work supporting the site's development. We were also fortunate that an apprentice joined the session, giving pupils a real-life example of the pathways available in the industry.

After the groups swapped over, pupils came back together for a final summary of their learning. The visit concluded with a lively Q&A session, where students were able to ask thoughtful questions and reflect on what they had discovered during the day.

The visit provided an inspiring look into sustainable energy, engineering careers, and the teamwork required to manage such a complex facility. Our pupils left with a greater appreciation of the science and people that help power our community.



Pupil Parliament Trip to London

Our Pupil Parliament had an unforgettable day on their recent visit to London, filled with excitement, learning, and inspiring experiences. Travelling by train, the group set off bright and early, ready for a full day of exploration in the capital.

Our first stop was the Natural History Museum, where pupils wandered through the fascinating galleries, discovering everything from towering dinosaur skeletons to sparkling gems. The museum's hands-on exhibits and awe-inspiring displays helped bring science and history to life, sparking curiosity and lively discussion among the children.

After lunch, we made our way to the Parliament Education Centre, where the real parliamentary adventure began. Pupils enjoyed a guided tour of the Houses of Parliament, stepping inside the historic chambers where important decisions are made. They learned about the roles of MPs and Lords, the history of the building, and how laws are created.

The day finished with a brilliant workshop, giving pupils the chance to debate ideas, share their opinions, and understand how their voices can make a difference—both in school and beyond.
