




DT Textiles

Arts Award Opportunity - A small group of Year 7 pupils are currently taking part in a number of creative workshops in order to gain an Arts Award Explore. This opportunity is fully funded by the Potteries Museum and Art Gallery.

As part of this process, the children have recently visited the British Ceramic Biennial at Spode, and created their own scraffito plates at the Potteries Museum and Art Gallery. They will then attend a Creative Careers event at Gladstone in February!

It is such an exciting project to be part of; we hope that this experience and partnership will lead to further funded opportunities in the future.

The Choir have started to practice for the Christmas Light Switch on this week, recording their voices so that the local First Schools are able to rehearse before the big night.








Computing

Year 6 are studying computer images this term. After some quick games of Quick Draw to develop mouse control they are learning about basic shape manipulation and layering to create a cartoon version of themselves.









Year 7s are learning about sound technology this term. After learning about Copyright Law they have been using Podcasting Software to create their own talking story version of Cirque Du Freak by Darren Shan complete with crisp packet and pencil case snapping sound effects.


After this they will use the same software to create their own music mix that they can save as a ring tone.

Year 5 have settled in beautifully and are enjoying learning how to introduce themselves in French — lots of confident French speaking and singing can be heard in class!


Year 6 are working hard on expressing their likes and dislikes, practising how to share their opinions on everything from food to hobbies.

History

In recent weeks, Year 7 students have excelled in their assignments on the Battle of Hastings, showcasing not only a deep understanding of medieval battle tactics but also a keen awareness of the pivotal moments that altered the course of English history. Their write-ups highlight a strong grasp of the strategic elements of the battle, such as the use of archers, cavalry, and shield walls. Many students have also explored the significance of Harold Godwinson's positioning and the effect of the feigned retreat, demonstrating a sophisticated understanding of how individual decisions shaped the outcome.

The level of insight shown in these assignments is a testament to the hard work and dedication of our students. Through their analysis of such a defining moment in English history, they have demonstrated not only excellent historical knowledge but also critical thinking skills. This end of term assignment has proven to be a great way for students to prove their grasp of the interconnectedness of military action, leadership, and historical change. We couldn't be prouder of their accomplishments!

Geography

Year 5 pupils have settled into their Geography lessons with a fascination and enthusiasm for the world around them. All pupils have sat a baseline assessment to ensure we can build on prior knowledge from first schools. They have enjoyed studying their first topic: Location! Location! Beginning right back to the times of the super-continent Pangea and zooming in on our own continent of Europe, pupils have developed their map skills and an awareness of the world around them. What a super start!

Year 6 have continued their journey in Key Stage 2 by studying 'Caribbean Connections'. They have completed some accurate map work, locating the major countries of North America and the Caribbean islands and have used their best research skills to produce a factsheet about environmental regions of North America. They are currently 'jammin' in Jamaica!' Why not ask them what they can tell you about this beautiful island?

Year 7 have moved on to the topic 'Warming World.' Starting with the basics of what weather is, they had a time challenge of creating as many weather-related doodles, sketches and words as they could all in the time it took for 3 well-known weather-related songs to play. It was quite a singalong at times! They could now tell you about some key weather instruments such as a barometer, anemometer and rain gauge to name but a few. The forecast for after the half-term break is a scattering of climate with the odd shower of climate zones!

Year 8 have had a 'turbulent' start to their Geography lessons but not in the way you may think! The 'Turbulent Tectonics' topic has given them an insight into tectonic plates focussing firstly on volcanos with a case-study on Eyjafjallajökull. (Yes, they have been practising their pronunciation of this one!). Pupils listened to a witness audio to give them a real feel for the disaster, before studying the impacts of the 'volcano that stopped Europe.'









After October half-term it is straight into Assessment Fortnight for all subjects. Look out for your child's Geography revision mat coming home with them and why not test their knowledge to ensure they are ready for their assessment.

RE



In RE, pupils created some fantastic Harvest reflection pages. They discussed the importance of this time of year for our farming communities and for producers and growers around the world.

Having then looked at what Christians believe about sharing generously and serving others, pupils sketched out their own autumn scene and reflected on their learning.

We were very impressed with the way that they analysed the lyrics from some of our Harvest hymns and also key pieces of scripture on the theme. What a great way to spend time contemplating this important topic!

DT - Graphics

Y7 Structures- Civil Engineering talk

CCA's wonderful Design and Technology link governor, Mr Banham, held an exciting talk with 7RS this half term as part of their Structures project. The class were about to embark on their bridge building challenge and so Mr Banham spoke to pupils about his career as a Civil Engineer, giving them an insight into the industry and gave them advice on how to design, plan and build their bridge. Team work and problem-solving skills were going to be important in this challenge and we look forward to seeing how structurally sound their bridges are.



PE

This term, we have established a school-to-club link with Trentham Rowing Club. Some of our Year 7 pupils have been down to the club to enjoy a free taster session. Many of them have gone on to sign up to the clubs 'Wet Start' programme. If your child is interested in trying a new sport like rowing, please contact Mrs Edwards.






Science

We have had a very busy start to the year in Science, the labs have been hives of activity!

Year 5 started by considering what science is and the scientific method. Pupils were asked to explore the humble tomato as a way of getting them to consider what they think they 'know' and how we might investigate their preconceptions, ideas and predictions. They then developed these skills with lots of hands on practice of measuring, predicting and drawing conclusions.

Year 6 started the Year with an introduction to Solids, Liquids and Gases, we explored together the differences between the 3 different states and what makes them so very different from each other.





Year 7 were able to develop the knowledge of Solids, Liquids and Gases that they began in Year 6, we had a great time 'being' particles, recreating the behaviour of particles when they are heated and change state, being a gas takes a lot of energy and this was exhibited with vigour by Year 7 as we made the most of the dry and warm weather and took the activity outside! Pupils were also able to create some 'Magic' with the cup and card trick whilst learning about air pressure.

Year 8 started with a focusing on healthy lifestyle, diet and the function of a the digestive system. We had a great lesson burning foods to establish which of the foods transferred the most energy. Once again, pupils were aware of risks in the lab, carrying out the investigation safely and learning a lot about the energy content of different foods.
