# Communications Between Home and School

There are now two ways that parents can stay in contact with school.

The first is Groupcall Xpressions – this is the free two-way text messaging service which should be

used to inform us of absences and request meetings. The messages only need to be short. There is no need to tell us who you are or who the message is about as, in school, the programme already informs us of this. Please do not use emojis as this distorts the messages. Should you need instructions of how to download the app please ask your child to collect a sheet from the office. Once a parent is using the app the cost of text messages home is free and letters can be attached to the message.

The second form of communication is the Class Charts app. All parents should have now received a code (please use Groupcall Xpressions to request a new code). In Class Charts you can check on your child's merit totals, behaviour issues such as referrals or detentions and read the daily

messages that are sent out to the students.

#### Free School Meal Vouchers - July 2023

#### **Plastic Recycling**



Over the last year we have installed three machines in the Technology Department that are able to transform plastic waste into creative arts sheets that can be used in Technology lessons - an RS 25 Shredder to grate the plastic, a sheet press which makes the sheets of plastic and an injection moulder to make shaped objects such as earrings or key rings. Every single sheet or object is unique.



The sheets and shapes are now used in the curriculum and our Year 11 students have used them in their GCSE projects. The Year 9 students are currently making lights out of the sheets of plastic and they are looking spectacular.

#### **Carmelite Monastery (Preston)**

After over 100 years serving the Preston community, the Carmelite Convent in Fulwood has recently closed. As an enclosed order, the Carmelites are cloistered; that is, they do not leave the monastery except for medical needs and in


other special circumstances, but remain within the convent leading a life of quiet prayer and work. We are delighted to have received from the monastery a statue of Our Lady of Lourdes,
