VISION STATEMENT

We recognise that the personal development of students, spiritually, morally, socially and culturally, plays a significant part in their ability to learn and achieve. We therefore aim to provide an education that provides students with opportunities to explore and develop their own values and beliefs, spiritual awareness, high standards of personal behaviour, a positive, caring attitude towards other people, an understanding of their social and cultural traditions and an appreciation of the diversity and richness of their cultures.

Aims & Objectives:

- To welcome students to be part of a loving and caring community, valued as an individual as well as a member of the school and the wider community.
- To facilitate a safe and enjoyable teaching environment where students are encouraged to reach and fulfil their potential.
- Christian spirituality and our Christian values will be explored in all curriculum areas, to ensure that everyone connected with the school is aware of our values of **Courage**, **Compassion** and **Commitment**.
- To offer various opportunities where students can embrace the SMSC within life of the school.
- Lead by example and give our students opportunities to become responsible and considerate citizens. All staff to act as positive role models at all times.
- To develop in students an understanding of their roles and responsibilities as citizens in the school community, wider local community, society generally and the world.
- To develop in students perceptions, sensitivity, tolerance, empathy and respect for others as individuals and groups.
- In order for our aims to be achieved we strive to ensure that our spiritual, moral, social and cultural education is delivered with a positive and quality attitude.

Provision:

- 'Thought for the Week' displayed in every tutor room, with a written reflection time during registration for students to explore and discuss the thought/weekly quotes further.
- Acts of Collective Worship through key stage/year/house assemblies.
- Celebrating student success.
- Students join a house group. Houses named after Saint Becket, Saint Faith, Saint Teresa and Saint Victor.

- Students are given the opportunity to become leaders for the following fields (Junior Leaders, Leaders of Learning, performing arts leaders, senior prefects, Prefects, Heads of Houses, Blue Guardian Angels, School council representatives, Eco Ambassadors and Sports Ambassadors).
- Students are encouraged and relish the opportunity to help others through supporting local, national and international charities.
- All staff to be aware of their role in developing students spiritual, moral, social and cultural understanding, interpersonal skills and self esteem through their interaction with students, informally and formally.

Links with the wider community:

- Visitors are welcomed into school and each term we have visiting speakers including local clergy to lead our collective acts of worship.
- Staff and students take part in Christian acts of worship in school as well as our local church (St Mary's church in Datchet).
- The development of a strong home-school link is regarded as very important, enabling parents and teachers to work in an effective partnership to support the students
- Pupils will be taught to appreciate their local environment and to develop a sense of responsibility for it.



The primary aim is to underline the spiritual concerns of humanity (including matters of life and death, the purpose of life, choices in life). Spiritual development is experienced through many parts of the curriculum. Students are encouraged to embrace and experience their spiritual development largely through their RE lessons. They are given opportunities to reflect on their spiritual aspects of learning through trips, meditation in their lessons and reflection time in school acts of worship as well as many other parts of the school life. Churchmead School aims to allow students to develop the following:

- Sustain their self-esteem in their learning experience.
- Develop their capacity for critical and independent thought.
- Foster their emotional life and express their feelings.
- Experience moments of stillness and reflection.
- Discuss their beliefs, feelings, values and responses to personal experiences.
- Form and maintain worthwhile and satisfying relationships.
- Reflect on, consider and celebrate the wonders and mysteries of life.



Moral Development

Churchmead School encourages and ensures students reflect upon their behaviour and actions on a daily basis. We promote students moral development through our 'Thought for the Week' themes and teachers ensure this development is addressed in their lessons as well as in and outside of the school. Staff guide students to take part in many charity events where students are able to reflect on their actions and how they help others.

Students at Churchmead have great opportunities to develop themselves socially. Churchmead School runs many extra-curricular activities as well as many aspects incorporated into the curriculum where students are able to think about their interactions with others. Some examples of this include our students being elected to become Junior leaders, sports ambassadors, leaders of learning, prefects and blue guardian angels. They also are given many opportunities to develop their student leadership by helping to engage with the wider community as well as the school community (e.g. donating tins to the homeless in Slough).
