#### **Holidays during term time**

#### How Pharmacy First can help you

Pharmacy First provides easy access to prompt advice and treatment including prescription medicines, where appropriate, for seven common conditions. Here is the list of common conditions covered alonaside the age criteria:

- · Sinusitis (12 years and over)
- Sore throat (5 years and over)
- Earache (1–17 years)
- · Infected insect bites and stings (1 year and older)
- · <u>Impetigo</u> (1 year and older)
- Shingles (18 years and over)
- Uncomplicated urinary tract infections (UTI) in women (16-64 years)

Please note other eligibility criteria apply. If you are outside of the criteria a pharmacist may still be able to provide advice and care such as suggesting an over-the-counter treatment or if required refer you to another healthcare provider.

#### How to access Pharmacy First



Step 1 - Simply walk into a participating Boots
Pharmacy & ask for help. Or you may have been
referred by an NHS provider, like NHS 111, or your
GP practice.



**Step 2 -** Our pharmacist will take a few details & assess your condition



Step 3 - Our pharmacist will talk to you about the most suitable next steps based on your condition & symptoms presented. This may include prescription treatment, informing you about pharmacy medicines, (the ones that are kept behind the counter) or an in-store product that could help.

#### Talk with your child about responsible use of their phone

Discuss what is okay and not okay to use their phone for. Talk about time limits and expectations of where the device can and cannot be used, this could include things like the phone being charged outside their bedroom overnight.



#### Discuss what to do if something upsetting or worrying happens

Give them the strategies they need in case something concerning happens whilst they are using their device. This could be to lock the screen and tell an adult, to make a report to the platform they are using, or to block the user.



### Explore parental controls

Take a look at the controls available both on the phone itself and on your home Wi-Fi. Talk these through with your child too. Parental controls are a helpful tool, but an open conversation with your child is the most important thing.



# **Punctuality**



The school gates open at 8:40am and children are expected to be in school for **8.50am** ready for their morning register.

Children are marked as arriving late to school if they arrive after 9am. If they arrive after 9:20am, they will receive an unauthorised absence for their morning mark. Poor punctuality can affect a child's overall attendance percentage.

Children who arrive late will need to enter school via the front office. Mrs Welsh will sign in any children who are late using the InVentry system, which is located by the front office.

Parents and guardians of children in nursery and reception are expected to wait with their child until it is convenient for the child to be taken to class. **Please be mindful** that staff will need to leave the class that they are in to come and collect any children who are late. This can be disruptive for other children and we do not always have the capacity to collect children from the office straight away.

Punctuality is closely monitored and if we have concerns regarding a child's attendance, parents/guardians will be contact by Mrs Welsh (Attendance and Pastoral Support).

We acknowledge that anybody can have a morning when they are late due to unforeseen circumstances. However, persistent lateness is not acceptable and unauthorised absences can result in the local authority issuing penalty notices.

Here is a reminder of how poor punctuality can affect a child's learning opportunities:

We would like to stress that we are here to support our children and families and we will continue to do all we can to help in situations where we can.

If you have any queries or concerns regarding punctuality or attendance in general, please ask to speak to Mrs Welsh who will be based in the main office from September 2025.

#### Important Information About the Start of Term

It is important to inform you about the first day back in September, Wednesday 3rd September. Following the success of having children attend in smaller groups last September, we are recreating the same welcoming atmosphere but this time with all children in school for the full day, instead of just coming in for an hour.

All children will be met on the yard at 8:30am on the first morning by their class teacher. Children will be expected to wear full school uniform for their first day back in school. Look out for your child's class and their class name, which will show you where to line up. The classes will then begin to enter the building from 8:40am.

Once the teachers have taken the classes into their classrooms, the children will be registered for the morning. They will then do three activities in smaller groups:

- One third of the class will stay with their teacher and teaching assistant to do "get to know me" activities.
- Another third will go to the hall for a welcome back assembly to discuss class and school expectations.
- The final third will be able to play on the new school playground after we have shown them all the areas and discussed how they are to be used.

We will be emphasising that the children use the playground for its intended purposes. For example:

- The stage can be used for acting, singing, and dancing
- The climbing area is for climbing
- The picnic tables are for sitting, colouring, and reading
- The seating areas are for sitting

Wednesday 3<sup>rd</sup> September will be the first day the children get to see the new playgrounds, and it will be very exciting! The only rule we ask for the new yard is that children do **not** play on the climbing areas in the main yard **before school, between 8:30 and 8:40 am**. They can use the whole yard at break, lunch, and after school between 3.10 and 3.20pm (if you are waiting to collect a sibling).

After school, if children want to use the climbing areas, this is at the discretion of parents or guardians, who are responsible for their children's safety at that time. **However, before school, climbing on the climbing areas is not allowed.** 

Staff will be on the yard in the mornings to ensure children are not on the climbing areas, but please help us by reminding your children of the rules and encouraging them to stick to them. The reason for this rule is that not all children have an adult with them before school, so we cannot ensure they are being properly supervised. In preparation for the exciting new playgrounds, we will also be talking to the children before we break up for summer.

From the second day onwards, teachers will no longer come out to collect the children. Instead, children will go into class as normal, using the playground doors from 8:40 am.

Finally, we really appreciate that children ride their bikes or scooters to school, as this helps with parking around the school — thank you! However, once children reach the school gates, we ask that they walk their bikes and scooters to park them safely in the bike shed until the end of the school day.



Some of our pupils in Year 4, Amelia B, Nylah, Cian, Roman, Eliza, Amber, Etta, Cosima and Maya have all been busy making bracelets and other crafts to sell and raise money for Bebe's Hive and Elsie's Story.

They have raised the grand total of £160! Well done to you all!
