What have we been learning this week?

Reception

Our focus text this week was 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar' by Eric Carle. We enjoyed listening to and talking about the story and we made a class story map, which we then used to retell the story, with actions. We have been learning about the lifecycle of a butterfly and have been very excited at the arrival of some live caterpillars this week, which we can't wait to see grow and change over the next few weeks. In Maths we have been learning to recognise and name 2D shapes and we created pictures using 2D shapes. In our independent learning time we have created some artwork around 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar', made food from the story with plasticine and have done some writing about the story.



Key Stage 1


Year 1

In Maths, Year 1 have been learning the basics of division through grouping and sharing concrete resources practically. In English they have been planning and writing an adventure story. I'm sure their whole class reading book 'Harry the Poisonous Centipede' by Lynne Reid Banks is giving them inspiration! This week Year 1 have been writing a diary entry from the perspective of a bee and created amazing bee hives using bubble wrap and printing techniques. They will be finishing these off by adding stripes and wings to the bees.

Year 2 are reading the book 'Into the Forest' by Anthony Browne in their English lessons. This has enabled the children to make connections with other books we have read previously. They have been learning about the features of a formal letter and writing formal letters to characters in the story. They also learnt about alliteration this week. In Maths, Year 2 have been learning about time. We have started with recapping year 1 learning of O'clock and half past then moved onto learning about quarter to and quarter past. It is going to get harder next week as they learn how to tell the time to the nearest 5 minutes. In Geography, they have been learning about the features of a mangrove.



Key Stage 2


Key Stage 2 were fortunate to receive a visit from Universal Voices, partners of the University of Reading, who run a free community choir for boys and girls aged seven to thirteen. They offer musicianship training as part of their choir to help children develop their musical ear and music reading skills. Our children took part in playground songs and games which the children thoroughly enjoyed as they involved lots of movement to develop their hand-eye co-ordination and release energy. The games were accessible and inclusive for all our children, with songs and games from different cultures promoting social sharing and turn taking.





Year 3 have been writing our own stories based on Matisse's Magical Trail. We changed the characters and setting. We have continued learning about length in maths and we can now add and subtract lengths in cm, mm and m. Our focus artist this week has been Salvador Dali and we learnt about his unique style of art. In science, we began an experiment to discover how well plants grow in different conditions. We are testing what happens to plants with no sunlight, no water and no heat. We made predictions and wrote down our methods. We will be observing our plant and measuring their height to see the impact of our experiment.






Year 4 had their Roman Day on Wednesday, and the children were allowed to dress up as Romans. We had some great costumes and even some swords and shields. (3) We designed and made our own Mosaics which we learnt about in our Roman topic lessons.

In English this week we were focusing on our book "Escape from Pompeii", learning about verbs and adverbs and how they can make our writing interesting. In Maths this week we started our new module on Money and how we can convert £ into pence. It was great to see a lot of the Year 4 children remembered learning about money from last year.



Year 5 - This week we began work on our own Solar System orrerry; check back next week to see the finished articles! The children were introduced to the term 'oracy' and the icons Mr Milstead has designed for us (a hand focussing on hand movements; an eye for eye contact; the megaphone for tone of voice and the body represents body language). We learnt that oracy is to speaking what numeracy is to maths or literacy to reading and writing. In short, it's nothing more than being able to express yourself well. It's about having the vocabulary to say what you want to say and the ability to structure your thoughts so that they make sense to others.

During our PSHE this week we focused on keeping ourselves safe online, particularly on social media. We've had another fun week of English creating our own Mars Rovers. Some of the names we came up with were interesting to say the least: Opportunity, Civicat, Booster, Education, Mystery and Onion! After drawing and labelling our rover inventions, we wrote an explanation detailing more about them. For Number Day, we created a poster explaining more about the work of the NSPCC and created a Maths game suitable for the younger children in the school. We all made a big effort with our number themed non-uniform even though some of us thought we'd drawn the number ten on our cheeks but soon realised it was the digits 01 #mirrorwriting.
