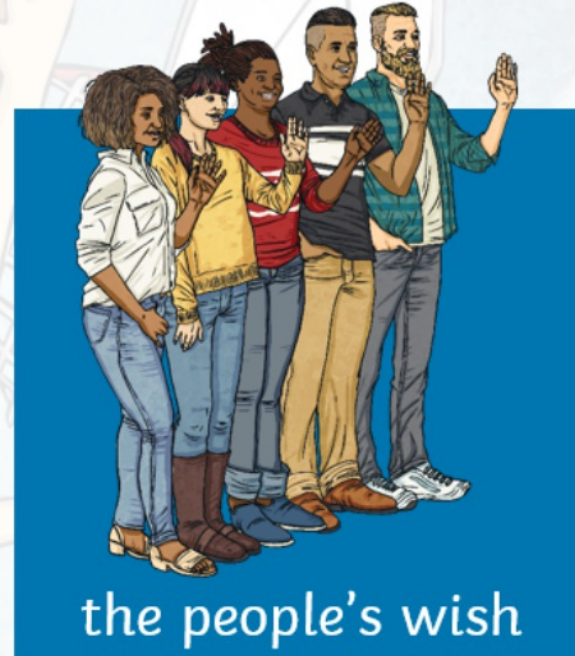
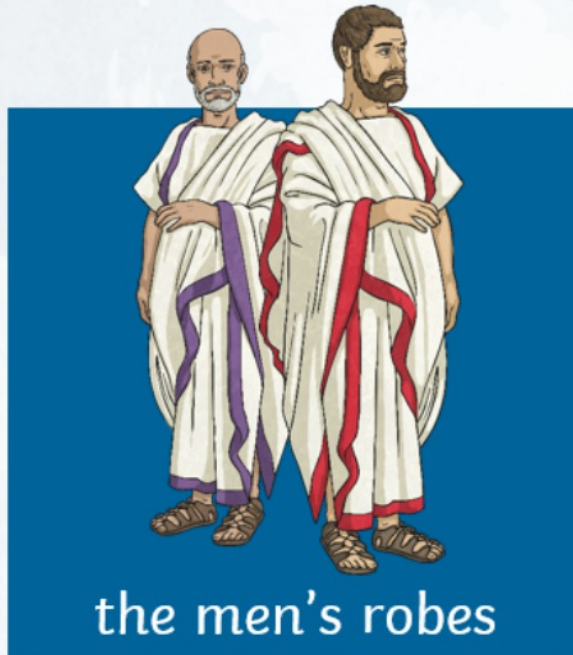
Which piece of punctuation do these words have in common?

These words are all plural. This means 'more than one'.

What does the apostrophe do?

The use of a plural possessive apostrophe shows that something belongs to a group of more than one thing.

Some plural nouns are irregular and don't end in an 's'. For example:



Usually, when a plural noun doesn't end in an 's', we add the possessive apostrophe at the end of the word and add an 's'.
