Human Geography of Paris & London

Paris and London, both major European capitals, exhibit distinct human geographic characteristics. London, with its larger area and population, has a more dispersed urban form and a higher population density compared to Paris within the city proper. Paris, though smaller, boasts a denser, more compact urban layout, with a greater emphasis on walking and local amenities.

Physical Geography of Paris & London

Paris and London, while both major European capitals, exhibit distinct physical geographic characteristics. Paris is more compact, situated on a relatively flat terrain intersected by the Seine River, with surrounding forests. London, larger and more spread out, lies on the River Thames and is known for its greener landscape.
