

 - cross-cultural communication skills (including but not limited to language learning).
- 4. To actively involve parents, governors and the local community in our global activities wherever possible.
- 5. Sustaining/developing links with schools in various parts of the world, in particular our now established link with Royal International School in Kurunegala, Sri Lanka
- 6. Work with international partners on a range of collaborative projects, which involve an element of cultural exchange, sustaining activity throughout the academic year.
- 7. Increasing staff capability towards international understanding and international dimension of learning.
- 8. Understanding how we relate to the environment and to each other as human beings.
- Making use of every opportunity for our students to meet people from varied backgrounds and cultures.
