The Power Of Ten Climate Festival


On Friday 23rd February, myself and 19 other students from both the student council, and the grow club, went to Rheged at Penrith for a Climate festival led by Amy Bray and her charity Another Way. What is a Climate Festival? A climate festival is an opportunity for people who feel passionate about climate change, to come together, learn, and to feel empowered to take action. Throughout the day at Rheged, we took part in a range of workshops including: Communicating Climate Science, Creating Successful Campaigns, Poetry for our Planet, Why speaking to our MP matters. I spoke to Matilda.B in Y11 who is our Regional Representative for climate action at Cockermouth School. She told me that she really enjoyed the festival. As a Regional Rep, her role involved testing the Power of 10 app prior to the festival and she attended regular meetings to give her feedback. She also helped out during the day. Changes our school can make. When I asked her how we could apply some of what we learned from Amy within our school, Matilda said: "I would love to see more environmental education implemented into the school to encourage a more sustainable ethos, and I would also like to prioritize focusing on reducing our plastic waste within the school." I agree with Matilda, and I think having a separate bin for plastic waste in the canteen would be beneficial for minimizing the vast amount of plastic we consume as a school, every lunchtime. What can we all do to help? One way Matilda suggested, was switching to refillable water bottles. If we decrease our use of single use bottles in the canteen, this could really reduce our plastic waste. Matilda also said: "We should try to think about how we are impacting issues such as global warming and the decline of biodiversity on a daily basis." Want to find out more? Kooth

As part of enrichment, students in Sixth Form can become a 'Kooth Champion' which prepares students for tackling mental health issues by taking part in various training sessions. Each term the 'Kooth Champions' are given a task to do by the Kooth team. For our first task, we were challenged to raise awareness of Kooth in school by creating our own Kooth accounts. To do this, we participated in assemblies to each year group, demonstrating what Kooth is and how it can benefit mental health, whilst increasing our familiarity with the website also.

Another role the 'Kooth Champions' take on in school is the 'Walk and Talk' program. This is where students who feel they need to talk to someone else for advice can talk to a student who can listen to their concern, which is beneficial in situations where they may not wish to speak to a teacher, but still need advice.



Finally, the 'Kooth Champions' are also focusing on the running of the 'Red Line Project'. This is a project which raises awareness on sexual harassment in the school environment and aims to prevent it. At the end of February, we participated in several assemblies which raised awareness on this behaviour. predominantly focused on the language used in school. A survey has been sent out from years 7-13 to obtain information about people's opinions on sexual harassment and the language used in school. Once we have analyzed the results, we hope to participate in further assemblies to show our findings and hopefully construct an environment where this behaviour is not tolerated.
