We were both very proud to have been appointed Head Boy and Head Girl this school year and as we reach the end of what has been another busy term we are still very much enjoying the responsibility, with the support from the sixth form student leaders and all of the Student Leadership Team.

A key part of our role is to ensure that the student voice is both represented and heard and earlier this term the Student Leadership Team asked for the school lockers to be relocated from the Humanities corridor after concerns were raised by students. We are delighted to say that the senior staff listened to the students' views and the lockers have since been moved - a real indication of how highly the student voice is valued within our school.

Another improvement we are striving to achieve, alongside Parents in Partnership, is the construction of a school shelter that will allow students to meet with friends and enjoy their lunch in the quad, while being protected from the rain and sun. The Student Leadership Team have been taking part in a '£20 challenge' this term, which has seen each year group having to show their own initiative, leadership and organisation skills to raise as much money as possible from an initial £20 investment. 
An African Experience

The girls stayed in student accommodation whilst there, surviving bed bugs, cockroaches and bats in the toilets! They thoroughly enjoyed their trip and particularly wanted to thank Parents in Partnership (PiP) for their backing and support.



Battle of the Bands



Monday 21st March saw the culmination of many months of work, with the arrival of the long awaited Easter Concert. Many of the year groups had formed bands to perform on the evening, which proved to be a lively, fun event, attended by many parents, family and friends.

The concert offered our many musical students the perfect opportunity to showcase their wide range of talents and incredible skill. Bands from Year 7, 10, 11 and 12 entertained the audience and, in a demonstration of the strong relationship between students and the school, our fantastic finale even featured some ex-students!

A Thought Provoking Visit

At the end of February, fourteen of our Year Ten students travelled to Poland for an emotional visit to a number of the key sites related to the Holocaust. The trip gave students the opportunity to explore the impact of discrimination and what it can lead to.

During the trip, students had the opportunity to take part in a guided tour of Krakow city centre including the Old Town Square, University District and the ghettos of the Jewish Quarter.

They also visited the interactive Schindler's Museum and learned the story of the city of Krakow during the Nazi occupied years from 1930-45.

The group paid a reflective and moving visit to the Auschwitz-Birkenau concentration and extermination camp. They were told of the history of the camp, what prisoners there experienced and of the eventual liberation in 1945.

The group ended their visit by meeting a survivor from the Holocaust who told an extremely moving story of survival, which provoked many questions of identity and forgiveness.

One student, Ewan Ling, spoke of the impact the visit had made on him: 'Krakow was a really nice place but it was horrible to think that such a tragedy had occurred here only seventy five years ago. We visited Auschwitz Concentration Camp on the outskirts of the town, which was truly shocking. It's staggering to think that humans can inflict such pain onto others, simply because of their religion or background. This trip is definitely an experience that I will never forget.'







Fighting for Fairer Funding

Back in January, Cmat members, including our Executive Principal, Mr Hermitt, travelled with Fiona Bruce MP and other education colleagues to meet with the Minister for Childcare and Education, Sam Gyimah MP, to highlight the serious national inequalities in school financing and seek equal funding for Congleton students.

Representing all stages of education, from early years to nineteen, the group included Cmat's Mr Casserley (Head of Black Firs, Chair of CE Formula Working Group - Advisors to the CE School Forum on local funding decisions), Mr Hermitt (Executive Principal of CHS, CEO of Cmat, Chair of CE School Forum), Mr Hodgkinson (Leader of New Life Church - nursery provision providers in

Congleton), Mrs Burns (Head of Sandbach School), Mrs Webb (Head of Eaton Bank Academy) and Mr Leigh (Head of Sandbach High and Sixth Form College).

Mr Gyimah had been charged with introducing a new fairer funding process for education as there was and still is no standard formula for calculating the funding across the 151 local authorities, with Cheshire East the sixth most poorly funded in the country. The disparity between the highest funded and lowest is immense, with the ten best supported areas receiving grants in 2015 averaging £6,300 per pupil, compared with just £4,200 received by the poorest. This massive discrepancy of £2,100 represents a difference of over £2.5 million of annual income for an average high school like us!

The group provided the minister with the background to and examples from their own particular schools of the impact of this unfair system. They posed questions about important issues such as regional differences and the response to national cost pressures including increased national insurance & pensions. The added impact on cash-flow of the lagged funding mechanism, whereby funding for students additional to the Published Admission Number (PAN) is not paid up-front but, instead, repaid in instalments over time, was also highlighted. This has caused particular problems for CHS with its rapidly rising student numbers.

On conclusion of the session, the minister reassured the group that he would be introducing ways to provide "greater visibility" and ensure that local authorities act in a "consistent way in the new formula".

Two months after the meeting, the Government announced that it would be giving £30 billion directly to head teachers, bypassing the traditional local authority route, enabling schools to make their own spending decisions and, hopefully, bringing the current postcode lottery to an end once and for all.

Mr Hermitt commented:

"This is the next step towards giving the children of Congleton a fairer deal. We are pleased that the Government has promised changes that will provide additional funding for all local schools and look forward to the introduction of a restructured funding formula from 2017-18 that will see Congleton students finally on a financial par with their peers."

The new national formula will effectively remove the role of the Local Authority in deciding schools' budgets. Instead, it will ensure that historical and local factors are objectively decided and all schools will receive a fairer allocation of funds. The vast majority of the educational funding will go directly to schools

In order to develop a new structure for funding, the Government are seeking input from all those affected by the planned changes including **parents and teachers**, who can offer their views on two particular aspects of any new formula - the underpinning principles and the pupil characteristics and school factors to include - along with views on the overall funding system proposals via an online response form at:

Mr Hermitt, added:

"I was delighted that so many of our parents got involved and signed Fiona Bruce's original petition for the development of a fairer funding formula for education, which led to this consultation. It would be extremely helpful if everyone could continue their support for our schools by responding to the online consultation **before it closes on Sunday 17th April**."

Back in January, we were lucky enough to be visited by local artist, Erin Piazza, who worked

with our Year 9 students on our **Big Art Day**. Erin demonstrated a number of new art techniques to our students, including batik work, which the Year 9 then tried out for themselves.

During a two hour workshop, the students traced an outline onto a piece of fabric, which they then re-traced in wax. The next stage was to drop in coloured inks into each of the 'cells' created by the wax outline until the desired effect was created. The batik pieces were them finished off with stitching.

Following the workshops, parents and students were invited to an exhibition to view the completed pieces at the end of the day. There was a wonderful selection of bright and striking wildlife images from big cats, wolves and tropical birds to reptiles, insects and fish.

> Our after school **Street Art Club**, held each Wednesday, has proved extremely popular with our students, keen to find additional ways to explore their creativity both in and out of school. During one session, Year 7 and 8 students were shown how to produce unique artwork using stencil and sponge painting. Hosted by our Year 8 and 10, the visitors, aged between 12 and 15, were able to enjoy a variety of experiences including every day school life at CHS and visits to Lion Salt Works in Northwich, The Peak District, Chestnut Wildlife Centre in Castleton

and, no doubt the best bit of all, a chocolate filled trip to Cadbury World in Bourneville!

The experience proved to be an extremely positive one, with some students originally not wishing to be involved in the exchange project changing their minds once new, cross continent friendships had been cemented and the guests had reluctantly returned to Trier. Our students will be travelling overseas to stay with their new friends later this year in July, when they will be able to learn more about life as a student in Germany.

An Australian Adventure

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
We Proudly Present


Spotlight on Sporting Success
