CELEBRATING ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

Record breaking results

This summer saw another set of record breaking A Level results for our students and a record number of Year 11 students staying on at CHS or choosing to join our Sixth Form from elsewhere. 16% of all A Level grades awarded were A* grades, doubling the percentage received last year, and 37% of all grades achieved were either A* or A. It was a similar picture with our GCSE results, with virtually all (98%) of Year 11 students securing the employers' benchmark of 5 or more GCSEs at grades A*-C, which is up from 92% last year and is a new school record. 43% of students secured more than 3 grade A*/As, setting another school record.



Top 15% for Adding Value

CHS is now in the top 15% of schools in the country for adding value (up from top 20% last year), with a score of 1022 overall. This score proves that we enable *all* of our students to study a wide range of subjects to a high standard. We are continually improving and are getting closer to our goal of being in the top 10%.

English Baccalaureate

In addition, 29% of our students attained the English Baccalaureate last year, which is significantly above the national average of 22%. The English Baccalaureate is not a qualification in itself, but it recognises where students have secured a C grade or better across a core of academic subjects (English, maths, history or geography, the sciences and a language). This shows that the majority of our students have taken on the tough GCSE subjects like Humanities (History 78% pass rate) and languages (Spanish 83% pass rate), which leaves them well placed if this new benchmark promoted by the Government is valued by employers and takes off.

November entry Maths and English GCSEs

This year, all of our Year 11 students took both their English and Maths GCSEs in November, which is another first for the school. Everyone in school did their bit to give the students the best possible chance in these important exams, from staff planning extra revision sessions to students in other years moving around school as quietly as possible to minimise potential noise disruption. We even altered the timings of the school day slightly to fit as closely as possible with the timings of the examinations, again to minimise disruption for the students. Mrs Dearnaley, Curriculum Team Leader for English, led a session for a packed room of parents where she explained the preparation we were doing with students and gained parents' support in the run up to the exams. Principal, Mr Hermitt, said "I am delighted with the sheer hard work shown by our students and staff to prepare for these exams. Freed from the distraction of examinations in other subjects, students have thrown themselves into the preparation. Myself and Mrs Taylor have added our encouragement by doing the online revision tasks alongside the students and we completed the same English exam under exam conditions a few days later. We now know more about what it feels like to be a Year 11 student preparing and sitting these modern exams. We both passed with flying colours." He added "We now eagerly await the exam results in

January when we can celebrate with our students who we are confident will be rewarded for working so hard."

PRESTIGIOUS ENGINEERING SCHOLARSHIP

Year 12 student Jayne Booth, was awarded a prestigious Arkwright Engineering Scholarship recently at a ceremony in London, supported by the Institution of Engineering & Technology and the engineering company BAE Systems.

Jayne was presented with her Scholarship by Jonathan Firth, Director of Operations & Projects at Virgin Galactic, and met the organisation that is sponsoring her Scholarship – the Lloyd's Register Foundation.

The Arkwright Engineering Scholarships support young people from across the UK who have the potential to be industry's future leaders in engineering and technical design. During their Sixth Form studies, Scholars receive £600 to support their technical courses and have access to a range of exciting opportunities to learn more about engineering, such as mentoring and company visits. The Scholars' schools also receive £400 per Scholar.

Jayne was chosen following a rigorous selection process comprising a detailed application form, a two-hour aptitude exam and an interview hosted at a top engineering university.

The Chief Executive of the Arkwright Scholarships Trust, Dr Martin Thomas, commented: "This year's assessment process was extremely tough. Any secondary school can become affiliated to enter students, and this year we had 1371 applicants competing for just 371 Scholarships. Jayne and all of our new Scholars have absolutely phenomenal potential for future careers in the engineering profession. Congratulations to Jayne!"

Assistant Principal at Congleton High School, Mrs Bartley added "This is a fantastic achievement! We are delighted that Jayne, who is committed to pursuing a career in engineering, will receive support from one of the country's leading engineering organisations. And as a school, we are proud once again that one of our students has been awarded this prestigious Scholarship."

One of the highlights for staff and students this term is also the annual **'Celebration of Christmas'** at St Mary's Church, Astbury. For the benefit of parents and students who are new to CHS, this is

where coaches transport all staff and students to and from St Mary's Church on the last day of term for a very special service of celebration, before returning to school and departing for the Christmas holidays. It is a very special occasion when the whole school is able to come together and remember the true spirit of Christmas. After the popularity of the staff

Christmas video of 'Amarillo' last year, students will no doubt be looking forward to seeing what the teachers and support staff have put together for this year. For now though, it is a closely guarded secret, filmed mainly after school when no students are within ear shot!


The last week of term also sees many students congratulated in our **Praise Assemblies** for each year group and many students enjoy getting out of school together on various **Reward Trips**.

CHS STUDENTS ARE TOP SCIENTISTS

Two of our Year 13 students, Hannah Priday and Victoria O'Hara, were among some of the top Science students in the North West to be presented with awards for the high level research they have undertaken in the fields of Physics and Veterinary Science respectively, during their Nuffield Science Research placements during the summer holidays.



The students were presented with their awards at the prestigious Nuffield Science Research celebration event, held at the Liverpool World Museum in October. At the event, both Hannah and Victoria presented their work very effectively to the judges, parents and teachers present. Hannah also received a Gold CREST Award for



her work and Victoria's research is to be published.

We are proud that a large number of our high achieving students have been selected for these outstanding awards over the past few years, and have subsequently gained places to study competitive courses at top universities.

STUDENTS VOTE FOR MRS TAYLOR TO BE PUDSEY

WORKING WITH OUR PARTNER PRIMARY SCHOOLS

Once again this term, we have been doing a lot of work with staff and students from our partner primary schools.

Transition to CHS

At the start of the new school year, 168 students joined us in Year 7, coming from primary schools in Congleton and beyond. As they started with us, we looked back with current Year 8 students and their parents to evaluate how they thought their first year at CHS had gone and we received some extremely positive feedback.

One student, Ewan Lang, summed up his experiences "I went into Congleton High School with high expectations and everything at CHS is as good, if not better than I hoped it would be."

Deputy Principal, Jim Barlow, who leads on transition, explained "We start working with the students at our feeder primary schools in Year 5 or even earlier. As well as providing support in their own environment, all students have many opportunities to visit the school to take part in workshops to learn new skills and activities." We work very closely with our partner primary schools delivering projects in English, Maths, Science, PE and Drama throughout the year. Tracey Walklate, Head at Quinta Primary School, added "The transition to CHS is seamless. The close links between our schools ensure that for the children this is just another step on their educational journey."



Cultural Diversity Day

At the start of September, students from our seven partner primary schools took part in a variety of activities relating to Cultural Diversity.

Activities included wheelchair basketball, Bollywood dancing, a Fair Trade chocolate game and a drum workshop, that all brought multi-national themes together. The students' responses to the activities were overwhelmingly positive and everyone involved agreed that the aims of the day had been achieved. The workshops not only encouraged inter-group working but also required the students to consider a range of moral, ethical and cultural issues in a fun and interactive way.

CHS holds the Gold Cultural Diversity Quality Standard in recognition of our extensive work in promoting a greater awareness and appreciation of cultural diversity. However, this was the first Cultural Diversity Day involving students from our partner primary schools.



Then in October, primary schools from across Congleton came together to celebrate their students' artistic talents at our annual Primary Schools Art Exhibition.

Well over a hundred parents, students and their teachers attended the prize giving, where students from reception to year six were able to see their work on display. The theme this year was 'the little town with the big heart' and the competition was judged by Fiona Hampton, Design Director at Berisfords Ribbons in Congleton and a Governor here at CHS.

Commenting on the quality of entries this year, Curriculum Team Leader for Art, Helen Vale, said "We get fantastic support from the primary schools to host this exhibition and once again the quality of work produced by these young artists has been outstanding."

Thank you to the 275 parents who completed our annual online Parents' Survey earlier this term. We are very pleased that the vast majority (93%) of parents and carers continue to agree with the 13 statements provided by Ofsted, which is the best result we have ever had. Very few parents disagreed with the statements and in some year groups 100% of parents agreed with several of them.

Principal, David Hermitt said "We believe that we can improve our work even further. We have already begun to act on the constructive feedback regarding weaker areas of our work like supporting parents to help their children by increasing our direct contact with parents via email and telephone. It is clear from analysing the detailed responses in our survey that improving our communication with parents will pay dividends. In January we are launching our online portal which will allow parents to look at a lot of data on their children at any time."

Two students in Year 8 (Robyn Harrison and Eleanor Graham) were recently involved in a Learning Skills Day with Design and Technology groups from all different years. They said "We thoroughly enjoyed the experience and we all hope we can do it again." Here is their explanation of the day:

Seven members of staff from Staffordshire University came in to school to talk to us about improving the design of basic objects like light switches. Each group of four students had to come up with their own unique design for a modified light switch. Each design had its own target audience, such as the elderly, disabled, teenagers or small children. We all added shape and colour to each design and each group added special features like music players or security alarms.

At the end we all rated the switches, giving them marks from "seriously uncool" for the lowest to "sub-zero" for the highest mark. Thankfully nobody got "seriously uncool"!

DRUG-FREE CONGLETON TALK

Year 9 students recently participated in a 'Drug Free Congleton' talk organised by the Congleton Youth Committee, Mayor of Congleton - Councillor George Hayes and Fiona Bruce, the Member of Parliament for Congleton Constituency.

Mark Cotton from the Cheshire Constabulary gave a talk to the year group on the dangers of drugs, followed by a question and answer session. The same session was also given to Year 9 students at Eaton Bank School as part of joint program to make Congleton Drug Free.

The session was very thought provoking and Year 9 Guidance Team Leader, Mr Franklin, said afterwards "Our Year 9 students were really good

YEAR 11 RE STOP DAY

In November, Year 11 students took part in an RE Stop day, where they were encouraged to reflect on a number of contemporary moral issues, including crime and punishment, abortion, drug addiction and self-worth. Workshops included an interactive game led by Mission Aviation Fellowship, who work to provide healthcare and other resources to indigenous people in areas of the world where transport and communication is difficult. Students also enjoyed a musical performance and presentation from Christian band, 'Brightline', as well as an African drum workshop led by Ed Freitas.

Students listened to a testimony from an ex-offender and drug addict whose life was transformed by faith. The activities and presentations on the day served to reinforce the themes of tolerance and open-mindedness that are already prevalent at Congleton High School. One student remarked that the day had been 'thought-provoking but also fun' and this sentiment seemed to sum up the overall impact of the day. The staff were thrilled to see the students participate without prejudice and said that they felt proud of the powerful insight and reflections they gave on the day.

PERSONAL ACHIEVEMENTS

Jazz Scholarship

Year 12 student, Sophie Mullins, has been awarded a jazz scholarship with the British Ballet Organisation. Sophie auditioned in November and is one of only 10 students to be offered a scholarship. The scholarships are awarded to talented students who show potential both technically and artistically. The scheme provides Sophie with the opportunity to study jazz to a high level and she will receive tuition from some of the most respected teachers in the country, all of whom have had distinguished professional careers. Mrs Salt, Curriculum Team Leader for PE said "Our congratulations go to Sophie for such a fantastic achievement and we look forward to hearing how she progresses with her Scholarship."

Pembroke North Programme success

We were delighted to learn recently that one of our Year 12 students, Alex Jackson, has been accepted onto the prestigious Pembroke North Programme following an interview at Pembroke College, Oxford this month. The programme is designed to raise the aspirations of the students who take part, to get them to think about and engage with subjects they may not have considered studying, and to raise their academic attainment by engaging them in sustained, intellectually challenging programmes.

The programme is extremely well respected and will support Alex with his progress towards university.

Alex explained about his experience of going for the interview: "I went to Pembroke College in Oxford with at least 25 other applicants. My interview was interesting and terrifying, with questions ranging from the reason I'd chosen the universities I had, to "If I had a time machine, who would I spend an afternoon with?", to the merits and problems of standardised tests in American universities." Having been accepted, Alex will now have to complete an essay, attend seminars and take residential trips to both London and Oxford. Director of Sixth Form, Wendy March, congratulated Alex on his achievement: "Alex has done really well to be selected for this prestigious programme. He has worked extremely hard and deserves his success. We wish him all the best with the activities over the coming year."

War Horse

On the chilly evening of Monday 25th November, after a long and anticipated wait, students and staff from years 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12 galloped off to The Lowry Theatre in Salford to see the theatre event of the decade - 'War Horse'.

Students and staff were not disappointed at this astonishing production, based on Michael Morpurgo's novel, which highlights the plight of the forgotten heroes of WW1, the war horses. Miss Lang, who accompanied the students on the trip said "As the horses galloped and charged around the stage, we quickly forgot that they were life-sized puppets and as the theatre filled with emotive music and songs, we
