CHS REMAINS IN TOP 20% OF SCHOOLS IN ENGLAND

We are proud to have once again received national recognition for the value we add to students' achievements at GCSE. An in-depth analysis earlier this year of official Department for Education data on all state-funded schools in England by SSAT, the national schools' membership organisation for improvement and collaboration, identified our success.

We have qualified for an SSAT Educational Outcomes Award by being in the top 20% of schools nationally for progress made by pupils between their key stage 2 results at primary school and their GCSE results at age 16.

Sue Williamson, Chief Executive of SSAT said: "Congleton High School should be congratulated for their exceptional achievement. They have proved themselves to be leading the field in improving GCSE outcomes for their students. There is so much good practice that this school could share. These results are testament to the commitment and hard work of



the students, teachers and leadership team at Congleton High School, and show what can be achieved when skilled teachers have high expectations and ambition for every young person. I am proud that this school is a member of the SSAT network."

Executive Principal, David Hermitt, stated "We are honoured; this is the second year in a row that we have received this recognition from the SSAT. Each year our students continue to achieve remarkable successes with hard work and the support of their parents and our dedicated staff." Chair of Governors, Richard Hinckley, added "This recognition backs up what we as Governors have believed for some time. We have a great school let by exceptional people who go the extra mile to secure the best for our students."

WORKING WITH OUR PARTNER PRIMARY SCHOOLS

As usual, there have been many activities this term in which we have worked closely with our partner and other primary schools. We welcomed a record 200 Year 6 students to CHS in June to spend a day here prior to starting with us in September. They spent time in their tutor groups getting to know one another, trying out some lessons and doing a map guiz to help them find their way around the school site.

Debating competition

Year 5 students from Black Firs, Quinta, Astbury and Mossley primary schools have been honing their debating skills in a bid to win our inaugural debating competition.

CHS sixth form students spent a day in each of the primary schools to train the children in how to debate effectively. The students learned how to give opening and closing speeches to express their view-points, how to listen carefully to the thread of argument used by the opposing team and then how to counter these arguments. They put these skills into practice to debate the issue of 'Should more houses be built in Congleton?' and to decide on a winning team from their school.

All the teams were then invited to CHS to find an overall winner. In the semi-finals, Quinta and Mossley schools won their debates on whether competitive sports should be encouraged in schools. They then went head-to-head in the final where they debated the topic of whether school pupils should have to do homework. The overall winners were Quinta, who were awarded a trophy to show that they are the best young debaters in Congleton! The Star Debater of the whole tournament was Lily Payton from Mossley Primary School.

Other activities that have taken place this term include:

- Year 3 & 4 students from Quinta Primary School came to CHS for a badminton training session and competition
- Year 5 students from all our partner primary schools took part in a series of three English and Literacy masterclasses
 entitled 'Working with the Literary Text'. These sessions were aimed at high achievers to engage them with
 challenging texts and explore plots, characters and authorial techniques
- Year 5 & 6 students from all our partner primary schools came to CHS for a rounders competition, umpired by CHS student leaders
- 6 High Achieving students from Year 5 at each of our partner primary schools spent two days at CHS taking part in a BA CREST Superstars Investigators Award
- 90 students from Black Firs, Woodcocks' Well and Astbury primaries came to CHS to do some 'graphic manipulation' where they designed a superhero of themselves on the computer, along with a game featuring that superhero

EUROPEAN FOCUS

In May, whist candidates in the European elections were busy canvassing voters, students from CHS were experiencing Europe first hand in a series of educational visits and exchanges. The MFL department took a group of

students on a 5-day visit to Spain where they took part in Spanish lessons every day to help build their vocabulary and confidence in speaking Spanish. Students also took part in cooking lessons, learned to dance the salsa and visited Spanish landmarks such as the cathedral in Murcia.

The Humanities educational visit to Italy focussed on the history and culture rather than the language of the country. Students travelled to Naples where they visited both Vesuvius and the volcanic crater at Solfatara, before taking a tour of Pompeii. They also learned about the difference between Italian farming methods and those adopted in Britain, got the

chance to make their own pizzas and did some sightseeing in Sorrento. Geography teacher Mrs Wilson-Jones was very pleased with the visit: "The students were fantastic and it was great to see them so engaged in learning outside the classroom."

Meanwhile, it was the turn of students from the Friedrich Spee Gymnasium in Trier, Germany, to visit CHS as part of the longstanding exchange programme between our two schools. The students stayed with families here and they sampled lessons in school as well as enjoying trips and activities around the region.

And finally, Year 7 students were completely immersed in languages for a full day this term, having a go at speaking in German, Italian, French and Spanish and trying out different fun activities relating to each country. These included flamenco dancing and an orange eating competition in Spanish, Opera singing and a culture quiz in

Italian, learning how to order breakfast in French and doing some Bavarian dancing in German.

Executive Principal, Mr Hermitt explained why these sorts of activities are so important: "Our staff go the extra mile and put a lot of effort into organising these visits, exchange programmes and themed days at school because they really enhance the students' learning and bring alive what they are taught in the classroom. We are proud that we are able to offer such a wide range of experiences for students during their time at CHS."

BUSY TERM FOR DESIGN & TECHNOLOGY

Design & Technology students have been extremely busy this term with competitions, visits and major events all on the calendar for staff and students in addition to their usual studies. They were very busy at the 50th anniversary celebrations running the hog roast and BBQ; and GCSE and BTEC Catering students provided a 3-course meal for 77 people at the annual Sports Awards Evening (see back page).

Fashion Show

Our Fashion Show gives students the opportunity to showcase the incredible work they have done in this area of D&T and shows the progression students make, from producing aprons in Year 7 to full garments in Year 13. It was a fabulous evening where guests were greeted with drinks and canapés prepared by our catering students before sitting down to watch the show. Year 12 students helped organise the event and did a lot of behind the scenes work which included props, hair and make-up as well as getting their fellow students in the right order to run the show. Students spent weeks in rehearsals and even choreographed dance routines for the event. One parent commented "It is evident that a lot of hard work and effort has been put into what was an amazing show. Well done to all the students and teachers."



Fashion and Textiles teacher Mrs Paling Sparkes commented "I am proud of my students and how they produced their textiles products. Their performance in the show was impressive and their individual creativity shone through."

Berisfords Design Awards



For the last 6 years, CHS has worked with local company, Berisfords Ribbons, to run the annual Berisfords Design Awards for our Fashion & Clothing students. Students start with a tour of the Berisfords factory to see the industry in action. Following this visit, they then have to design and make a cushion using ribbons donated by Berisfords. The competition is judged by Berisfords' Marketing and Design Director, Fiona Hampton, and Managing Director, Peter Bowers, who agreed that "the work displayed was made to a very high standard; of the 6 years we have run this competition, this year's work was the most difficult to judge and choose the best three designs."

This year's winners are Emma Winship 3rd Prize £30, Courtney Potts 2nd Prize £70 and Imogen Boote won 1st Prize £100.

Fashion and Textiles teacher Mrs Paling Sparkes commented "We would like to thank Berisfords for their generosity in time, ribbons and prizes as this event is a great all round experience for our Fashion and Clothing students and really makes a difference to their coursework."

Rotary Young Chef/Young Designer

Catering and graphic design students also had the chance to shine in the annual Rotary Young Chef/Designer competition which was held at CHS this term involving students from CHS and Eaton Bank Academy. The competition showcased the students' prowess in their selected technologies. Graphic design students had to present their best piece of work to the panel of judges. Ryan Jefferies won first place with his robotic toy, whilst Faaria Khan came second with a dress and bag she had made and Georgia Smith was third with her wild animal shelter. In the Young Chef competition, Calvin Herd came first, with Lucy Cooper and Lucy Barrow taking second and third places. The standard of entries was very high, as Mr David Cropper, one of the judges, explained: "The competition standards are higher each year and become harder to judge." Executive Principal, David Hermitt, was very pleased with what he saw "I am very proud of all the students for the excellent work they demonstrated here tonight and would also like to thank all the people involved in staging such a successful competition."

Oxbridge Outreach Programme

A group of High Achieving Year 10 students attended an Oxbridge Outreach Programme at Alsager High School last week. The talk was given by a group of Oxbridge undergraduates representing a range of subjects including Humanities, Social Sciences and Sciences. The session provided valuable information to students who are interested in applying to Russell Group universities but were perhaps daunted by what to expect. The undergraduates delivered informal presentations that tackled the common myths and preconceptions students might have. They also talked about their experience of applying for and now studying at Oxford University.

Miss Heys, Guidance Team Leader for Year 10 said; "The session was extremely valuable to the students who attended. It allowed them to start planning their future and understand the advantages of attending a prestigious university to read some of the most competitive subjects. The students from the universities spoke highly of their experiences and discussed their path from studying their GCSE's to applying to university. What was most interesting for our students was to gain an understanding of what the universities are looking for—passion for a subject—and this message was very beneficial for our students to take away."

Cambridge University Visit

We were also delighted recently to be able to take a group of our sixth form students to attend the Open Day at Cambridge University. The students stayed overnight in St Catharine's College so that they could get a flavour of what it is like to live, albeit temporarily, in a college that has existed for over four hundred years. They attended some subject lectures and a talk about applying to Cambridge. They were also able to visit information stands, presentations and dropin session to find out more about subjects and colleges. We are pleased that students from our school will feel wellinformed and prepared to apply to such a prestigious university when they submit their UCAS form in the Autumn.

Students who are expecting to receive GCSE and/or A Level results this summer should note the following important dates:


Thursday 14th August 9am—11am: AS / A Level results

AFRICAN VISITORS

In June, we were delighted to welcome to Congleton eight visitors from our partner schools in Muizenberg, South Africa and Rocky Crest, Namibia. Mr Dave Shaw and Mr Brandon Paulse (Principals of Muizenberg High and Junior schools respectively) were joined by Mr Alban Kloppers (Principal of Rocky Crest High) and other staff from the schools as part of our **British Council Connecting Classrooms Project**. Along with Black Firs Primary School, we are all undertaking an ambitious shared multi-faceted project aimed at raising awareness of the similarities and differences in our cultures. During the visit, which was ably co-ordinated by Mrs Hilditch, CHS students had lessons and assemblies where they were able to hear and ask questions about school life in South Africa and Namibia. Staff were also able to spend valuable time planning together.



Some of the highlights of the week for our African colleagues included being special guests at our 50th anniversary celebrations as well as visits to Liverpool and Manchester, with short but very important photo opportunities at Anfield and Old Trafford! They were also able to explore some of the beautiful sights of Cheshire, such as Little Moreton Hall and Marton Church. In the Autumn, CHS and Black Firs staff will be visiting Namibia to continue to progress the work of the Project. We look forward to further strengthening our partnerships there.

GET READY FOR 'BUGSY MALONE'

CHS is well known for its outstanding music and drama. In recent years we have staged acclaimed productions of musicals such as *We Will Rock You*, *Grease* and *Billy Elliot*. We are very excited to announce that our next whole school drama production will be *Bugsy Malone*, which will hit the stage at the end of January. Workshops and auditions will be held in the second week back in September, so students should keep their eyes on the noticeboards for further details. It is open to all years and you don't have to be a brilliant singer, gifted dancer or outstanding actor to get involved, just a lot of enthusiasm and a willingness to commit to rehearsals will do. Our drama students also impressed audiences at our 50th anniversary celebrations in June. The lower school Drama club created and performed pieces exploring what school life was like 'In the old days' and performed extracts from 'Our Day Out' and 'Kes'. Our Year 10 GCSE class put together and performed extracts from the play 'Teechers' whilst one group from the Year 11 GCSE class performed their final exam piece, exploring what life is like in a third world country compared to a first world one. Well done to all the performers – you worked hard and really impressed our visitors!

ENGINEERING ACHIEVEMENTS

At CHS we are proud of our Engineering heritage. We have been an Engineering specialist school now for 10 years and before that, in the years when the school was Heathfield High and Congleton Boys Secondary Modern, the school had strong links with local engineering firms and provided apprentices to companies such as Fodens, Rolls Royce and British Rail Crewe works. At our 50th anniversary celebrations recently, the Lord Lieutenant of Cheshire, Mr David Briggs, endorsed our belief in the importance of Engineering to our young people, saying "*It is great to know that the school produces pupils with the knowledge and skills which so many local companies badly need.*" He encouraged students to study STEM subjects – Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths – telling them "*There are good, interesting and well paid jobs locally for young people with skills in these areas.*"

Today we have many opportunities for students who are interested in pursuing Engineering as a career. We have strong links with companies like Siemens, AstraZeneca, Bentley Motors and others who work with our students on a whole range of Engineering-related projects such as the ones outlined below. In addition, all of our students in Year 11 complete the Engineering Achievement Course as part of their studies. This course doesn't count in the school league tables, but it does help our students to be ready for the workplace by teaching them the sort of skills they need for employment such as resilience, teamwork, problem-solving and developing a can-do attitude.

Engineering Education Scheme



Congratulations to Year 12 Students Jamie Bernardi, Jayne Booth, Ben Harris and Sam Whitehead who have successfully completed the 'real-life' project set for them by a local engineering company, ECS Ltd (trading as SOTAbeams). The students have been taking part in the Engineering Education Scheme (EES) and have worked over several months with Mr Willis (from CHS) and Mr Newstead (from SOTAbeams) to find a solution to a specific engineering problem experienced by the company. They were set the task of designing and building an automatic wire measuring and cutting machine. The students attended an induction day in October, then a 3 day residential in Liverpool in December and recently delivered an excellent presentation on their work to the Senior Leadership Team at CHS.

The EES is a prestigious programme in which students have to work as a team, at a very high level, to find a solution to an engineering problem. They must then produce a detailed report on their findings and present their solution to experts from the field of engineering at Liverpool University. The students undertaking the project not only develop their knowledge and understanding of Physics, Maths and Engineering, but also develop valuable team working and leadership skills.

National Science and Engineering Competition

Meanwhile, Sixth Form student Victoria O'Hara's project was one of just over 200 (out of the 1000s that were submitted) that got through to the National Science and Engineering Competition finals at the Big Bang Fair in the NEC in Birmingham earlier this year.

Victoria's project was Sequencing RNA-Dependant-RNA-Polymerase in Feline calicivirus. She was looking into different strains of cat flu and how they travel and change on an international scale. Victoria completed the project as part of her Nuffield Research placement, and spent 4 weeks in the

summer holidays commuting to the University of Liverpool's Leahurst Campus to undertake the project. Victoria was also successful in being one of only 10 people to win the CREST Communication and Context award. Congratulations Victoria!

KEY STAGE 3 ART EXHIBITION



This term, the Art Department staged its first ever Key Stage 3 Art Exhibition. Students in years 7, 8 and 9 were asked to produce work on the theme of 'My Ideal Pet'. There was a great response and a huge variety of different images from dragons to pet parrots. Many students took a very imaginative approach to the pet they would most like to own.

A selection of the best work was chosen for exhibition and Mr Barlow chose winners, runners up and highly commended entries from each year group. Curriculum Team Leader for Art, Mrs Vale, said "It was lovely to see parents and students attend the presentations and view all the work along with

selected classwork from each of the year groups."

The letters are available to view on the website, until 11pm on 4th August, the centenary of the exact moment that war was declared. From then on they will become part of the British Library archive, where they will remain permanently accessible online. English teacher, Miss Smith commented, "The students have worked hard to produce a small piece of history of their own and are excited that their writing will be archived and available for all to see."

READING MENTORS PROJECT

Throughout the year, students from Year 9 and 10 have been supporting our Year 7 students with their reading. Upper school mentors, having received training on how to build reading skills, meet with their mentees once per week, during registration, to listen to them read. Such has been the success of the project that currently we have 106 students involved, some of whom were asked recently to complete a questionnaire about their experiences. The selection of responses below demonstrates the impact of the project not only on the Year 7 readers, but also on their older mentors.



Fantastic season of Athletics

Summer of 2014 has been another fantastic season of Athletics for CHS with the Junior Boys team progressing to the regional 'B' final of the English Schools Track & Field Cup and CHS finishing 2nd overall in the South Cheshire Athletics Championships. Over 90 students from Years 7-11 competed in the Championships and there were some excellent performances including 1st and 2nd in the junior girls hurdles for Charlotte Stanley and Tammie Stratford. Caitlin Green came 1st in the Javelin with a distance that beat many of the boys' throws. Johnnie Adderley won the Discus and Hollie Massey and Harper Whitehead both finished 2nd in the 1500m, running excellent times which would have easily beaten the school sports day records!

In the Inter boys and girls competition, both Matt Gillam and Ella Kehoe were 1st in the high jump. Beth Jones and Lucy Wright took 1st and 2nd place in the 100m sprint with Hazel Lloyd 1st in the 200m. Jake Duckworth finished 2nd in the Inter boys Discus and Jay McAleer 2nd in Long Jump. Alisha Meakin also ran incredibly well in the 800m finishing second in the inter girls group which is actually the age group above for her. Congratulations to all athletes involved.

South Cheshire Rounders winners

We are also congratulating our Year 9 rounders team, who have won both the South Cheshire and the County Rounders Tournaments! The team were undefeated for the whole of the South Cheshire tournament, beating Eaton Bank, Sandbach High School, Sir Thomas Moore and Brine Leas in the group stage. In the final they played Shavington and won 8-1. PE Rewards Trip to Astbury Mere


