Working alongside our Primary Partner children is beneficial for our own students as well. Our Option K Sports Leaders recently ran Badminton Masterclasses for The Quinta, giving both sets of students the opportunity to learn and develop new skills.



Year Seven Summer Spectacular

During the summer, our new year seven were set an English reading assignment with a difference.

Aimed at encouraging students to start thinking creatively and to keep them reading through the summer, the assignment required them to read fiction or non-fiction books of their choice and then undertake at least one of a range of tasks:

- Design a poster or book cover for one of the books they chose.
- Write a review of one of their books
- Design and keep a reading log with information about the books read over the summer.
- Create a 'Book Box' for one of their books including decorating and filling it appropriately.
- Design a poster of all the books that had been important to them in their life.

The students chose a wide range of books and produced some extremely mature work, showing great imagination. Everybody put in an enormous amount of effort and the English Department teachers were delighted with the results.

It was a difficult choice to make but the overall winners were Oliver Beardmore, Reve Clowes -Michael, Katie Darmon and Bradley Stevens. Well done to everyone that took part.

Working Together at Kingswood

Not long after joining us, year seven embarked on our annual residential trip to the Kingswood Colomendy Centre in North Wales. Designed to help our new intake create new friendships and develop valuable team building skills, the trip is always memorable and great fun!

The students experienced a packed schedule of exciting and challenging activities including testing their nerve on the aerial walkway, experiencing the feeling of three times gravity on the 3G swing and put their skill to the test in fencing. Climbing, caving, bouldering and a vertical play pen also added to the adventure.

To encourage them to widen their friendship groups, students were put into teams with others they didn't know. This proved no obstacle, with everyone working together to face challenges, test their own limits and conqueror fears, including heights and small spaces. Some also learned some essential life skills such as making their own bed!

The fun and excitement didn't stop there! With no computers or game consoles, students enjoyed good, old fashioned fun in the evenings - bingo and quizzes on the first night with a disco raising

the roof on the second. There were a lot of tired but happy faces when year seven returned to school, with confidence raised and new friendships formed that will last their entire school life and beyond.

Making Reading Millionaires



Accelerated Accelerated Reader programme, reading for twenty to thirty minutes each day and completing an online quiz to check their understanding of what they have read.

The scheme aims to encourage and motivate students to read, by helping them to choose books from a library of 30,000 titles that are suitable for their reading level yet still challenging enough to maintain their interest and enthusiasm. The

Accelerated Reader scheme also enables students to complete the comprehension quizzes and monitor their own progress and quiz results online. They can check the number of words and books they have read and also see their average book level.

Students are encouraged to become members of our 'Millionaires' Club' - reading one million words by the end of the year. Certificates and chocolate were awarded in October to celebrate the fantastic reading achievements of Susannah Utting who had read 155,221 words, Emilia Alcock - 87,494 words, Francesca Bettany - 78,632 words, Chloe Anderson - 68,859 words, Eloise Grice - 62,158 words and Daniel Walton - 62,005 words.

Since then, however, Jacob Tyrell *(right)* has become our first year seven student to become an Accelerated Reading Millionaire by reading a million words from his chosen books in the scheme.

We look forward to many more year seven students joining Jacob in this achievement.



Celebrating Hard Work and Success



This term we hosted our annual GCSE awards evening, welcoming back last year's GCSE students to collect their certificates and learn who'd been selected as winners of the additional curriculum area and the nine special awards. Guests were also able to hear Head of Sport at BBC Radio Manchester, Sarah Collins, talk of her own school and university days and pass on some of the lessons learned along the way that may help our students.

Following a drinks reception, a welcome by Mr Hermitt and an affectionate review of year eleven by Guidance Team Leader, Miss Heys, Chair of Governors, Richard Benson,

presented GCSE certificates to every student. Sarah Collins, handed out a further two awards in each curriculum area, one for outstanding attainment and another for outstanding effort, rewarding not just those who secured high grades but also those that put in the work and really tried their best.

Following a tour of the ground and the museum, year ten Applied Business students heard about the different aspects of the club business, all of which provided useful material for their exams next year.

The group learned much about the day-to-day responsibilities of running a Premier League club from the high-tech remote pitch management systems to finding the funds to cover a weekly wage bill in the region of £4 million!

Students were able to see how the business models that they have learned about and discussed in the classroom applied to this real life high profile example and the day definitely scored highly with all the visiting team!



Taking Learning Out of the Classroom



A small group of year twelve English students were fortunate enough to be able to attend an English Language conference in Manchester's Northern Quarter recently to hear a series of lectures presented by authors and AQA examiners, Dr Marcello Giovanelli of the University of Nottingham and Dan Clayton.

The pair addressed a number of topics that the students cover in their coursework including Language and Gender, Language and Social Groups and Language and Representation.

The speakers have authored many of the group's text books so hearing them speak really brought the texts to life.

In court for all the right reasons! Year thirteen Law students sat in on a

trial at Manchester Crown Court this term and were able to observe witnesses giving evidence and being cross-examined by the barristers. However, the group all agreed that the questioning techniques of our year twelve in their mock trial held earlier had been far superior!

Following the trip to court, the group went on to Manchester University Law School where they were able to learn more from the Law Admissions Officer about studying the subject, how they should prepare and what they could expect while there.

They were also given a tour of the campus by the undergraduates, which gave them the ideal opportunity to find out from those already there what the course and university were really like.



All agreed that the day had proved extremely useful.

Working Together for Future Success

As many of the articles in this newsletter show, at Congleton High we aim to encourage, acknowledge and reward hard work, determination and achievement throughout all school years and this doesn't stop once students reach the end of year thirteen.

Keen to continue to support and reward our students as they progress along their educational journey, we invite our departing year thirteen to apply for an Alumni Scholarship, a small financial award towards covering some of the costs of their future studies.

In return, recipients lend their support to the school to help with activities aimed at encouraging and inspiring younger students planning similar educational and career paths to their older counterparts. Undergraduates previously awarded



the scholarships have returned to the school to take part in assemblies and lunch time meetings, sharing their own experiences of school and university. Students are also able to contact them by email with their questions about particular universities, courses or even career paths.

History Helps Future Planning

Our A-Level History students received a taste of university education when they participated in a session led by an Oxford University academic. Dr Peter Claus, Access Fellow and Lecturer in History at Pembroke College, delivered a talk exploring poverty and welfare in nineteenth-century London.



Students were challenged to think about their conceptions of the past and took part in some stimulating discussions. They also had the opportunity to find out more about studying History at university and the importance of independent learning, resilience and wider reading.

Dr Claus visited as part of Pembroke College's Pembroke North scheme which is an intense academic programme run in collaboration with South Cheshire College and with the aim of broadening the horizons of Sixth Form students in the North West.

The Teamwork Behind the Scenes

The smooth running and continued success of our school is down to many people, not least our amazing students and dedicated team of staff. However, there are two particular groups that play a massive part in keeping us on track, ensuring that we maintain our high standards in terms of education and pupil care.

The Student Voice

We have a very active and respected Student Leadership Team (SLT) who represent the

whole student body throughout the year. The team meets regularly and is made up of elected representatives from each year group. Students suggest agenda items, discuss all aspects of school life and contribute to the evaluation and further development of teaching and learning at CHS. To date, the SLT has been responsible for many improvements at CHS including more ICT rooms, updates to our Post 16 study room, toilet and catering facilities and even changes to the uniform.

Students also form a panel to meet and question prospective new members of staff when they come for interview and their opinions are considered during the selection process.

Each year our Head Boy and Head Girl are invited to become Associate Governors and to attend full governor meetings to represent the views of the student body. They are also joint chairs of the Student Leadership Team and in the Autumn term they carry out a survey of all students to gain their views. These are then presented to the full Governors meeting in the Spring term.

holidays at Keele University where she worked with a team on a project investigating the use of thermal imaging to detect human remains.

In October Isobel travelled to Liverpool to attend a celebration evening where she presented her findings to fellow students and members of the public.

Last term we shared Lizzy Corfield's success with her winning logo for the Congleton Open Space Arts Festival. This term our determined year nine has been rewarded again, this time with a well deserved 'Act of Courage Award' at the Silk 106.9 Local Hero Awards.
