# **Dreaming Spires Inspire**



Each year, our high achieving Post 16 students have the opportunity to visit both Oxford and Cambridge Universities to find out more about studying there. In June, ten Year 12 and Miss Heys joined students from Eaton Bank to see for themselves what life is like at these top universities.

The group stayed in Pembroke College, Oxford and St Catherine's College, Cambridge before spending a day at each university's open day. They were able to tour the

different colleges, attend lectures in their chosen subjects and speak with students who have already completed their first or second years. The visit gave students a real flavour of Oxbridge and served to inspire them to want to win one of the few coveted places.



# **CHS Votes to Remain**



On the day of the EU referendum, after watching arguments put forward for each side by Year 12, students went online to cast their vote for whether the UK should remain part of the European Union. Mirroring the actual vote, there was an extremely high turnout of 71.6% but, unlike the national results, the Congleton students, by a narrow margin of 53.7% to 46.3%, voted to remain in the Union.



# **BTEC Students Pass with Flying Colours**

Twenty three Post 16 students completed an Assessment Day in April for the Leadership and Teamwork unit of their BTEC Public Services course, all passing with flying colours and impressing the assessors - two Royal Navy instructors and a Royal Marine Commando. The group tackled a variety of team building activities and were evaluated on how they worked together as a group and also how individuals performed and demonstrated leadership potential and abilities.



A question and answer session at the end of the day enabled students to find out more

about careers, recruitment and lifestyle within the Forces. This really sparked the students' interest and resulted in at least three of the Year 12 students beginning their application process for these Public Services.

# The Language of Science

Back in March, the Modern Foreign Languages (MFL) and Science Departments teamed up to take forty Key Stage Three and Four students to Paris, for a cross curricular visit that would enable those studying both disciplines to benefit.

The three-day trip began with a cruise along the Seine river, enabling the visitors to see many of the historical sites. This was followed up with a tour of the Musée des Sciences, which featured some interesting temporary exhibitions on advances in aircraft technology and the production of sound as well as the permanent aquarium, planetarium and other exhibitions - more than enough to satisfy even the most science-hungry of our students.

The group were able to immerse themselves in the Parisian atmosphere with a guided cultural city tour taking in the Eiffel Tower, the Champs Elysée, Arc de Triomphe and the dizzy heights of the fifty sixth floor of the Montparnasse Tower, providing a fantastic panoramic view of the whole of the renowned city.

The students also took part in a series of challenges around the Montmartre area of Paris. These included a visit to the

Sacré-Coeur Basilica, finding information from plaques in Paris' most cultural quarter, taking pictures and buying a stamp speaking only French.

Of course, no trip to Paris is complete without a stop off at Disneyland, which is where the group spent their final day and this was rounded off with dinner at Planet Hollywood and the grand finale, The Disneyland sound, light and firework spectacular!



#### Africa in a Day



Our fifth annual Africa Day took place in July and gave Year 7 a fantastic opportunity to explore and experience African Culture in its many forms. The whole day was packed from beginning to end with activities including learning the art of African beading, creating artwork inspired by the continent from recycled materials, shelter building and learning about the people and creatures that call Africa 'home'.

Jeff Cutts, from Congleton's New Life Church, challenged students to consider the difference between their own lives and those of many African children their own age. Building shelters from cardboard and other 'scavenged' materials gave Year 7 a small insight into how it must be to live a different life without the many things that they view as necessities that others can only dream of such as a house, running water and electricity.

Students also explored the problems faced by the South African rhinos in danger of extinction, something they had heard about earlier in the year from visiting South African teachers. In the art workshops, they helped to create a giant chicken wire rhino, which will be placed in the school's quad area to serve as a permanent reminder of the creature's plight

Probably the highlight of the day for many was the opportunity to learn and perform Zulu dance routines with the amazing Mighty Zulu Nation Theatre Company. The perfect end to the incredible day was watching and participating in an amazing performance, in traditional dress, by the Mighty Zulu Nation team, thrilling staff and students alike with the sounds and sights of Africa.

### **Partner Primary Discovery Days**



By the time students start at Congleton High in Year 7, our aim is that they will already be familiar with the school, with many of the teachers, the layout of the building and also have experienced some of our lessons. We achieve this through a programme of 'Discovery Days' that we host for our Partner Primaries, mainly from Year 5 but occasionally earlier. Combined with our primary school sports activities and other competitions we run for Key Stage One and Two children, these events enable our future cohort to get to know us, to understand how our students learn and see what is expected of them. The transition from primary to high school becomes much smoother and easier in this way and is not such a big step.

Our final Discovery Day takes place at the end of June for all Year 6 students due to start with us. It is a full day of introductory lessons and familiarisation activities that enable Year 7 to 'hit the ground running' in September. The images above depict the different things we do during our New Intake Day but, more than this, they show how relaxed and happy Year 6 already look in these familiar surroundings.

Along with taster lessons in a range of subjects including science, languages, drama, ICT and Design and Technology, the New Intake Day includes a 'Map Trail' around the school, which enables new starters to get to grips with where each department can be found, the location of essentials such as the LRC, refectory and cloak rooms and also introduces them to areas they may not have previously come across on earlier visits. Year 6 are able to spend time in their tutor groups, making new friends and getting to know their form tutor. Far from students spending the summer worrying about starting high school, we find the day results in the majority of them counting the days until they can start at CHS full time!



Back in June, Year 5 students from Black Firs, Castle, Astbury St Marys, Woodcocks' Well and The Quinta joined us for two days as part of The British Science Association's Crest Superstars programme. Pupils took part in a range of science based activities, getting the opportunity to solve crimes, construct nests, build rockets and make recycled paper.











# **Creating a 'Wow' with Science**



Working in small groups, Year 8 undertook a science project in July. Students were tasked with thinking about not just the scientific content of the project but also how the information could be displayed to make it interesting and create a real 'wow' factor.

There was an amazing variety of topics covered, with teams adopting a wide range of approaches to the project brief. Students in each group voted for their favourite and the top three from each class were then displayed in the LRC for the whole of Year 8 to choose a winner.

Jade Cartlidge and Amy Cosgrove secured first place with 'Does Colour Affect what we Eat?', Chelsea Jackson, Devon Knapper and Lucy Booth came second with 'The Heart' and 'How Reactive?' from Mikey Lennon, Sam Kehoe and Elliot Dolman came third.

# **Case Cracked with Chemistry**

Year 8 Amy Cosgrove, Tom Kennedy, Josie Statham and Kieran Walker met fourteen other schools at Keele University to take part in The Salters' Festival of Chemistry, a day of hands-on practical challenges and demonstrations. The team carried out a crime-scene investigation challenge in the laboratory environment, coming a very respectable third before spending the afternoon investigating the strength of sun tan

creams, which is part of the Royal Society of Chemistry's *Mission: Starlight* global experiment into UV protective materials in collaboration with the UK Space Agency and The European Space Agency.

# **Vocational Opportunities for Year 12**

In March this year, Year 12, Tom Longshaw, won an Apprenticeship Challenge with online retailer, AO.com and, as a result, was offered a week's work experience in July at the company's Crewe logistics headquarters.

The Apprenticeship Challenge took place in Crewe and Tom, along with four other Year 12 CHS students attended a day at the AO.com HQ. Whilst there, the students gained an insight into what it would be like to work with the company, met existing apprentices and were given the opportunity to work on a challenge that could win one of them the week's work experience. All five of the students commented how the day had been a great insight into the world of work.



Tom, who studies Product Design, IT and Music, was lucky enough to win the valuable work experience opportunity, where he will be working with the 'Quality Assurance Team'. Tom stated, '*I really enjoyed the day*,' and '*especially enjoyed competing with my mates*.'



As part of his Public Services course, Year 12, Dan Wilson, joined Mrs Sadat-Shafai at 'Thursday Thirty', a Chamber of Commerce event held by Cheshire Fire and Rescue at Congleton Fire Station.

#### **More Sports Day Records Broken**







Sports Day this year was in stark contrast to last year when the sun shone down. Despite this year's blustery weather

(which seemed to get even worse once past the astroturf) and the soft ground,

students made the most of the opportunity to get out, get active and have fun.

Year 7 students, Joe Ayre and Fin Stratford, set new records in the 200m and 1500m respectively. Joe beat Elliott Darman's 2013 time by 1.03 seconds, while Finn set a new 1500m record in a time of 5 minutes 20 seconds, beating Jack Farrall's record from last year by 9 seconds.

At the end of the day, when the scores were calculated, there were just two



points separating the top five Year 7 tutor groups, with **7ZGr** beating **7HV** and **7CT** by one point to claim the Year 7 title with 130 points. Year 8 was not as close though, with **8KJE**'s total of 136 points beating **8CE** by six points. Year 9 was much more convincing with **9SDR** taking the Year 9 title by a twenty point margin, while **10JC** were the victorious tutor group in Year 10 once again.
