#### **Collecting Exam Results**

The 2019 Exam Results Days are **Thursday 15<sup>th</sup> August** for A Levels and **Thursday 22<sup>nd</sup> August** for GCSEs. Students will be able to collect their results in the Main School Hall from 09:00 to 11.00 on these days.

If students are unable to collect their results in person, someone else may pick them up on their behalf. A signed letter of authority from the student, naming the person who will collect should be handed to school's Exams Officer, Mrs Isherwood, in the Sixth Form Centre or brought on the day. The person collecting the results will need to bring with them some form of ID as proof of identity.

If nobody is available to collect the results on the day then students can provide the school with an A4 stamped, addressed envelope (SAE) and the results will be posted to them on Results Day. SAEs should be handed in to Mrs Isherwood.



#### **Is Your Child Entitled to Free School Meals?**



Cheshire East Council is encouraging parents and carers to check their eligibility for Free School Meals to ensure that nobody misses out.

Children receiving Free School Meals in Cheshire East are also entitled to a 'Pupil Premium' payment of up to £1,900. Schools can apply for this additional funding, which is then used to provide more support for the student, helping to develop their academic progress, self-esteem or social and emotional skills.\*

All Infant children (Reception, Year One and Year Two) automatically receive Free School Meals, but older Primary and Secondary children may also be entitled if you are claiming any of the following benefits:

- Income Support.
- Income based Job Seeker's Allowance.
- Income related Employment Support Allowance.
- Support under Part 1 of the Immigration Act.
- The guaranteed element of State Pension Credit.
- Child Tax Credit as long as you have a yearly household income of less than £16,190 (as assessed by HM Revenue and Customs) and do not get Working Tax Credit.
- Working Tax Credit run-on (paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit.
- Universal Credit with no earned income or with net monthly earnings less than £616.67.

You can also apply for nursery-age children if they attend before and after lunch sessions at a local authority nursery school, nursery class or any Academy nursery if it has the same Ofsted number as the primary school.

#### **Equipped for Success**

It is important that every student attends lessons with all the necessary equipment to enable them to get the most from their lessons. We ask that all students have with them the following in each of their lessons:

- Blue or Black Pen (15p from the LRC)
- Green Pen for corrections and improvements (15p from the LRC)
- Pencil (10p from the LRC)
- Ruler (15-25p from the LRC)
- Calculator (£6.35 from the LRC)

All these items can be purchased from the LRC for a total cost of less than £7.

Students can also purchase a range of revision guides and other stationery, including pencil cases, protractors, compasses, maths sets, highlighters, pencil sharpeners, from the LRC

#### **Great Globes Galore**

### Reading Millionaires

We encourage our students to read as often as possible as we recognise that reading helps to develop vocabulary, opens up new worlds and helps us to understand others. To inspire students to develop a love of reading, we run our Accelerated Reader (AR) scheme for Years Seven and Eight, which tracks reading progress via a wide range of AR books and quizzes.

Students are required to read an AR scheme book that matches their reading level for a minimum of 20-30 minutes a night and are also given time to read in registration and library lessons. Once they have completed each book, they take a short,

online, five to twenty question guiz to show they have read and understood it.



#### IT Girls

In February, our Work Placement Coordinator, Mrs Sadat-Shafai, took fifteen of our Year Nine students along to Barclays' Technology Centre at Radbroke Hall near Knutsford to take part in their 'IT Girls Allowed' Event.

Throughout the day, which focused on careers in IT for girls, the students were involved in workshops, working in teams alongside their peers from other schools to create computer programs to solve particular problems including navigating a robot around a course. Each failure for the robot required it to be reprogrammed, requiring the teams to persevere and work together.

In addition to the practical aspects of the day, the group were also able to hear from a number of inspirational speakers from Barclays regarding the opportunities for girls in IT. Of particular interest to many was a young apprentice who talked of her progression from school to a role within Barclays and her plans for the future. All the girls enjoyed and appreciated the day greatly.





## **Wonderful World Book Day**



Our English Department takes every opportunity to encourage students from all years to read as often as possible and to help them develop a real love for books of all sorts. World Book Day and National Poetry Day are just two of the many opportunities the team maximise in

as many ways as possible.

This year, for World Book Day, teaching staff provided 'Shelfies', photographs of their own book shelves and challenged students to guess which teacher owned which shelf, with prizes for the form with most correct answers. Year Seven students also took part in a survey via Show my Homework to find out the year group's favourite read.

#### A Woman's Work

International Women's Day took place this year on Friday 8th March and we were delighted to be invited to celebrate the day with Siemens at their Congleton site. Siemens is the largest industrial manufacturing company in Europe and leads the way in a number of sectors including industry, healthcare and energy. Many women work within the company in roles at all levels including the Head of Logistics and the Head of Manufacturing and they are keen to attract more women into the company and in to engineering roles.

Our Engineering teacher, Miss Kenny, took along fourteen female students from Year Ten to Year Thirteen and they were able to spend the day finding out more about careers in Engineering.

Along with students from other schools, the group heard talks from some of the female engineers working with the company. The speakers were able to share their own stories about their chosen profession and the route they took to their current role from school to present day. Following the talks, the students were able to see more of the

engineering facility with a tour of the plant.

We aim to encourage girls to ignore any misconceptions and stereotypes about the careers they can pursue, so this was a great opportunity for them to see for themselves the real women who have been successful in STEM careers. All the students found it interesting and most rewarding.

#### **Achieving Success Together**

At Congleton High School we have very high expectations for the behaviour of all our students and encourage good behaviour through praise and reward. Our rewards policy incentivises *Outstanding Effort/Achievement, Improved Work/Effort, Cumulative Good Work, Taking part in Extra Curricular Activities* and *Service to Others* with a series of rewards from verbal praise to R3 merit points. Attendance is also rewarded with Bronze, Silver and Gold Awards and there is a Sixth Form 'Personal Achievement & Service Scheme - PASS' for older students.

Students enjoy competing against each other within their own tutor group and, in turn, aim to ensure that their tutor group receives the most combined R3s at the end of the year to earn extra rewards and privileges.

Although he had no knowledge of the theatre, he knew he just wanted to sing and act so went on to join a number of youth theatre groups in the area. His original plan to become a property developer with his father was soon pushed aside once those around him began to recognise and encourage his gift for

performing.

"I never thought I would make it but I was encouraged by my music and Drama teachers at Congleton High School; Charlotte Blundred, Katherine Martyn and Gill Davis."



His dedication and talent won him

scholarship to The Hammond School, a specialist performing arts school based in Chester, where he studied for three years, leaving at 21 to take up a role in Rent at the Regent Theatre in Hanley. Other career highlights have included performances in the UK tour of *The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time* and appearing in the West End in both Rent and the Carole King musical, Beautiful. Joel also had a fabulous run in Jesus

Christ Superstar, which won the Olivier Award for Best Musical Revival in 2017.

We aim to give all our students as much support as possible when choosing and applying for higher education courses. In addition to Russell Group and other universities, we also have a number of students who aspire to attend Oxford or Cambridge. Prior to visiting the actual colleges later in the year, there are other events designed to help students navigate the specific requirements of Oxbridge applications.



At the end of March, nine of our Year Twelve students attended an

Oxbridge Conference in Nantwich at Malbank School. The students took part in practice interviews and met current Oxbridge students. They were also delighted to be able to seek advice on the dreaded personal statements and the best ways to make them as effective as possible.

Research undertaken by YouGov shows that young adults with greater levels of contact with employers whilst at school are significantly less likely to become 'Not in Education, Employment of Training - NEET' and, once in employment can earn up to 18% more than peers without the same workplace experience.
