CHS Summer Exam Results

The wonderful results celebrated this summer were down to the hard work and dedication of our students combined with our very broad curriculum that meet the needs of all students, together with a vibrant and varied extracurricular programme, and underpinned by outstanding care, guidance and support.

As an inclusive school, we encourage and support ALL our students to achieve for themselves the best possible outcomes. For us, it is not just



about high achievers delivering multiple top grades but also ensuring that those students for whom school may be a struggle achieve and even exceed their targets. As such, **Progress 8** (which takes each student's best eight GCSE results and measures the progress made from the level at which they start in Year 7 to the level achieved at GCSE) is the most important measure, as it shows their improvement, not just final grades.

In 2018, we were delighted that our students achieved the joint highest Progress 8 score in Cheshire and, once again, in 2019, students outstripped their targets, with a (provisional) Progress 8 score of 0.23. This means that, on average, students achieved almost a quarter of a grade <u>higher</u> than expected in every one of their GCSE subjects. In many cases this secured them a higher grade than predicted.

GCSE Results

- **80%** of students achieved a Grade 4+ in English and **72%** in Maths. **70%** achieved a Grade 4 or higher in **both** English and Maths.
- 76% of students achieved a Grade 4+ in Science
- 75% of all grades were achieved at Grade 4 or higher
- **24%** of all GCSE Grades achieved were at 7+ (A*/ Distinction).
- **42** students achieved at least 5 GCSEs at Grade 7+ (A+/ Distinction+).
- Attainment 8 score (provisional) is 50.3. (This calculates best 8 subjects for each student, including English, Maths, at least 3 English Baccalaureate subjects and 3 other subjects.)
- **17** subjects achieved over 80% Grade 4+ pass rate.

Post 16 Results

- Over 100 top grades were achieved this year
- Students studying Academic and Vocational courses alike continue to succeed
- Sixth Form students achieved the grades required to progress to their next step - Degree Apprenticeships, Apprenticeships, employment and degrees.
- Many students have now taken up university places to study a wide range of degrees including: Biomedical Sciences, Chemistry with Forensic Science, Film Production, History, Mathematics, Music Technology, Music, Natural Sciences, Primary Education, Social Work, Sociology, Sport Development, and Theatre.



Along with all the Sixth Form students celebrating their great results back in August were two high achieving students who learned that sitting A Level exams years in advance of their peers had paid off. Year 11 Ru Morgan achieved a fantastic A* Grade in his A level Maths and Year 9, Isaac Cumberlidge, was delighted

with his Grade A for AS Mathematics.



Technology High Fliers

At the end of June, CHS Director of E-Learning, Mr Curry, travelled across to Manchester Airport with ten of our Year Ten students to take part in a Masterclass in Technology. The day was hosted by MAG-O, the airport group's in-house digital agency, which was created in response to technology-driven changes in the way passengers travel.

To help the students gain a greater understanding of how technology fits in to the everyday life of the airport, the group took a tour of Terminal One with an eye on the technology used to make the experience of passengers as smooth as can possibly be. Students were able to get a 'behind the scenes' view into the server room and experience a check-in desk from the operator's point of view.

Back at the MAG-O offices, the visitors learned about the many different roles available within the agency, demonstrating that there is a place for all different types of people with a variety of skillsets to allow them to design systems to meet the needs of their customers. Vodafone also delivered a presentation and emphasised the importance of girls choosing technology roles and the well paid careers they could access.

The group was very impressed by the modern office environment, particularly the table tennis table in the cafe area! A major high-point of the visit was catching up with a former CHS student, Joshua Ogden, who is now in the middle of a higher level Apprenticeship, working at MAG-O and studying Computer Science at MMU. It was very rewarding for the students to hear more about his role, the route he had taken since leaving school and also his plans for the future. This visit gave students a great insight into the wide variety of roles they could pursue at one of the region's biggest employers using the skills they are developing in school.







Bikeability

Back in the summer, twenty one of our Year Seven students took part in the Department for Transport Bikeability Course

The free course is all about gaining practical skills and understanding how to cycle on today's roads. It aims to give the trainees the skills and confidence for all kinds of cycling.



Students were divided in to two groups and each joined a half-day session, which gave them a better understanding of how to keep safe on the roads.

Future Finance

Keen to add to their academic learning, last term Mr Davis gave a useful talk to Sixth Form students to equip them with a useful



understanding of basic finances.


This information should help to prepare the students for life at university, undertaking apprenticeships or in employment and help them to manage their finances.

Earlier in the year, our Parents in Partnership (PiP) group put together a CHS team to take part in the Rotary Swimathon at Congleton Leisure Centre. Our team swam brilliantly, totalling a fabulous 128 lengths between them.

In the Swimathon event, local groups put forward teams of all ages and abilities to swim for around an hour. Each team raises its own sponsorship money according to the number of lengths they swim and fifty per cent of this is returned to them for their own chosen charities. The money is shared

with Rotary, who organise and sponsor the event. Last term, Mrs Eckersley was delighted to receive a cheque from the President of the Congleton Rotary Club for a wonderful £225 for the PiP charity and another for £81.06 for the


school's fundraising for East Cheshire Hospice.

Rotary's own two chosen local charities, Forget me Not Dementia Group and Pure Insight, were each presented with a cheque for £2,000.

The 2019 Swimathon raised over £10,000, divided between the teams' charities, Rotary and their own chosen charities. In total, sixty four teams swam a combined 8,358 lengths of the pool - equivalent to 131 miles!

Cllr Saunders Shares Cmat Learning Journey

Earlier this year, CHS, along with fellow Cmat school, Black Firs Primary, welcomed Councillor Jos Saunders, then the Cheshire East Council Cabinet Member for Children and Families, to see the Cmat Pre-School to Sixth Form Learning Journey for herself.

Within her Council remit at the time as the Portfolio Holder for Children and Families, Cllr Saunders' interests included all aspects of Education and School, Lifelong Learning and Employment and Skills, so both schools were delighted to share some of the many opportunities enjoyed by the 1607 children educated by the Trust. Cmat schools continue to be very successful, with all three celebrating



above average results from Key Stage 1 in Black Firs and Castle, right up to Key Stage 5 at Congleton High Sixth Form.



During her visit to Congleton High, she met with Cmat CEO, Mr Hermitt, CHS Assistant Headteacher - Leader of Sixth Form, Miss Boulton, CHS Chair of Governors, Rich Benson, and a number of the teaching team across curriculum areas. She was also able to see the learning and community facilities available to students including the outdoor shelter, financed by donations and student fundraising.

Following a visit to the Sixth Form Centre, Cllr Saunders met with CHS Work Placement Co-ordinator, Mrs Sadat-Shafai for an introduction into the school's

vocational provision and work placement programme. With education and employment both falling within her remit, the team were keen to share the difference these opportunities make to students' success.

Cllr Saunders was welcomed to Black Firs by Headteacher, Martin Casserley, who showed the Cmat learning journey from the very beginning, with a visit to the Early Years facility. As Town Athletics Champions for fourteen years in a row and winners of many of the local sports awards, the team at Black Firs were also keen to show off their new sporting facilities.

Both schools are extremely popular, with parents/carers across the town hoping to secure a place for their child. Whilst sharing the great progress made by Cmat children and the many academic and personal successes they enjoy, Mr Hermitt was also keen to discuss with the Councillor the lack of funding. The increase in the number of housing developments in close proximity to CHS and Black Firs has not been matched by an increase in funding and this is a cause for concern.

Mr Hermitt, commented:

"Families moving into the area should have a chance of securing a school place within walking distance of their new homes. The property developers have signed agreements to provide additional resources for the secondary schools in the town but this funding has not yet materialised.

"We are asking the Local Authority to make Congleton a higher priority in its decision making and to release the same levels of financial support already bestowed upon Alsager and Sandbach.

"We look forward to receiving the levels of funding necessary for us to be able to educate this continually increasing number of students."

Both schools were delighted to meet with Councillor Saunders and would like to pass on the thanks of all the children, parents, carers and staff to her for taking the time to visit them.

Discovering A Smooth Transition

By the time students start at CHS in Year Seven, our aim is that they'll already be familiar with the school, with many of the teachers, the layout of the building and also have experienced some of our lessons. We achieve this through the programme of 'Discovery Days' we host for our Partner Primaries, mainly from Year Five but occasionally earlier.

Combined with our primary school sports activities and other competitions we run for Key Stage 1 and 2 children, these events enable our future cohort to get to know us, understand how our students learn and see what is expected of them. The transition from primary to high school becomes much smoother and easier in this way and isn't such a big, scary step.

The images around the page depict the different things we do during our Discovery Days but, more than this, they show how relaxed and happy pupils already look in these familiar surroundings.

Our first Discovery Day of the academic year, held each September is our popular Cultural Diversity Day, which gives Year Six children an insight into other cultures and how others live their lives. This year, we held workshops on African Beading, Bollywood Dancing, Disability and Sport Awareness and African Dance.

Year Five students join us for a whole day of Science based activity as part of the Crest Superstars initiative, which includes experiments such as: bridge and boat building, finger printing and making kites and rockets. This is a great way of introducing children to the Science equipment and facilities that they will use regularly as high school students.

Our key Discovery Day takes place at the end of June for all Year Six students due to start with us. It is a full day of introductory lessons and familiarisation activities that enable Year Seven to 'hit the ground running' in September.

Along with taster lessons in a range of subjects including Science, Languages, Drama, ICT and Design and Technology, the New Intake Day includes a 'Map Trail' around the school, which enables new starters to get to grips with where each department can be found, the location of essentials such as the LRC, refectory and cloak rooms and also introduces them to areas they may not have previously come across on earlier visits. Year Six are able to spend time in their tutor groups, making new friends and getting to know their form tutor.

Usually our New Intake Day is the final Discovery Day for Year 6 students but last term, we introduced a three-day programme of workshops in a range of subjects including science, languages, drama and DT. These sessions were a great success with all the children who were eager to start studying the subjects for real in Year Seven.

Far from students spending the summer worrying about starting high school, we find the day results in the majority of them counting the days until they can start at CHS full time!







Forming Friendships

Starting a new school can be a scary time at any age and is particularly daunting for those eleven year olds moving up from primary school to become the youngest members of a much larger school than they have been used to for the previous seven years.

It is with this in mind that we hold our many 'Discovery Days' for primary school children of all years to familiarise them with the school, staff, students




and their future classmates. This work to ensure a smooth transition and help students settle in quickly doesn't stop once they join the school. In the first few weeks of term, all Year Seven students are able to take part in our New Starter Teambuilding Day at Astbury Waterpark, a full day of activities aimed at helping students get

to know each other, learn how to achieve success together by working in teams and, most of all, have fun!

Students enjoy a whole range of events including kayaking, climbing, bushcraft, archery, raft building and orienteering. New friendship groups are formed, which is a real bonus for those joining from one of the many smaller schools in the area, who often make the

It is always thoroughly rewarding and enjoyable day, which starts off the new school year in the best possible way!

Your Help with Road Safety



We have an ongoing issue with road safety around the school site. There are a number of cars parked on Box Lane at the end of the school day, blocking both the pavement and the road, causing a dangerous obstruction for pedestrians and other cars. It also results in traffic chaos as the road becomes blocked with single lane traffic unable to move in either direction due to the parked cars.

Please would you help us in the following ways to prevent an accident and help the traffic to flow:

A) Avoid parking on Box Lane - there are plenty of safe parking areas, away from the school and only minutes' walk that also do not inconvenience our very patient neighbours. (Please also park considerately and not across driveways/ junctions etc.)

B) Remind your child of their own road safety responsibilities including staying alert when next to roads and also waiting for crossing lights to turn green before stepping into the road.

Life Beyond GCSEs

The Sixth Form team held their annual Open Evening this term, welcoming Year 11 students from CHS and a record number from other schools in the area to find out more about the positive difference we can make to their Post 16 success.

Many visitors had already decided on CHS as their first choice whilst others were keen to find out about the wide range of courses, dedicated facilities and student support on offer, using the evening to help them make this important decision. Head of Sixth Form, Miss Boulton, gave a short welcome presentation along with Head Girl, Lara Nuttall and Head Boy, Alex Lehm (right).

Miss Boulton shared the continued Post 16 success. Results have seen a three-year upward trend in top grades across the 40 academic and vocational courses offered. 70 top grades were celebrated by the 100 students sitting A Levels last year, with an even greater number of A*/A and Distinction*/Distinction grades than previously seen.




Our Sixth Form courses boast a strong track record of achieving at least 99% pass rates and GCSE resit results remain above the national average and amongst the best in Cheshire. Across all courses, results celebrated by Sixth Form students place the school among the best Post 16 providers in Cheshire East.



As an inclusive school, CHS is a supportive and nurturing environment where all students, no matter what their ability, are challenged to do their best. Although Sixth Form does have entry requirements, students are not rejected after the first year if they don't achieve top A or B grades. As a result, impressive A Level and vocational results are celebrated each year and the team consistently acknowledged for the high standard of teaching and learning by Ofsted and visiting HMI Inspectors.

Guests were impressed by the wide range of courses designed to accommodate all needs. Along with the traditional selection of academic and vocational qualifications, the range includes Level 3 Food Science and Nutrition, suitable for those wishing to pursue careers in food sciences and technology; an option to study textiles as part of the Cambridge Technical Art course; and the newest addition to the range - Applied Science, a general science qualification ideal for students not yet wishing to specialise. Sporting students were particularly keen to learn more about our Sport Academy, which enables studies to be combined with training sessions, coaching, volunteering and playing fixtures.

Our flexible study patterns for Year 12 and 13, enabling students to choose a study style that suits them, was also of interest to visitors. Although the norm is to take three subjects, some choose to study four and others specialise in just one alongside work placements and other supplementary qualifications. Some choose to take three years to complete their post 16 studies while others complete our Training for Work programme, spending Year 12 improving Maths and English, studying a vocational course and completing an extended work placement



Throughout their time with Sixth Form, students are also supported to work towards the next stage of their journey after completing their post 16 years. Whether they plan to move into higher education, aspire to secure an apprenticeship or degree apprenticeship or find employment opportunities, the Sixth Form team will work with them to ensure that they are able to achieve the best outcome for themselves.

Throughout the Evening, the Head Girl, Head Boy and their team of Year 12 and 13 students leaders were able to share with visitors the many positive aspects that set CHS apart from other Post 16 providers. These benefits include a fantastic team of teachers and support staff, specialists in their field and in working with older students. Another plus point for Year 12 and 13 students is the strong community feeling within Sixth Form, with the advantage of their own purpose built building including coffee shop, common room and study areas.

Important for many visitors was the funding available to those wishing to study after GCSEs. Keen to ensure that no enthusiastic learner should miss out, CHS has made a number of bursaries available for Sixth Form students, who can access both a 16-19 Bursary and a Transport Bursary. In addition, promising Engineering students are able to apply for an

> Arkwright Scholarship through the school, which is a £600 award along with mentoring and enrichment opportunities.

Year 9, **Alex Jones**, worked hard over the summer break and was delighted to achieve his PADI Scuba Diving Certification as a result of all his effort.


The final part of the challenge was to undertake four open dives in Malta but he actually completed six successful dives, achieving a depth of 16 metres!




Year 8 student, **Jayden Tang**, is celebrating after securing a fantastic opportunity, which should help him develop his love of football into a possible future career.

The team set off from Rye in East Sussex early on Saturday morning. The boat was manned by two crew and the other crew members followed on in the support yacht. The crossing became hairy when the tiny fifteen foot sailing dinghy had to navigate

the world business shipping lane that is the English Channel. The team were

forced to cross the bows of huge super-tankers and container ships, resulting in one tanker having to give way to the dinghy by doing that can only be described as a ship's version of a hand-brake turn!

After crossing the shipping lanes, the last leg to Boulogne began with Tom at the helm. The winds soon picked up to a Force 4 (30 mile an hour winds), resulting in breath-taking three metre swells. The team landed on French soil 7 hours, 1 min and 45 seconds after setting off, with only one capsize and averaging 6 knots throughout the day.

As a result of this fantastic effort, the Sailing Club raised £2,720 pounds of the £5,000 target they set out to achieve. Maggie's is a charity close to the Sailing Club's heart as one of their ex-sailors and instructors was diagnosed with Stage 2A Hodgkins Lymphoma and the Trust really helped her and her family get through her treatment.
