strong, it remains to be seen whether the politician's promises result in a muchneeded redress of the unfair school funding model that currently disadvantages all schools in Cheshire East.

The competition started for our students when eleven young chefs from CHS and Eaton Bank competed in the first round of the event, held at Eaton Bank Academy in October. The students were asked to plan and prepare a two course menu in a set time.

The judges in this round were Andrew Bourne, Head Chef at Alexandra Court

Hotel, Congleton and Rosemary Knight, a home economics specialist. Daniel Amies took first Josh Bailey-Pope place with his menu and Josh Bailey-Pope was awarded second place. The boys went forward to the next round of the competition, District Qualifier No 1, which was held at The Kingsway School, Cheadle. We were delighted to learn that Josh had taken first place and Daniel third place and will again go forward to the next



round, which will be the District Final on 20th February 2020.

As a professional chef of many years and a judge of the Rotary Young Chef, Mr Bourne believes that the competition is about the whole process of planning and costing the meal - not just about the cooking. He is a great source of



support and inspiration for budding chefs and, as such, we were delighted that he visited CHS recently to work with Daniel and Josh on refining their dishes for the next stage of the competition.



Great Expectations


Ten of our Year Thirteen Sixth Form students saw a glimpse of their future with a two-day visit to Oxford and Cambridge universities last term.

Your Help with Road Safety



We have an ongoing issue with road safety around the school site. There are a number of cars parked on Box Lane at the end of the school day, blocking both the pavement and the road, causing a dangerous obstruction for pedestrians and other cars. It also results in traffic chaos as the road becomes blocked with single lane traffic unable to move in either direction due to the parked cars.

Please would you help us in the following ways to prevent an accident and help the traffic to flow: A) Avoid parking on Box Lane - there are plenty of safe parking areas, away from the school and only minutes' walk that also do not inconvenience our very patient neighbours. (Please also park considerately and not across driveways/ junctions etc.) And

B) Remind your child of their own road safety responsibilities including staying alert when next to roads and also waiting for crossing lights to turn green before stepping into the road.

On Friday 8th November, a group of thirty-six Upper School and Sixth Form Art students and staff embarked on an overnight gallery visit to London. Taking the fast train, they were soon walking along the Thames in the direction of Tate Modern. On arrival, students were amazed at the diversity of work on display and challenged by the messages and thoughts behind some of the more contemporary artwork. From there the group travelled to the exclusive area of Mayfair to visit the Hamilton Gallery, where a stunning photography exhibition was on display representing the work of Richard

Avedon and including his 1950s fashion photography for Harper's Bazaar magazine (left).

After refuelling at Planet Hollywood, the visitors were off to South Kensington and the V&A Museum, a wonderful place to spend Friday evening, taking in sculpture, painting, costumes and artefacts from around the world.

Saturday morning brought sunshine and time to take in the exquisite paintings at the National Portrait Gallery off Trafalgar Square. Students were mesmerised by the detail in the portraits, ranging from Tudor times through to the modern day. Amongst the many wonderful and memorable pieces was a recent oil on linen work by Colin Davidson. Completed in 2016, the 1.3 x 1.2m work captures the performing artist, Ed Sheeran, perfectly (*right*).

The group completed their gallery experience by taking in the Impressionist and Post-Impressionist work in the National Gallery, including paintings by



Van Gogh, Renoir, Cezanne and Gaugin. A spot of lunch and shopping at Oxford Street followed before returning to Euston and home, tired but inspired by the huge variety of work seen.

compete to achieve the highest number of behaviour and attendance points. The lucky (conscientious and hard working) winners are rewarded with a tray of doughnuts.




The group watched United beat the Serbian away team, Partizan Belgrade, by three goals to nil, with Greenwood, Martial and Rashford scoring the goals for the home team.
