#### **Update from our Head Girl and Head Boy**



We'd like to share with you what we've been doing this year as the Sixth Form Leadership Team, and the legacy we hope to leave for the next student leaders.

One of our roles is representing the student voice and ensuring that this is acted on. We listen carefully to all the input from each year group, from Year Seven up to our Sixth Form peers. We're passionate about the importance of strong communication, which we've tried to focus on and improve in both leadership information and charity work.

At the start of the year, we set up email groups for both the Sixth Form team and the whole school team, allowing us to easily send information, such as minutes from our meetings, to everyone. In assemblies we introduced the year groups to their respective Sixth Form leaders, who were then used as the main point of contact so that students always saw a familiar face when we were informing them of events.

We hold meetings every other week at lunchtime for Sixth Formers and during most guidance lessons for the whole school team, as we feel this allows us to regularly talk about any issues or suggestions that the team could have input on.

As with every year, we have a strong emphasis on continuous, school-wide charity work. At the start of the year, a Year Eight student wrote to Mr Barlow asking if we could do something to support Ruby's Fund. We took this on board and held a school '**Wear Red for Ruby'** Day, raising over £300 for our first charitable event. We've continued the school's support for **Children in Need** and **Operation Christmas Child**, holding a school concert and bake sales and helping to organise the filling and collecting of Operation Christmas Child boxes. **Charity Tuesday** has been running at CHS for the past two years and we've continued this. Each year group is allocated a month during which they nominate a charity and undertake fund raising activities. This ensures that students are able to focus on the charities close to them personally and receive help and support with their chosen fund raiser from the Sixth Form Student Leadership Team.

An initiative we are particularly proud of is **Food Bank Friday**. For the two months before Christmas, we held a collection in Sixth Form of a different food type each week. Over time, we got the whole school more and more involved, with a large amount of food being donated for the Storehouse Foodbank at New Life Church. We hope that this initiative will continue for many years to come.

One of our goals at the start of the year was to help to improve the school's environmental footprint, so we were involved in starting the new **Congleton High Eco Club**. Their first project was planting trees all around the school. They've also had meetings of a small lobbying group that met with Mr Barlow to discuss changes that could be made to the school from a student's perspective.

We have worked with existing Sixth Form students to find what they'd like to see in the upcoming Taylor Building renovations and have been able to set these plans in motion for the next Leadership Team,

There are also many school initiatives that the Sixth Form Leadership Team have helped with, such as the

Year 6 Cultural Diversity Day, Parents in Partnership (PiP) Discos, Careers Fairs and Open Evenings, which we have tried to help flow smoothly by offering as much support as possible.

As much as we have helped the school, in our Leadership Team roles, we too have benefitted. Like each Leadership Team before us, the roles have greatly improved our abilities in public speaking and have taught us valuable skills in team management, project planning and communication with people at all levels and of all ages.

## **City Studies**

After measuring the infiltration rates near Trentabank Reservoir in Macclesfield Forest earlier in the year, the Year Twelve Geographers travelled to Rusholme, Manchester in March for their second fieldwork trip.

They planned and prepared the work themselves beforehand and hoped to find out how insiders and outsiders perceive the area and the ways that it has changed. This will help them gain insight into one of their main case studies. Later in the course they will return to Manchester and the surrounding area to find evidence of the 'urban heat island effect', whereby cities tend to be warmer than the countryside, before going on to plan their own independent research on a topic of their choice.

## Diggin' It

Working with Geography teacher, Mr Hulson, our amazing Eco Club has worked hard to help our school become more eco-friendly.

As part of their work, the group has planted 130 trees in school grounds in the hope that over the next few years they will help to improve wildlife habitats, absorb pollution from cars, take in carbon emissions and simply make our surroundings a much nicer place to be.

The trees, provided by Woodland Trust and Free Trees for Schools, have included hazel, field maple, oak, crab apple, and hawthorn and the group are hoping to branch out in to fruit trees in the future. 12


communication and teamwork skills, with teams of four competing over several rounds to reach the final.

### **Edible Education**




Year Ten Computer Science students completed a unit of work on the structure and function of computer networks. They studied a range of

A huge well done to the whole team, who did really well and picked up the Judges Award and also to the overall winners, Endon High School.



## A Wonderful Week of Science

Each year, the British Science Association coordinates British Science Week, which aims to raise awareness, spark enthusiasm and celebrate Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths. This year, British Science Week ran from 6<sup>th</sup> to 15<sup>th</sup> March and CHS Scientists enjoyed a wide range of lessons and activities that really helped to

inspire and inform.

- Year Twelve Biologists used Potometers to measure transpiration rates of laurel leaves. They also investigated other factors that might affect the rate of transpiration (water moving through a plant) such as wind.
- Year Nine Physics students measured the resistance of wire, trying hard not to get into a tangle!
- Year Nine Chemists investigated the amount of energy created using different fuels, comparing diesel, biodiesel and ethanol. It certainly made sure that the science labs were toasty and warm!
  - Mrs Figiel's Year Seven Scientists investigated the Skeleton System with the help of Jerry the Skelly, who joined the class for all their Science lessons after that.
    - As part of their Inheritance and Selection work, Year Nine Biologists cloned cauliflowers using a technique called Tissue Culture.
      - Mr Holmes' Year Ten Scientists had an unexpected visitor to their lessons. While learning about Radiation and Contamination, Fellow student, Kaya Marissa, dressed in the type of protective equipment needed by people working in contaminated areas.
    - Our Year Twelve Chemists used molecular model sets to study Isomers - these are molecules with the same formula (the same number of atoms of each element) but different structures. The models they constructed helped to give them a greater understanding of the structures.







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## A Wonderful Week of Science









Mr Holmes encouraged all students to take part in our own 'heat' of the nationwide British Science Week Competition to design a poster following the 2020 theme of 'Our Diverse Planet'. We received some wonderful entries from both lower and upper school students,

showing real creativity and an understanding of the important issues challenging our planet today. Choosing between them was not an easy task but the eventual very worthy winners were: First Prize -Year Eleven Abi Douce, who won £30 in Amazon vouchers, Year Eight Katie Morova won Second Prize and £15 in Amazon vouchers and Third Prize went to Year Eight Hope Pointon who won a chocolate egg in addition to £5 in Amazon vouchers. The three winning posters have now been sent off to the national competition. Watch this space!

- Miss Jones' Year Nine class investigated the reactions between acids and metals and tested whether hydrogen gas was produced in the process.
- Miss Figiel challenged her Year Seven scientists to design a poster to help explain Heat Transfer. She chose her Top Six and handed the task of choosing an over all winner to Mr Tyrrell!
- Year Twelve Physicists investigated light-dependent resistors, working in pairs to measure the current voltage characteristics.
  - Year Seven had been investigating the skeleton and body tissue and put this learning in to practise when they dissected chicken legs. They were able to identify the different parts and their function in the limb.
  - Year Nine students studied infrared radiation using upcycled food cans to determine if shiny or matt surfaces radiate more heat when filled with hot water.
  - Finally, if you've ever wondered what happens to ice when salt is added, Mrs Figiel's Year Seven group will now be able to enlighten you! The students investigated this process with some very interesting results.










We were delighted that many of the representatives were CHS alumni, which meant that students were extra keen to hear their particular career stories.

- Kerrie Salisbury is Future Talent Adviser with electrical products distributer, AO, and has supported a number of our Careers events.





In February, eighteen of our Year Twelve and Thirteen Physics and Science students travelled to Geneva to visit CERN and the United Nations (UN).

At CERN, home of the world famous Large Hadron Collider, the group went to the Antimatter Factory. This is the only place in the world where antiatoms are created on a daily basis and experiments to measure properties of Antimatter, such as its mass, are undertaken.



The group also visited the UN, which is where 193 Member States communicate and try to solve world issues (such as global health emergencies like COVID-19).
