Celebrating Rewards Success



Our students have made a great start to the new school year with some excellent examples of behaviour and school work. A fantastic 11,346 R3 rewards have been awarded this half-term and a further 122 R4s (and congratulatory texts sent to home) achieved through exemplary performance or 'extra mile' school work. Well done to **Year 11** who top the R4 table with a remarkable total of **60**!

120 Bronze Certificates have been awarded to the students who have achieved 20 R3s and 3 Silver certificates for those achieving 40 R3s.

Equally as important as those students who achieve R3 and R4 recognition are those who have not incurred a single negative consequence during the half-term. Over the last eight weeks, 663 of our students have not received a single consequence. **Year 10** top the leader board with **152** students remaining consequence free, **Year 7** have **149**, **124** for **Year 9**, **Year 11** have **122** and, finally, **Year 8** with **116** students.

The students and year groups have all celebrated their success together in different ways. 7LJO enjoyed a celebration breakfast with form teacher, Dr Jones, toasting their Year 7 Competition win as the form with the highest combined R3 and attendance points.

Congratulations to all these students, forms and year groups on their wonderful achievement. Keep up the great work!

Your Help with Road Safety



We have an ongoing issue with road safety around the school site. There are a number of cars parked on Box Lane at the end of the school day, blocking both the pavement and the road, causing a dangerous obstruction for pedestrians and other cars. It also results in traffic chaos as the road becomes blocked with single lane traffic unable to move in either direction due to the parked cars.

Please would you help us in the following ways to prevent an accident and help the traffic to flow:

A) Avoid parking on Box Lane - there are plenty of safe parking areas, away from the school and only minutes' walk that also do not inconvenience our very patient neighbours. (Please also park considerately and not across driveways/ junctions, in turning circles etc.)

Starting a new school can be a daunting prospect for students at any age, particularly when moving up from primary school.



Time to STOP and Consider


On Tuesday 13th October, students in Year 7 to Year 12 took part in our first whole school STOP morning of the year. It was a wonderful and very beneficial opportunity for them to STOP and consider a range of important life issues.

As a school, we recognise the value of giving our pupils opportunities to help them develop as people as well as learners. Our STOP mornings aim to help students improve their life chances as well as teaching them how to keep themselves and their

friends safe.

A diverse range of age-appropriate topics were addressed during the STOP morning activities:








- Year 8 were able to hear and discuss the risks of substance misuse and the short and longer term impact on physical and mental health.
- Year 9 learned about peer influence with a specific focus on gang behaviours and also received some beneficial careers support.



• Year 10 enjoyed careers support sessions and also spent time during the morning investigating healthy and unhealthy behaviours; including cancer screening and the risks associated with cosmetic procedures such as tattooing and piercings.





• Year 12 focused on the study skills that will help to better prepare them for higher-level learning and exam success, and they too benefited from careers support

The team at Congleton High School will continue to deliver student support and a comprehensive and targeted PSHE (Personal, Social and Health Education) syllabus through virtual assemblies and form tutor sessions each week. Students will be able to take part in a further four STOP mornings throughout this academic year, which provides us with the opportunity to deliver high quality support to all our young people, keep them safe and help them to improve their life chances.



Year 7 Science on a Roll

If you've ever wondered about the performance of your favourite brand of kitchen roll or whether there's another product that is stronger or more absorbent, then look no further!


Thanks to a series of experiments undertaken by Mrs Figiel's Year 7 Science group, we can now share with you which kitchen roll has the best overall performance.

The students used their science skills to plan and carry out experiments to test absorbency and strength, measuring how much water each sheet was able to hold and much weight they would bear before breaking.

Measuring the performance of leading, value and own brand products, they then practiced their graph-drawing skills and made their conclusions based on the results.

In both tests, a supermarket own brand product, which is almost half the price of the premium brand product, performed best, holding 38ml water and supporting 1500g of weight.

I am writing my review on *The Book of Dust*. I think it is a gripping tale that, once picked up, can never be put down. Aimed at children of around 10-13, it is written by Philip Pullman, the author of *His Dark Materials*, and is a prologue to the series. The main plot is about Malcolm, Alice and baby Lyra. When a giant flood hits the Earth, the trio are swept away in the canoe, La Belle Sauvage, whilst being hunted down by former scientist, Gerard Bonneville, and the Consistorial Court of Discipline (CCD). Malcolm is a smart, shy boy and Alice a strong, determined girl. They must work together to deliver Lyra to her father.



I liked this book as it is full of action, adventure and suspense. If you are a fan of Philip Pullman and His Dark Materials then this is the book for you.

Reading Age Testing

In September we introduced Reading Age testing for all students in Years 7 to 11. They will be tested this half-term and then again towards the end of the school year to monitor their progress. There is a strong correlation between Reading Age, attainment and personal development (*cited in Clark and Rumbold, 2006*). The evidence suggests that there is a positive relationship between how often a child reads, reading enjoyment and attainment (*Clark 2011; Clark and Douglas 2011*).



To help our students foster a love of reading early on, we are developing our reading strategies across Key Stage 3. In addition to encouraging independent reading for pleasure, Year 7 use the online book platform *Fiction Express*. Year 8 will be given a free book as part of the *Book Buzz* scheme run by The Book Trust and a new Year 9 Reading Challenge Scheme is to be launched with rewards for regular reading. Teachers are reading novels to their Key Stage 3 classes in English and tutors will also be reading to their forms later in the year.

The national picture tells us that once students arrive in secondary school, their reading decreases. There are many other demands on students' time but we hope that raising the profile of reading in school will encourage them to find books and authors they enjoy and get into the habit of reading regularly - for fun! To quote Frank Serafini, Professor of Literacy Education and Children's Literature: "There is no such thing as a child who hates to read, there are only children who have not found the right book."

Our Sixth Form team have put together their own extended Virtual Open Evening, to enable students coming to the end of their main school journey to see how CHS can continue to offer them access to high quality learning and enrichment opportunities.

The Sixth Form team are using video to introduce themselves and the subjects available. These are supported with lots of additional information to help students and their parents/carers make the Post 16 choice that is right for them and their future education and career aspirations.

Students can apply to the school directly for a Sixth Form place and all relevant information and forms are on the page, along with CAS Sixth Form

information on the maintenance and transport bursaries available.

The application deadline for a Year 12 place in the CHS Sixth Form is 15th December 2020 although later applications will still be considered.
