#### **Throwing the Result**



Last term, our Year 13 Business Studies students learned about *Sensitivity Analysis* relating to investment decisions. We're informed that this all starts with throwing paper balls into a bin, a vital element of studying this topic!

The students spent time learning about investment appraisal techniques (e.g. looking at the potential return on investments to inform business decision making). They investigated Sensitivity Analysis, which - rather than looking at one outcome - looks at the best case, expected and worst case outcomes in order to help with decision making.

The students throwing the paper balls had to decide on their best case out of three (ie. how many they would get in the bin), their expected and their worst case. Everyone else in the class also predicted the result for the three throwing the balls. Mr Davis gave "*special thanks to Joe for aiding the example by deliberately missing all three!*"

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This practical demonstration of the principle then led the enlightened class into the theory work.

## **Full of Wind**

Renewable power was a popular theme in Science lessons for many of our students this term with both Mr Thomas' Year 8 and Mrs Fitzsimmons Year 9 students learning about the subject then challenged to create their own wind turbine models.

Year 8 Eva B and Jasmine L shared photos of their creations along with Year 9 Jessica L, Emma L and Amelia H. Oliver H went one step further and actually filmed his wind turbine in action ! Well done to all six of you, you have clearly shown that you understand the subject.



#### **Focus the Mind**

Our ICT Teacher, Mr Davis, found a great way to help his Year 10 Computer Scientists put together effective condensed revision notes.

He deliberately gave the class just a few day's notice for a topic test but told them they could take in to the test one n

could take in to the test one piece of A4 paper to help them.

The students loved this because they felt like they were "*being allowed to cheat on a test*". However, Mr Davis loved it even more because the class took the opportunity to produce some high-quality, condensed revision notes for the topic.

Mr Davis commented: "The students probably would not have done such a good job had I just asked them to make revision notes and not done the test. The extra focus worked well, helped them to really concentrate on making the notes concise and was a great lesson in creating effective revision aids."

## **Role Up**



In their first Drama lesson with Miss Frimston, Year 8 investigated how to develop a successful character. Drew S chose the character of a Receptionist in a hospital setting, exploring it here through the 'Role on the Wall' project.

Miss Frimston was very impressed with Drew's `*wonderfully detailed'* work.

You need only inform school of any POSITIVE test results.

If you or your child show any symptoms of Covid-19, even if they are only mild, it is essential they are **not** sent into school. If you or any immediate family members test positive, your child **must** be kept at home and in isolation for a period of ten days, and you **must** inform the school immediately please. # **A Winning Formula**

Congratulations to the three Year 8 winners of Mr Holmes' Key Stage 3 British Science Week Kahoots quiz.

The competitors were tested on a wide range of general Science knowledge covering topics including planets, the human body, elements and scientific processes.

Dawid M took first place with 21,184 points, second was Barney M with 18,561 and third was Charlotte F with 18,451.

Dawid won chocolate and a trophy, with a science goodie bag going to both Barney and Charlotte.

In February 2020, four of our now Year 10 students took part in the AO Big Bang Green Logistics Challenge. This was a competition 'calling on young minds in Cheshire and Staffordshire to help reduce our carbon footprint."

Schools across the region were challenged to design an environmentally friendly vehicle for the AO logistics team. Students in Years 9, 10 and 12 were encouraged to research and create a new vehicle to reduce, or even eliminate, carbon emissions from the AO delivery fleet.



Once all the entries were submitted and judged, a presentation event was planned for March 2020 but, as we all



now know, things were set to change drastically and everything came to a standstill, including the presentation.

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Although disappointed that the original event was postponed, the CHS team was pleased to receive the announcement earlier this year that the presentation event would go ahead online almost a whole year later. They were even more thrilled when they learned that they had actually WON the competition, scoring a phenomenal 46 marks out of a possible 50!

The judges gave some glowing feedback "Great research and analysis of our products for sale - you went the extra mile for that! Simple but effective idea, which can actually be implemented relatively quickly. Your main idea is right on point with new initiatives, not only in AO but the industry as a whole."

The winning team received Amazon Fire 7 tablets and will each get to name one of the four AO electric charge points located in Potters Bar and Haywood.

We are delighted that the boys were finally able to receive the recognition they deserve for all their hard work and effort working on this project.



## Fabric of Life





Covid 19 has once again meant that our DT team has had to change their usual Key Stage 3 projects. Whilst careful not to limit students' creativity, the team is adapting to the social distancing rules and keeping the range of equipment that requires sanitising to a minimum.

In Textiles, students studied portraiture and the 'story' that a picture tells us as the viewer. Students took photos of themselves, which were printed onto fabric using Sublimation Printing. These images were then worked into using a range of embroidery techniques.

Textiles teacher, Mrs Paling Sparkes, was very pleased with the results from this project and, from the feedback received, the students enjoyed the work too.

Our Year 7 English students have been studying a variety of Gothic texts this term and have undertaken a range of exercises to help give them a greater understanding of the themes and styles of the genre.
