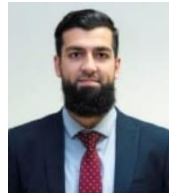


A Message from our Governors

At the last governors' meeting, we were pleased to hear that the school has received a Silver Award for attendance, which is above the national average. This shows that the children are happy and keen to come to school. And recent surveys also show that staff, parents and children are happy with the school. These are all visible on our school website and promote the positive culture and atmosphere which can be seen – and felt – across the school.



The school's self-evaluation for safeguarding has been ratified by outside verifiers, and most areas checked (including SEND, attendance, maths and writing) were found to be expected or strong.

There have been some impressive improvements to report too:

- Early Years has received £5,000 for improvements to their outdoor classroom.
- £10,000 has been spent on new books to support the acquisition of early reading.
- A new sound and visual system for the hall was installed in the Spring term.
- Safety has been improved with the recent installation of 8 new CCTV cameras and in the summer break, there will be a new roof on the playground Hub.
- A significant injection of cash has been promised by the Trust for new IT equipment for the Autumn term.
- A new Inclusion Hub is planned; this will support children with SEND and EAL needs.

All the above are positive strides forward and shows the school is not looking to sit on what they have, but to improve and give the best they can provide for the children.

One crucial point that most parents will be aware of was the persistent changes to leadership and staff in the school. This year will mark the first time in a long time that the majority of staff will be staying on for the following year. Bringing consistency back to Conway school which it has been in much need of.

Funding for SEND support has increased significantly this year, thanks to the efforts of the SENDCO, Mrs Begum. Again, showing the school is looking to provide as much as they can for all students.

Finally, phonics and early years work continues to go well, however the school has identified that reading needs further improvement, and this will be a focus going forward. A way in which we as parents can support this is to read with our children regularly. Whether that be the parent reading to the child or the child reading to the parent.

In summary, 2025-2026 has been a positive year for Conway – and we look forward to continuing this trend next year, and beyond!

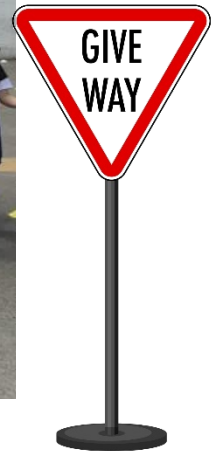
